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## **Economy, Housing and Crime are Top Issues for County Residents**

A survey of 741 Anne Arundel County residents conducted April 5 to 14 by Anne Arundel Community College and the Center for the Study of Local Issues found that issues related to the economy, housing and crime as well as growth and development were key problems facing the county.

The survey asked residents to identify the **“most important problem facing the residents of Anne Arundel County at the present time.”** The percentage saying the **economy** rose to 26%, with the cost of **housing** right behind at 24%. The percentage citing **crime** decreased from 36% last fall to 22% this spring. Coupled with significant percentages saying use of illegal drugs (14%), the crime/drugs duo was cited by 36%.

The survey explored the issue of **crime**, finding that at the neighborhood level (both the neighborhood and county overall were asked) the most commonly experienced type of crime was “cybercrimes” such as identity theft, computer hacking or telephone scams (28% reported experiencing this within the last year), which was deemed the most significant problem at the neighborhood level (52%). The second most experienced crime was theft (16%) whose neighborhood significance (36%) was about on par with personal assault (37%), gunshots/shootings (39%), drug dealing (40%) and illegal drug consumption (42%). When asked again at the level of the county, the latter two were the most cited as significant (47%, 51%).

The survey found that regarding neighborhood crime, most people said that “personal experience” (59%) was “very important” as a way of **finding out about incidences of crime**, which was higher than “word of mouth” (34%) or crime reporting on newspapers, newsletters, radio, or TV (39%). When information sources were asked at the county level, fewer people mentioned personal experience (45%) and somewhat more said “crime reporting on newspapers, newsletters, radio or TV” (44%).

The survey covered other county issues such as awareness of the **revision of the General Development Plan and county provided tools** to keep up with land use and zoning issues. When asked about their awareness about the process of revising the General Development Plan, only 27% said that they had a high awareness of the process, with another 35% saying a “moderate” awareness. There was a significant percentage saying that they were highly concerned “about how it might affect you and your community” (46%) or “how it might affect the county’s quality of life” (53%). Relatively few were aware of online tools such as the “land use navigator” (23%) or the zoning classification guide (20%). Awareness was highest for community land use meetings (43%). Relatively few had made use of any of these tools – or attended related meetings.

The **plastic bag ban** got mixed reviews. A bit more than a third (36%) supported it completely, while 22% supported it somewhat.

The **collapse** of the **Francis Scott Key bridge** had an economic adverse effect on a quarter of the sample while the absence of the bridge would be inconvenient to 41%.

Some **political contests** were also reviewed. Congressman David **Trone** had a 6-point lead among the county's likely voters over Prince George's County Executive Angela **Alsobrooks**. Both would lose by double digits (17-18 percentage points) to Larry **Hogan** if the general election were currently taking place. Many voters are still undecided, leaving plenty of room for campaign effects.

The same could be said for the race for the **3<sup>rd</sup> congressional district** seat being vacated by John Sarbanes. That district encompasses parts of Anne Arundel County and Carroll County as well as the entirety of Howard County. Our survey did not go beyond voters in Anne Arundel County. With that in mind, it seems that State Senator Sarah **Elfreth** (29%) had a wide lead over challengers, with legislative district 32 Delegate Mark **Chang** at 8% and former Capitol policeman Harry **Dunn** at 7%. Joe **Biden** would win handily if the presidential election were "today" having a 16-point lead over Donald Trump.

There was some attention paid to **international affairs**, such as aid to **Israel** and **Ukraine** as well as opinions about the Israel/Palestinian situation more generally.

The survey covered some new issues such as the **use** of **smartphones**, **social media** and **video games** as well as their impact on **mental health and time management**. There was also some analysis of the impact of **artificial intelligence** on future jobs and careers, as well as how respondents have used AI at this time.

The **summary of main findings** (p. 3) outlines in greater detail these and other survey results found in this press release. A **detailed review** which explores the survey results in depth follows the summary. **The actual questionnaire and percentages can be found in Appendix A** (pp. 140-169). Open-ended comments offered by online respondents can be found in **Appendices B-S** (see p. 12 for page numbers and topics).

## **Methodology**

The survey polled a random sample of 741 county residents who were at least 18 years old. Interviewing was conducted online primarily using a database of members of the AACC/CSLI web panel who have been recruited when conducting previous telephone interviews. Students participated in the selection of topics and analysis of results as well as respondents to the survey. There was also outreach to other residents through the assistance of the EyeOnAnnapolis.com and a purchased email list of county residents. The survey was in the field from April 5 to 14. There was about a 3.5% statistical margin of error; the error rate was higher for subgroups such as "Democrats" or "men." The dataset was weighted by gender, political party, age, race, council district and education to better represent the general population.

## Summary of Main Findings

### Most Important Problem Facing County Residents

The rise of concern among items like housing, the environment and land use/infrastructure, the economy, crime and drugs, education, and the relative decline of concern about COVID-19 are key findings from this question. Additional details are available in the text (pp. 14-21). Open-ended “other” answers are in Appendix B.

### Right Direction/Wrong Direction

The percentage of those saying that the **county** was moving in the right direction rose from 40% last fall to 43% this spring. Regarding the **state**, there was a similar 2-point increase from 40% to 42% saying “right direction.” The percentage applicable to the **country** also featured a rise from 11% in fall to 17% this spring. (pp. 22-30).

### Rating Economic Conditions - County, State and Country

For the **county**, the percentage saying “excellent” or “good” dropped somewhat from 57% to 51%, staying in the 50 percent range as it has since fall 2020 – the first poll after the clear start of the COVID-19 pandemic. At the **state** level, there was a more dramatic decline from 50% last fall to only 41% this spring, although there too, the figure has hovered close to 50 percent since the start of the pandemic. The **federal** level had reached a low of 15% in fall 2020 – but has seen **steady increases** since. In spring 2023 “excellent+good” score rose to 20%; in fall 2023 it was 25%, with a 2-point rise in spring 2024 to 27% (see pp. 31-39).

### Expectations for the National Economy

The percentage of those saying that the economy will **improve** in the future was **up by 9 points** from 20% last fall compared to 29% this spring. The “get worse” percentage (39%) reached its lowest point since spring 2021 when it was 34% (pp. 40).

### National Economy Concerns

A new question was added in spring 2022 that asked respondents to express their level of concern about various economic conditions. At that time, concern over **inflation** topped the list (58% saying “very concerned”); this worsened to 71% in fall 2022 and was essentially unchanged spring 2023 (69%) and fall 2023 (67%). This spring **the percentage dropped to 58%**, its lowest level in two years.

There were some other small changes – unemployment concerns dropped two points (26% to 24%); there was a 3-point drop in concern over the federal debt (59% to 56%). There were some rises from last fall in business climate (26% to 31%) and excessive private debt (52% to 55%) For details, see p. 41-45.

## **Economic Conditions Applying to Respondents**

While the level of concern over inflation seemed to edge down this spring, this was not very obvious when looking at respondents' views of specific economic conditions applying to them. For example, the percentage saying that it was **“hard to afford food and groceries”** rose from 37% to 51%. **“Hard to afford the cost of education** beyond high school” rose from 30% to 39%. There was a small rise in the percentage of those saying that “Health care insurance is unavailable, too expensive, or inadequate” from 34% to 37%. However, the **two items** that most directly measure inflationary worries – “Wages or salaries are not rising as fast as the cost of living” and “Taxes are too high in relation to the government services provided” both rose from 58% to only 59% - not indicative of much rising concern about inflation – albeit, from an already high level of concern. An analysis was conducted that highlighted the **higher incidences of adverse economic circumstances** among those earning under \$75,000 (pp. 46-53).

## **Ability for Young People to Find Good Jobs or Careers**

**One third** (33%) said that it was **“very hard”** for young people to find good jobs or careers, with another 52% saying “somewhat hard.” Younger respondents tended to believe that it was harder than the overall sample – very hard scores were 42% for those 18-29 and 55% for those 30-39. Those 40 or more were less pessimistic (29%). See p.54.

## **Familiarity and Use of Artificial Intelligence, Impact on Job/Career Choices Next 20 Years**

Only 26% said that they had both **heard of artificial intelligence** tools like ChatGPT and **used them**, while 62% had heard about them but had not used them. **Younger people** and those from **higher incomes** were more likely to have used AI tools. The most common use was for **research** (16% said “several times, frequently). Appendix C includes other uses for artificial intelligence tools mentioned by the respondents. See pp.54-55 for details.

## **Coronavirus Section**

There is a much more limited treatment of COVID-19 issues than in the past – essentially limited to asking about years that people contracted it (only 3% thus far in 2024 compared to 22% in 2023), and whether they failed to test themselves when symptoms arose - 21% mentioned not testing themselves. See p. 56.

## **County Issues**

### **Crime in Neighborhoods and County-wide**

This was a section in the questionnaire that focused on perceptions of and experiences with crime both at the neighborhood and county levels. The **most commonly experienced** type of crime was **“cybercrimes”** such as identity theft, computer hacking or telephone scams (28% reported experiencing within the last year), which was deemed the **most significant problem** at

the neighborhood level (52%). The second most experienced crime was **theft** (16%) whose neighborhood significance (36%) was about on par with **personal assault** (37%), **gunshots/shootings** (39%), **drug dealing** (40%) and **illegal drug consumption** (42%). When asked again at the level of the county, the latter two were the most cited as significant (47%, 51%).

The survey found that with regard to neighborhood crime, most people said that “**personal experience**” (59%) was “very important” as a basis for answering the question about significance, which was higher than “**word of mouth**” (34%) or **crime reporting on newspapers**, newsletters, radio or TV (39%). Not very many people mentioned online information from **social media or phone apps** (23%). When information sources were asked at the county level, fewer people mentioned personal experience (45%) and somewhat more said “crime reporting on newspapers, newsletters, radio or TV” (44%). Word of mouth dropped to 30%. “Social media/apps” was unchanged (24%).

When asked if they had been a **victim of crime** over the last year, **80%** said no. Another 9% said that they had but “didn’t report the crime.” Seven percent said that they reported the crime but “there wasn’t any criminal investigation” with another 2% saying they reported the crime and it was resolved; about an equal percentage (3%) said that they reported the crime and it wasn’t resolved. An analysis of crime experience and resolution indicated that **African Americans** were much more likely to experience crime, with higher percentages saying that they weren’t satisfied with the resolution.

An **open-ended comment section** about “what could be done to best improve the safety and security of people living in Anne Arundel County” was **analyzed using ChatGPT** which categorized responses into these categories: Police, law enforcement, justice system (36%); community engagement and support (24%); addressing socioeconomic factors (17%); gun control and legislation (5%) and other suggestions (18%). The verbatim comments are in Appendix D. See pp. 57-63.

## **Plastic Bag Ban**

The public was divided about the ban imposed by county legislation upon the use of plastic bags and allowing stores to charge for paper bags. Just over one-third (36%) supported it completely, with another 22% supporting it “somewhat.” One-quarter opposed it completely. Another 15% offered another response – see Appendix E for verbatim comments. This topic is covered in p. 64.

## **General Development Plan – Awareness and Concerns, Use of Land Use/Rating Online Tools and Community Meetings**

When asked about their **awareness of the process of revising the General Development Plan**, only **27%** said that they had a **high** awareness of the process, with another 35% saying a “moderate” awareness. There was a large percentage (46%) saying that they were **highly concerned** “about how it might affect **you and your community**” or “how it might affect the county’s **quality of life**” (53%).

The survey mentioned “various **tools to keep the public** informed about **land use and zoning** issues. Awareness was highest for “**community land use meetings**” (43%). Other tools were **much lower awareness scores**: “land use navigator online tool” (23%); “development activity online tool” (20%) and zoning classification guide (26%). In most cases, only **half** of those who claimed to be aware of the tool had **actually used** it. Positive ratings were greater than negative ones, but most were “neutral.”

## **Discrimination Against Certain Groups**

A section of the survey asked respondents to evaluate the **level of discrimination** (using a 100-point slider) experienced by certain groups such as African Americans (51%), transgendered and gender nonconforming people (50%), women (38%) and Hispanics (46%). See pp.68-69 for a complete list of categories and results.

## **State Issues**

### **State Budget Approaches**

The survey focused on three approaches **to solving the budget shortfalls** anticipated in formulating the state budget for fiscal year 2024-25. The first approach mentioned **increasing some taxes and fees** to ensure program funding (22%); the second focused on **lowering the sales tax** but extending it to **services** (22%); the last choice advocated “**avoiding any increase in taxes** and reducing funding to transportation and education” 20%. There is an analysis by party registration in this section. See pp. 70-71. Appendix G contains the many verbatim comments contributed by respondents.

### **Collapse of Francis Scott Key Bridge**

The collapse of the bridge happened shortly before the spring survey was in the field, so three questions were added to the survey. The first asked whether “**you will be negatively affected economically** by this event” (25%, yes); the second asked whether “**you will be inconvenienced** by the loss of the bridge (41%, yes); the last asked “Do you have **confidence** that the bridge will be **rebuilt relatively quickly**?” (38%). See pp. 72-73 for details.

Appendix H contains open-ended comments about the bridge and any other state issues.

### **National Issues: Impact of Events in Positively Impacting Civil Rights for African Americans**

The survey listed **a set of events** that could be perceived in terms of having significant positive impact upon the **civil rights of African Americans**. Two events were judged as having a very significant impact: “The Supreme Court decision to end ‘**separate by equal**’ in schools in 1954” (74% said very significant) and “The passage of the **Voting Rights Act** in 1965” (78%). Much

smaller percentages felt the same about “The election of Barack **Obama** as president” (42%); “The emergence of the **Black Lives Movement**” (30%) and “The emergence of **diversity, equity and inclusion** programs in public institutions and private companies” (37%). A breakdown by party and race is offered – see pp.74-75 Appendix I includes open-ended comments.

### **Most Serious National Issue – Open vs. Closed-ended Question Formats/ChatGPT**

The survey asked an **open-ended** question about “what is **the most serious national issue** facing residents of the United States at the present time?” This was coupled with another section later in the survey that offered **closed ended choices**. Using ChatGPT, open-ended answers were grouped into four top categories: **border security** and immigration control (30%); **economic challenges** 26%); **political dysfunction** and partisanship (22%) and **national security** (18%). The **closed ended** choices offered **mostly similar priorities**: two highly rated choices were similar to political dysfunction (harm by having the other party’s candidate be elected 57%) and threats to democracy (44%), along with immigration (44%) and inflation/cost of living (45%). **ChatGPT did not identify abortion as a top issue among the comments, even though it was a leading issue among those choosing from close-ended choices (43%)**. See pp. 108-109 details and Appendix J for the verbatim comments.

### **International Issues**

#### **Threats posed by China, Russia, Military Strength, Climate Change, Focus on Domestic Affairs and Less Foreign Relations**

The spring 2024 survey included a battery of questions asked several times in the recent past. These questions focused mostly on international affairs. The first focused on the seriousness of the “rising economic and military threat posed by **China**.” The percentage saying “very serious” increased from 63% last fall to 67% this spring. Republicans were more likely to say very serious (71%) compared to Democrats 52%). Threats posed by **Russia** and **climate change** both received the same scores (55%), but the latter was much more **divisive** (83% Democrats, 19% Republicans) compared to Russia (65%, 51%). Other than for climate change, **younger people** were less likely to see most international situations as threatening as did older people. See details on pp. 76-82 for a detailed analysis.

#### **Aid to Ukraine and Israel; Israel’s Military Strategy/Approach in Dealing with Palestinians**

The survey was in the field **prior** to the passage of legislation providing military assistance to Ukraine, Israel and Taiwan, so the agreement for providing aid was not contextualized by any recent success in a bipartisan effort to pass such legislation.

Aid to **Ukraine was much more favored** (47%, agree completely, 29% agree somewhat) **than** was **aid to Israel** (24%, 34%).

That aid to Israel would be somewhat less favored parallels the results for the next question which asked, “Which of the following best expresses your views of **Israel’s strategy and military operation in the Gaza Strip?**” The first choice was, “Israel has done what it needed to do to defeat Hamas (28%). The second choice received the greatest support (40%): “Israel has a right to defend itself but has caused too many civilian casualties in Gaza. The last choice was the least accommodating to Israel: “Israel should have more actively pursued a two-state solution for the Palestinian people, perhaps avoiding the attack by Hamas and the subsequent destruction of Gaza (33%).

See pp. 83-86 for the main analysis about aid, pp. 87-88 regarding Israel’s strategy and operation in Gaza. There are two open-ended options in this section, one for specific comments about Israel/Gaza/Hamas (Appendix K) and another for any question in the section of international affairs (see Appendix L).

## **Politics, Sources of Information**

The last major section of the survey focused on politics and elections. It first asked about **how people find out about news** dealing with government and politics. The top choices (percentage saying, “quite or very often”) were: “**Online, cable or broadcast sources of mainstream media** like CNN, MSNBC or Fox news” (44%) and “online or hard copy sources of **newspapers** like Washington Post or Baltimore Sun or Banner, Maryland Matters” (42%). Various **social media** options were also listed, with Facebook (18%), Instagram (16%) and YouTube (16%) being the most cited. Among **younger people** between 18-29, **Instagram (38%), TikTok (33%) and YouTube (27%)** were the most cited. Among those **70 or over**, newspapers (59%) and television news (57%) were much more likely to be cited compared to Facebook (12%) or TikTok (3%). See pp. 89-92 for details.

### **“Stolen elections”**

There was a repetition of a question asked the last few surveys about whether respondents felt the 2020 presidential elections had been “stolen” from Trump. There has **not been much movement** in this percentage recently: it was 21% last fall and 18% this spring. The analysis of this variable shows that about **one-half of Republicans accept** the stolen election claim, but only 20% of unaffiliateds and a tiny percentage of Democrats. Some three-quarters of those who claim to be “**very conservative**” accept the stolen election argument compared to under one-third of those saying that they are “somewhat conservative.” Moderates are close to Democrats: 7% vs. 2%. See pp. 93-97.

## **Goals of Trump’s Prosecution**

A **majority** of respondents (57%) thought that the reason why Donald Trump was facing his various court challenges was “**to hold him accountable** for various crimes” rather than “**to disrupt his campaign** and prevent him from running effectively for president (36%). Nearly all Democrats favored the accountability argument (89%), while this was true for only a minority of Republicans (19%). See pp. 98.



## 2024 Presidential Elections: Biden or Trump in 2024?

The survey asked, “If the presidential elections were today, for whom would you vote?” **Biden had a 16-point lead over Trump**, a substantial increase from the 9-point lead last fall. See Appendix O for open-ended answers and pp. 99-101 for the main analysis.

## U.S. Senate

As with other polls previously referenced, the CSLI poll showed David **Trone** (34% likely voters) **leading** Angela **Alsobrooks** (28%) in the race to become the Democratic nominee for the Senate seat being vacated by incumbent Ben Cardin. About one-third of the voters were still undecided, leaving room for movement between the candidates.

When asking voters to choose between likely Republican nominee Larry **Hogan** and either of the two **Democratic opponents**, the latter was clearly **behind**: Trone was behind by 18 points. The results for Alsobrooks were nearly identical: behind by 17 points. There were more “unsure” Democrats and unaffiliateds, so the possibility that either of the two Democrats can pose a significant challenge will probably increase once a nominee is chosen.

A follow-up question tried to emphasize the implications of a Hogan win upon the balance of power in the Senate. The question was asked “What is your **preference for the outcome** of the U.S. **Senate** elections in November – the Senate **controlled by Democrats** or by **Republicans**.” The results were clear: the **sample preferred Democrats** (49%) over Republicans (33%). Following up, the question, asked whether they still favored Hogan over a generic Democratic candidate – the results **narrowed the gap from around 18 points to just 2 points**. See p. 102-104.

## Congressional District 3

As John Sarbanes is retiring from Congress, this opens the 3<sup>rd</sup> congressional district seat. Some **22 Democrats** have signed up, offering a challenge to effectively survey the public about their preferences. Moreover, that seat is divided between Anne Arundel, Howard and a part of Carroll counties; **our survey is limited only to Anne Arundel County** and thus cannot anticipate how voters’ views might differ in the other parts of that jurisdiction. In any case, it could be expected that candidates who are currently elected officials within the county would lead among voters, and that was largely the case. State Senator **Sarah Elfreth led the field with 29%** of the vote. Her two closest competitors were **Delegate Mark Chang (8%)** and retired Capitol policeman **Harry Dunn 7%**. A survey produced by Dunn’s own campaign showed the race as essentially between Elfreth and himself. Among **Republicans**, no candidate really stands out as they are all with 5% of the Republican vote or less, with 71% saying “unsure.” For details, see pp. 105-107.

## Issues and Candidates

This section uses just the **results for the closed-ended questions ranking issue saliency** and looks at a comparison of how **salient issues** were by **parties** and **candidates**. As mentioned, the top issue was “the **harm to the country** should the other party’s candidate win” with 57% citing

it. The **economy** was second (45%) followed by **immigration** (44%), January 6/**threats to democracy** (44%) and **abortion** (43%).

From a partisan perspective, **Republicans'** top issues were immigration (68%), inflation (55%), “harm to the country” if other candidate won (53%) and crime (46%). **Democrats'** top issues were “harm to the country” if other candidate won (68%), January 6/threats to democracy (62%), climate change (51%) and guns/healthcare (both 49%). See pp. 108-112.

The analysis then compared **issue saliency for some candidates**. Some discoveries were: **Alsobrooks'** voters were more likely to strongly favor Democrats' top priorities like abortion, guns, healthcare, and racism compared to **Trone's voters**. **Hogan** voters were likely to favor **Republican issues** like immigration, crime and the cost of living but with relatively low percentages in most cases. This implied that **Hogan supporters were less “issue voters”** and more attracted to the personality and image that Hogan has fostered over the years of being “moderate” and “not very partisan.” The analysis of that race is on pp. 113-114.

Comparing Elfreth and Dunn also produced some interesting results. On average, Dunn's voters were more issue oriented than Elfreth's. They seemed especially animated by “threats to democracy” (86% vs. 39%) and “the harm to the country should the other party's candidate win” (94% vs. 81%). There were sizable saliency gaps on many other issues like health care (50%, 34%), foreign policy (54%, 31%), and racism (39%, 28%). The analysis of that race is on pp. 115-116. Appendix O includes comments about all voting choices considered in the survey.

## **Job Approval – Incumbents, Institutions**

**Job Approval for the President, Governor and County Executive:** For many years, the survey has asked about job approval for major executive positions. As president, **Joe Biden's** approval rose from last fall (41% to 48%) (see p. 117-119). See Appendix P for open-ended comments about Biden's job approval.

**Governor Wes Moore** has had a formidable challenge in rising to job approval percentages previously shown by Larry Hogan. Originally there was a 26-point gap between Hogan's last job approval percentage (75%) and Moore's first (49%). However, **Moore's job approval has risen** steadily to the point where the gap is now just 16 points (59%). See pp. 120-122. See Appendix Q for open-ended comments about Moore's job approval.

**County Executive Stuart Pittman's** approval score was **essentially unchanged** from last fall – moving down one point from 46% to 45% (pp. 123-125). See Appendix R for open-ended comments about Pittman's job approval.

## **Job Approval for County Council, Board of Education, Maryland General Assembly, Congress and the Supreme Court**

The survey included job approval questions for four legislative bodies: the Anne Arundel County Council (down two points at 44% approve); the Maryland General Assembly (unchanged at

42%); the Board of Education (nearly unchanged from last fall at 37% compared to 38% this spring); and Congress whose score improved modestly from 14% to 17%. The Supreme Court was unchanged from last fall – 36% approved. See pp. 126-130. See Appendix S for open-ended comments about other institutions’ job approval.

**Trust in Political Parties:** Trust in Democrats was nearly unchanged this spring (41% vs. 40% last fall). Republicans dropped a couple of points from 30% to 28% – forming a 13-point gap with Democrats. The “neither” score rose three points from 22% to 25% (see pp. 131-132).

### **Special Sections: Use and Impact of Smartphones, Social Media, and Video Games**

This survey included a special look at the use of smartphones, social media and video games. It found that 35% claimed to check their smartphones at least once every 30 minutes, with 59% saying at least once every hour. Young people under 30 checked more often than older groups. When asked to characterize the impact of smartphones, social media and video games, the highest negative score was for social media (43%) compared to phones (19%) or video games (17%). When asked to state the impact on time management, again social media was identified as the likeliest to have negative impacts (54%) compared to phones (41%) or video games (41%). See pp.133-136. Appendix M lists the video games users claimed to use the most.

### **Special Sections: Group Identities and Ideology**

This section of the survey asked people to indicate the strength of group identities. Their strongest identity was as “family members” (66%) followed by “job/career” (50%), age group (46%), and gender (44%). Those identifying ideologically as “very conservative” were exceptionally likely to identify with religion (72%) and family (75%). Just on the religious identity, this percentage was much higher than it was for somewhat conservatives (35%), moderates (36%) or liberals (somewhat 20%, very 30%). This finding illustrates the usually strong attraction of religion in shaping the content of the ideological views of those claiming to be very conservative. See pp. 137-139

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## **Methodology**

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# Detailed Review of Survey Findings

## The Most Important Problem Facing Residents – Economy, Housing and Crime Top the List

Table 1 shows the pattern of survey results over the last five surveys for the question “What are the two most important problems facing residents of Anne Arundel County at the present time?”<sup>1</sup>

<sup>1</sup> Prior to fall 2020, surveys only asked respondents to identify a single “most important problem facing residents of Anne Arundel County at the present time.” Given the inevitable primacy of the coronavirus as a key concern for several iterations of the survey, a change was made allowing respondents to offer the *two* most important problems.

One milestone reached in spring 2024 was the percentage citing “Coronavirus” – zero percent. As shown in Table 1, it had dropped from double digits one- and one-half years ago but this spring was the first time that it registered not even a single percentage point of concern.

Otherwise, the factors that dominated the public’s concern were well established: the economy (26%, up 3 points from fall 2023), housing costs (24%, up 7 pts.), crime (22%, down 14 pts.) and growth/overpopulation (20%, up 4 pts.).

Crime and education were those items to lose the most, while housing costs, growth, and transportation gained the most.

On average over the period since spring 2022, crime has been near or at the top of the list with the highest average score over the period (27%). The economy has had the second highest average score (24%), followed by growth/overpopulation and drugs – both at 19%.

A partner concern with crime was “drugs – the use or sale of illegal drugs...” which also dropped somewhat from 19% to 14%.

Bundling similar items together, crime/drugs combined for 36% of respondents’ top concerns; the economy and housing costs were 50%, while growth/overpopulation and transportation were 38% (more than 100% was possible given the option of choosing two top issues).

Other items of note were taxes (16%, down 3 pts.), healthcare (12%, up 4 pts.) and then environment (11%, up 2 pts.).

Graph 1 shows long-term patterns from spring 2012 to spring 2024.

Graph 1: Long-term Trends in Top Issues - Spring 2012 to Spring 2024

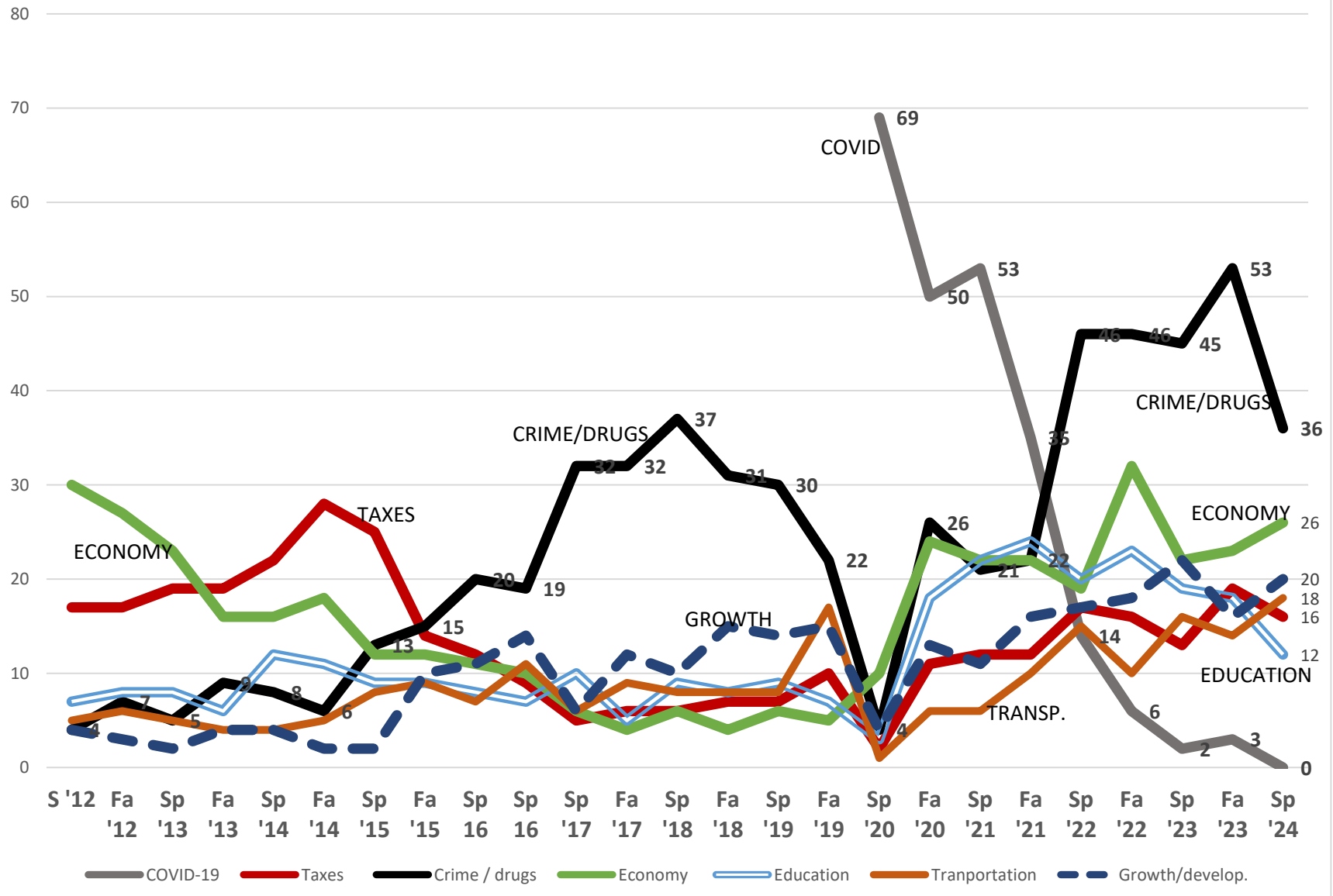




Table 2 lists all the items and ranks them by the percentage point difference between Democratic and Republican scores. For the most part and consistent with last fall, the largest differences varied along liberal/conservative lines, with Democrats much more likely to highlight issues like housing costs, transportation, the environment, healthcare, childcare, racism and the lack of government resources. By contrast, Republicans were more likely to focus on high taxes, crime, the prevalence of government waste, the economy, illegal drugs, and government ethics. The one area of congruence was about growth/overpopulation – 22% from both sides cited this as one of the most important problems.

Judging from the differences in percentages between Democrats and those saying that they were unaffiliated but registered to vote (hereafter “unaffiliateds”), there were areas of congruence where the gap in percentages citing an item as the most important problem was smallest: transportation, healthcare, childcare, racism, education, drugs and especially taxes. By contrast, there were other areas where the congruence was closer between unaffiliateds and Republicans: government lacks resources, government ethics, the economy and government

waste. A generalization might be that unaffiliateds tend to prioritize mostly the same specific areas of concern as Democrats but are more conservative about the role and efficacy of government and the state of the economy. Crime was the one issue where unaffiliateds were equidistant from both Democrats and Republicans – 8 points either way.

Graph 1a shows the net gap between Democrats and unaffiliateds. The percentages shown are calculated by subtracting the unaffiliated percentage from the Democratic one, and then subtracting from that the difference between Republican and unaffiliateds scores. A positive value indicates a Democratic lean.

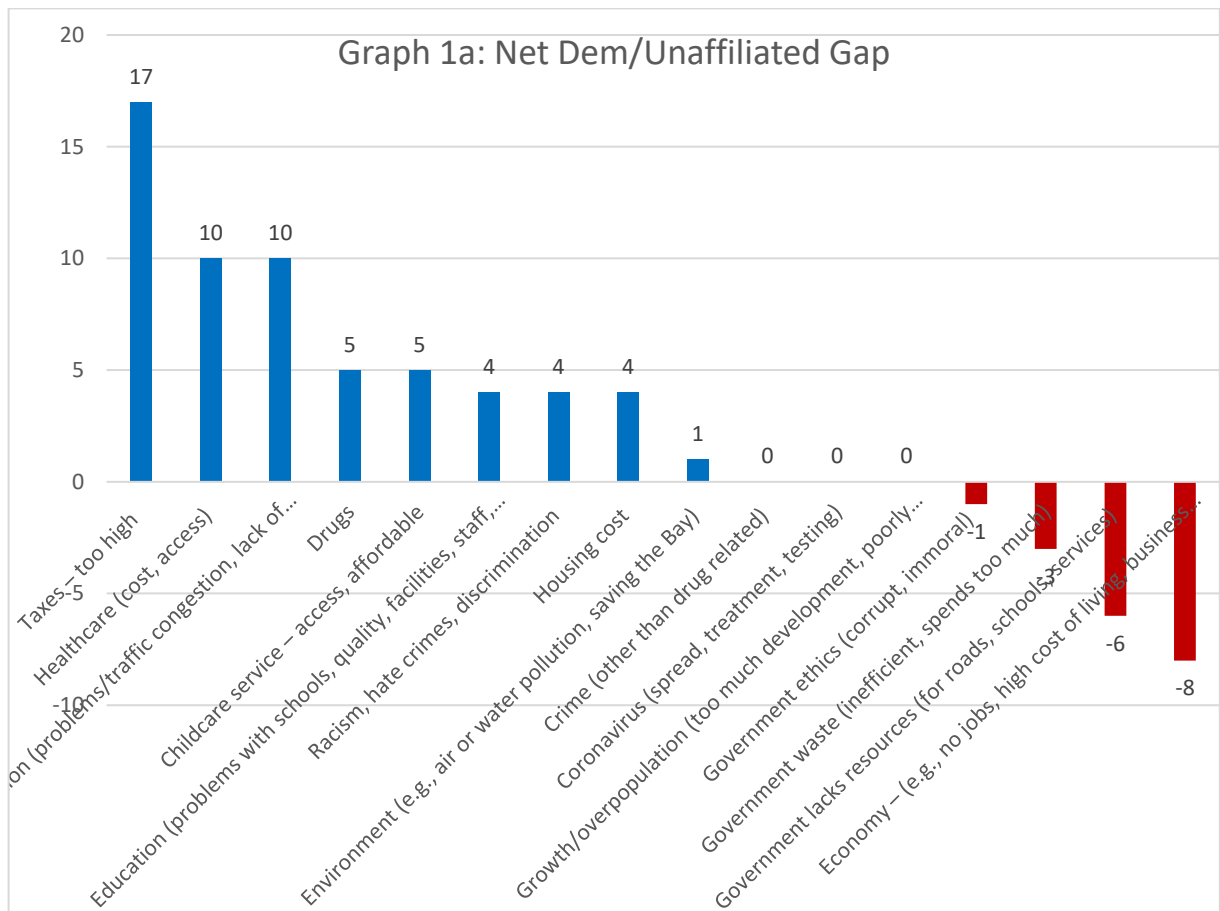


Table 3 shows the “most important problem” time-series in tabular format over an extended period of time (spring 2013 to spring 2024). Graph 2 highlights a subset of the same data visually. Graph 2 highlights the following elements:

- Prior to the emergence of the pandemic in spring 2020, crime was consistently the top concern among respondents.
- As the pandemic abated, crime returned as a top concern.
- Prior to the pandemic, the economy had not been a top concern, but it rose sharply beginning in spring 2020 and remained a top issue ever since.
- When inflation peaked in fall 2022, so did concern over the economy, but the level returned to a level more consistent with the pandemic period’s range (mid to low 20 percent) since spring 2023 with a small rise in spring 2024 from 23% to 26%.
- There has been some rise compared to the pre-pandemic period with concern about growth and development as well as transportation.
- The biggest fall in concern with COVID was between fall 2021 and spring 2022 when it dropped from 35% to 14%.
- Starting in fall 2022, concern with COVID had dropped to single digits – culminating this spring with no concern.

Some of these changes starting in fall 2020 might be attributed to the fact that respondents could start offering a second “most important problem” choice while this wasn’t possible previously.

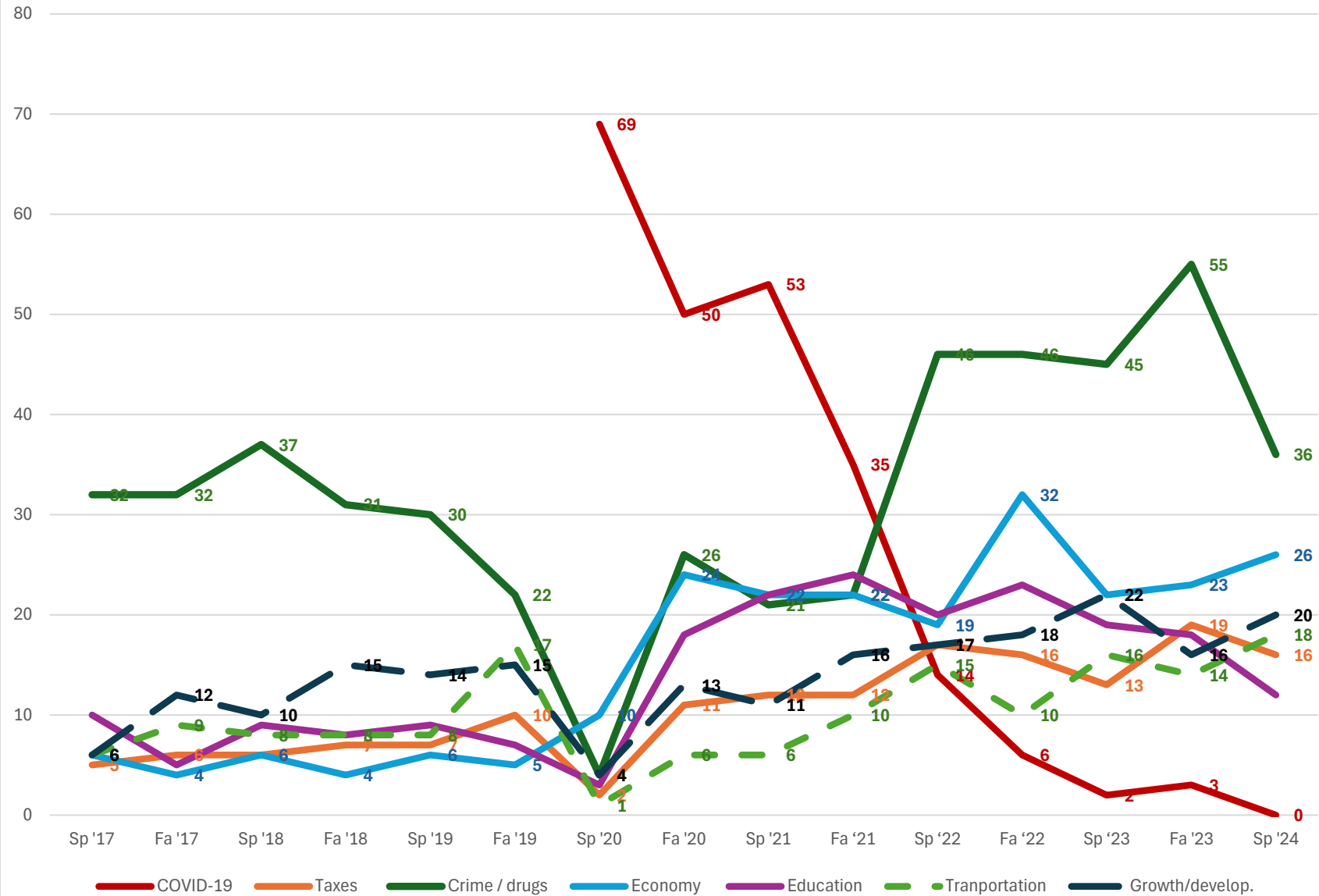
Some respondents mentioned other problems as their most important one – with immigration cited most often about the few who suggested an item. Open-ended comments about this can be found in Appendix B

Previously, that answer to the open-ended question would have been categorized under “economy” a practice which was resumed in fall 2010. By spring 2020, a separate break out of “housing cost” started – leading to a possible reduction of the value of “economy” insofar as housing would have been inserted within the economy percentage.

## County, State and Nation – Right or Wrong Direction?

### Anne Arundel County

Each survey includes a variety of benchmark questions – the “most important problem” has existed since the start of AACC/CSLI community surveys.<sup>3</sup> Other questions have been more recent – the “right or wrong direction” questions for the county, state and country are among this group. Shown on Table 4 and Graph 3 are the results just for the county: “Overall, would you say that the county is headed in the right direction or in the wrong direction?”

Based on the results shown in Table 4, it is apparent that the emergence of the COVID-19 pandemic had an enduring depressing impact on the “right direction” scores as they dropped from the mid-50s prior to fall 2020 to the low 40s since. As shown earlier, concern about COVID-19 has dropped to zero, yet positive views of the county have been slow to rise – even if it reached a pandemic high of 43% in spring 2024. However, the gap between right and wrong directions reached a peak of 12 points – although this still seems small compared to gaps of 20-40 percentage points pre-pandemic.

Graph 3 is especially vivid in depicting the dramatic fall in “right direction” perceptions that accompanied the emergence of the coronavirus pandemic. The bright spot is a general trend of improvement in “right direction” scores since a low point in spring 2023.

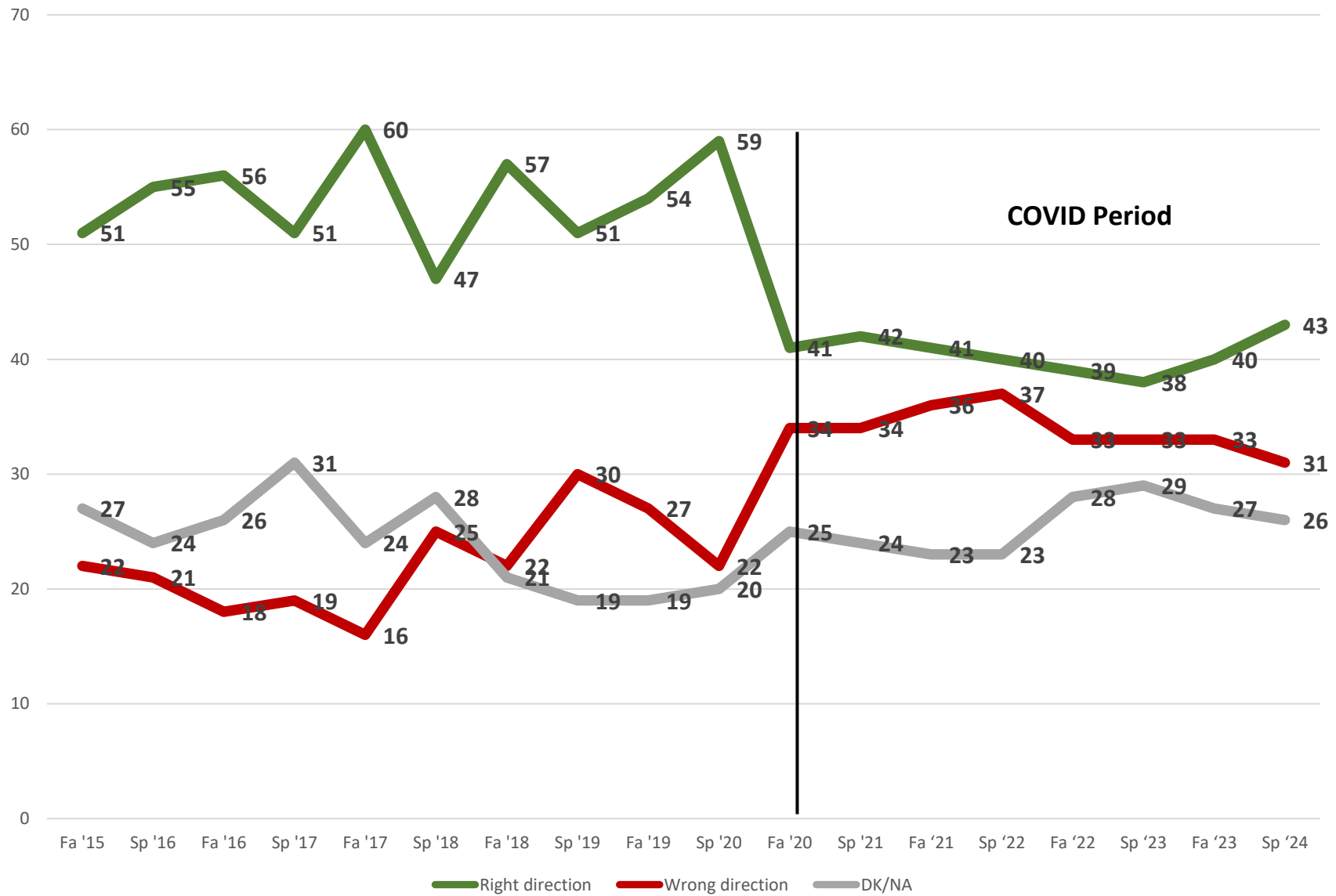

Finally, looking at the relationship between party or ideology and the right direction scores for the county (Table 5) reveals what might be expected: Democrats (63%) – especially those who claimed to be “strong Democrats” (75%) – and very/somewhat liberals (74%, 58%) were much more inclined to say that the county was heading in the right direction than were Republicans (19%), with “strong Republicans (7%) and conservatives (very 19%, somewhat 21%) especially pessimistic about the county’s direction.

Table 6 shows the relationship between partisanship and the direction of the county for eight surveys: fall 2020, spring/fall 2021, spring/fall 2022, spring/fall 2023 and spring 2024. Looking first at the Democrats, in fall 2019 the party score was 64% (unshown); the score in spring 2024 was highest since then at 63%. Among Republicans, the pattern is similar – the highest score was also in fall 2019 (49%) with most scores since dropping to the high-teens, mid-20 percent levels which is consistent with the spring 2024 score of 19%.

The bottom line is that the pandemic diminished the population’s perception of “things going right” – with the partisan divide echoing the party in power: in the case of Anne Arundel County, since 2018 the Democrats have held the county executive position and have had a legislative majority in the county council, with Democratic voters thus believing the situation to be much better than Republicans (or unaffiliated) voters.

The pattern by ideology (Table 5) was similar – liberals have been consistently much more likely to cite a high “right direction” than have conservatives. Moderates have been relatively fixed with scores only varying from a low of 38% in spring 2023 to a high of 44% (both spring 2022 and spring 2024).

## Right Direction: Maryland and United States

Focusing next on the state and nation as shown in Table 7 (which includes the county just for comparison), there was a continuation of the shift in previous patterns with the county now either leading or at parity with the state of Maryland in terms of right direction scores. This was partly due to the drop in right direction scores for Maryland that coincided with the replacement of Republican Governor Larry Hogan with Democrat Wes Moore – but a more significant impact was the emergence of the pandemic – as the sharp drop in both state and county “right direction” scores were notable from spring to fall 2020.

The scores for the nation have consistently been much lower than for either the county or the state. In spring 2020, the national score was 27 points lower than for the county and 38 points lower than for the state. By this spring, those values had moved a bit due to improvements in both county and national “right direction” scores, narrowing the gap from 29 to a 26-percentage point difference. The increase in the national scores from 11% to 17% was greater than the increase in state scores (40% to 42%) which resulted in a smaller gap – from 29 to 25 percentage points.

Table 7 and Graph 4 show that since a low point in spring 2023, scores have increased at all three levels.

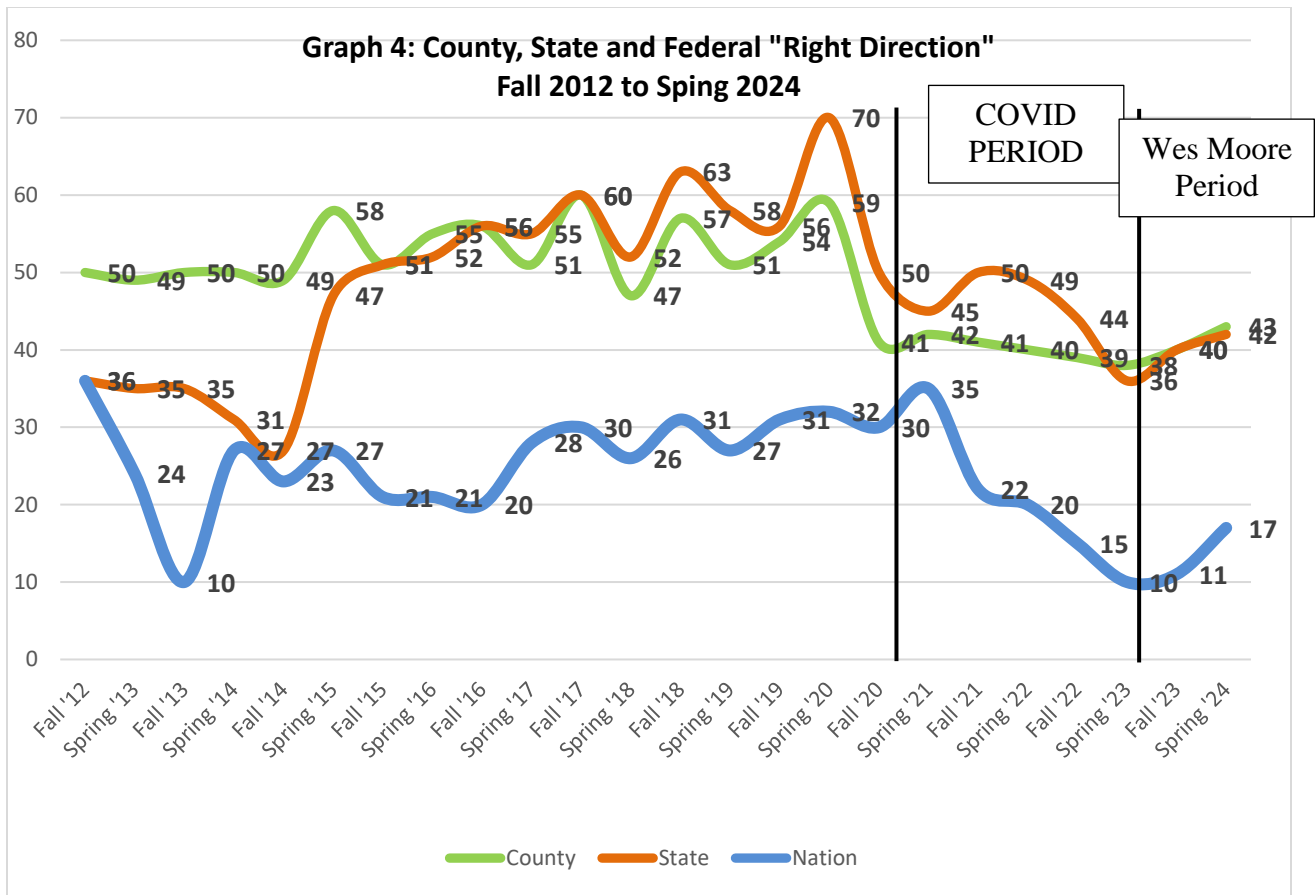
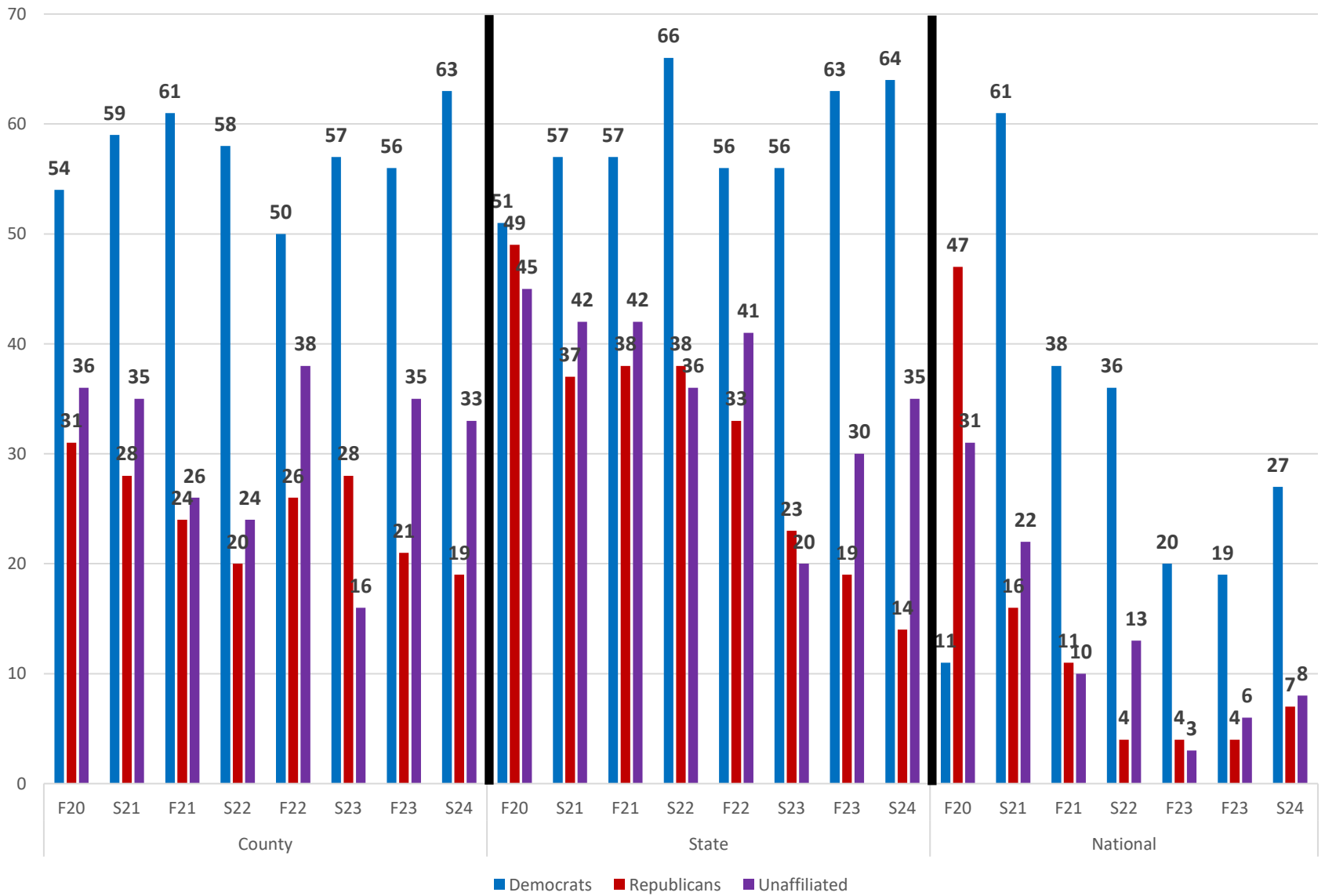


Table 8 and Graph 5 show that Democrats have remained more positive about the direction of all levels of government: the state (64% right direction) and the county (63%) as well as the nation (27%) than Republicans (14%, 19%, 4%) or unaffiliated voters (30%, 35%, 7%). Unaffiliated voters changed only slightly from last fall (35%, 33%, 8%). The impact of changing control over the executive was especially visible for Republicans after Trump's loss since their national right direction scores dropped from 47% in fall 2020 to just 16% in spring 2021. At the state level, Republicans had already expressed pessimism prior to the election of Democrat Wes Moore – having dipped from 49% right direction for Maryland in fall 2020 to just 37% in spring 2021. Trump's loss seemed to tarnish optimism about the state despite the continuance of Larry Hogan in power through 2022.

## Rating Economic Conditions – Anne Arundel County

Since March 2002, the CSLI/AACC semi-annual survey has asked a benchmark question about the economy: “How would you rate economic conditions in Anne Arundel County – ‘excellent,’ ‘good,’ ‘only fair’ or ‘poor’?”

As shown on Table 9a and Graph 6, the county’s combined scores for “good” and “excellent” have hovered somewhat above 50 percent even after the start of the pandemic although this was a fall from 65-75% prior to the pandemic’s start. There was a drop from last fall (57%) to this spring (51%), but the spring percentage was similar to those found since spring 2022.

Part of the explanation for the drop in the percentage saying either excellent or good for the county might be tied to the perception of economic impact resulting from the collapse of the Key Bridge. Among those saying that they would be impacted by the collapse, only 39% rated the county’s economy in a positive manner; among those denying that they would be impacted, the corresponding figure was 59% - a 20-point gap.

Another explanation might point more to partisan divisions. It was already the case that “right direction” scores were affected by partisanship. As shown in Table 9, partisan differences were evident and had been growing over time – from a 4-point gap in spring 2021 to a 23-point gap in fall 2023 – which continued in spring 2024, but at a lower overall level of support (e.g., for Democrats, 70% in fall, 61% in spring). An overlap in perceived negative impact from the bridge’s collapse and partisanship was displayed as only 24% of Democrats perceived a negative impact for themselves compared to 29% of Republicans. This suggests that part of the difference between Democrats and Republicans could be explained by a somewhat greater negative impact of the bridge’s collapse upon the latter. The overall perceived negative impact of the collapse of the bridge might account for the general lowering of economic conditions, with the notable exception that unaffiliateds were unchanged since last fall.

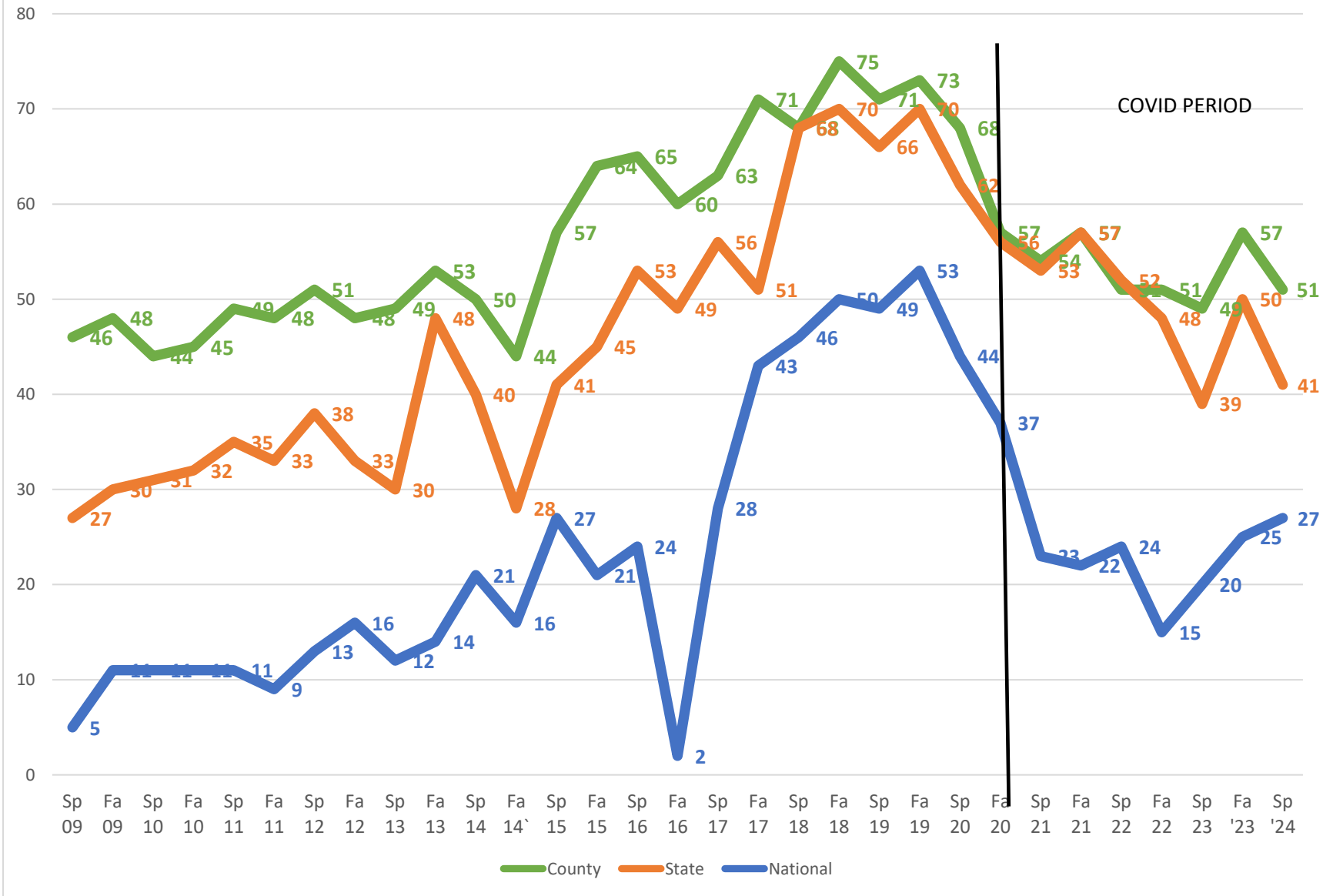

## **Rating Economic Conditions – Maryland**

Since spring 2009, the question about rating economic conditions has been extended to the state of Maryland and the country overall.

As shown on Table 10, the combined “excellent+good” scores have varied quite a bit – with a recent low of 39% (spring 2023) compared to a relative high for fall 2023 (50%). By this spring, the percentage was down 9-points to 41% - on the low end since the start of the pandemic.

Table 11 shows the partisan impact. The sharpest drop from fall 2023 to spring 2024 among the partisan categories was among Democrats – falling 16 points from 70% to 54%. This was much larger than drops among Republican (-8 points) or unaffiliateds (-7). The Democratic and Republican scores were among the lowest since the start of the pandemic period and well below averages since fall 2019.

## Rating Economic Conditions –The National Economy

As shown on Graph 6, the appraisal of the *national* economy has always lagged significantly behind both the *county* and *state*. For this spring, Graph 7 and Table 13 show that there was a continuation of some positive change – a 2-point increase in excellent+good scores from 25% to 27%. The COVID period has essentially paralleled the situation prior to 2017 when economic perceptions hovered in a similar range as during the recent past.

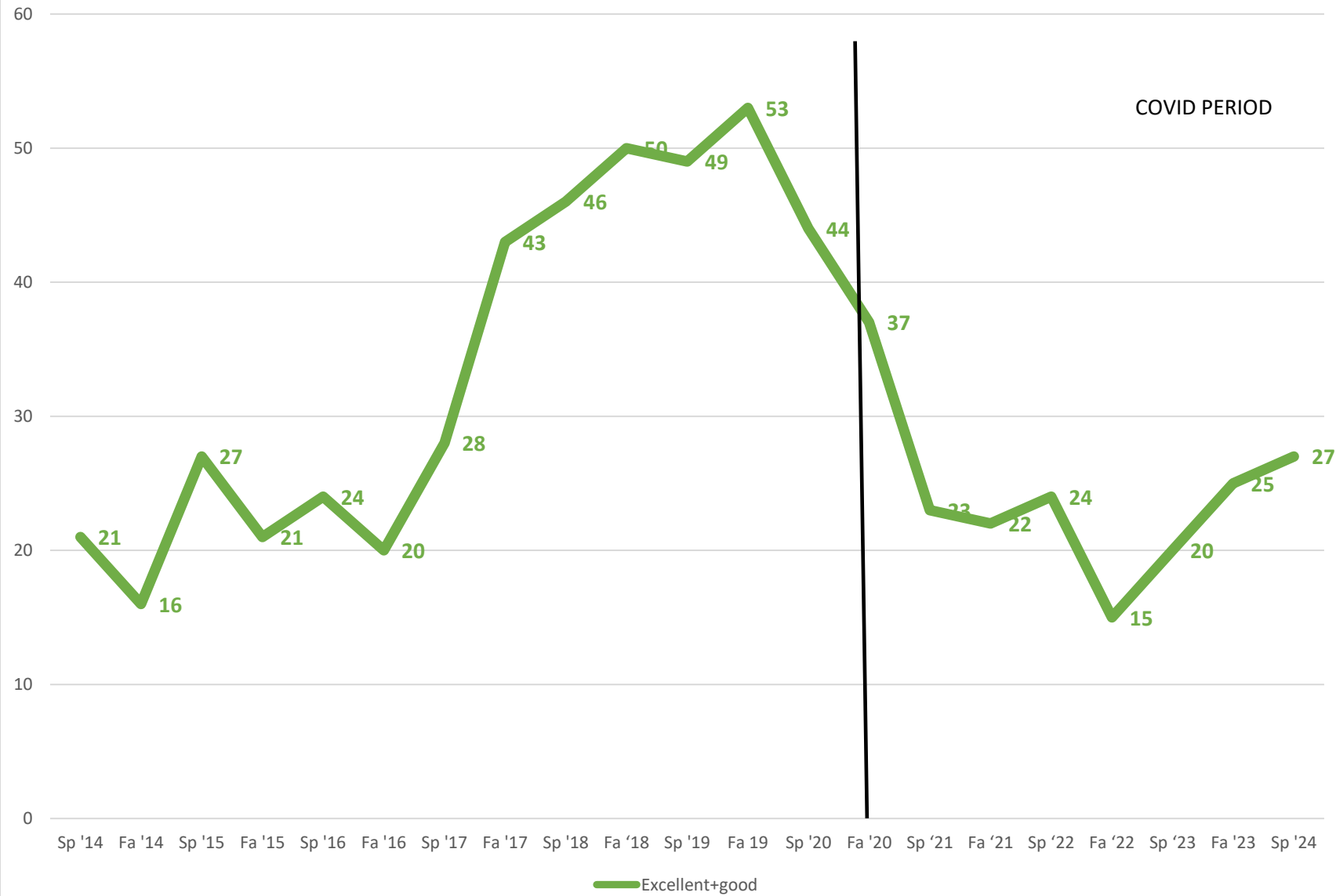
Looking at the results by party registration on Graph 8, Republicans enjoyed the economy as it performed under then President Trump – with fall 2019 gaining a score of 72%. One year later, the decline in percentages was already apparent, as the Republican score dipped to 59%. The first poll after President Biden had taken over highlighted the darkened view of the economy held by Republicans as the score declined dramatically to only 24%. In fall 2023, Republicans offered their lowest score yet: 8%. Marginal improvement among Republicans was seen this spring as the percentage rose to 15%. The percentage among unaffiliateds also rose from 13% to 19%.

Unsurprisingly, Democrats held consistently lower scores during the Trump period – 32 points lower than Republicans in fall 2019 and 37 points lower in fall 2020 prior to the 2020 presidential elections. Fall 2023 was the first time that Democrats’ total (42%) was higher than it was in fall 2019 (40%) when Donald Trump was still in office. By spring 2024, Democrats had reverted again to their 2019 percentage – 40%.

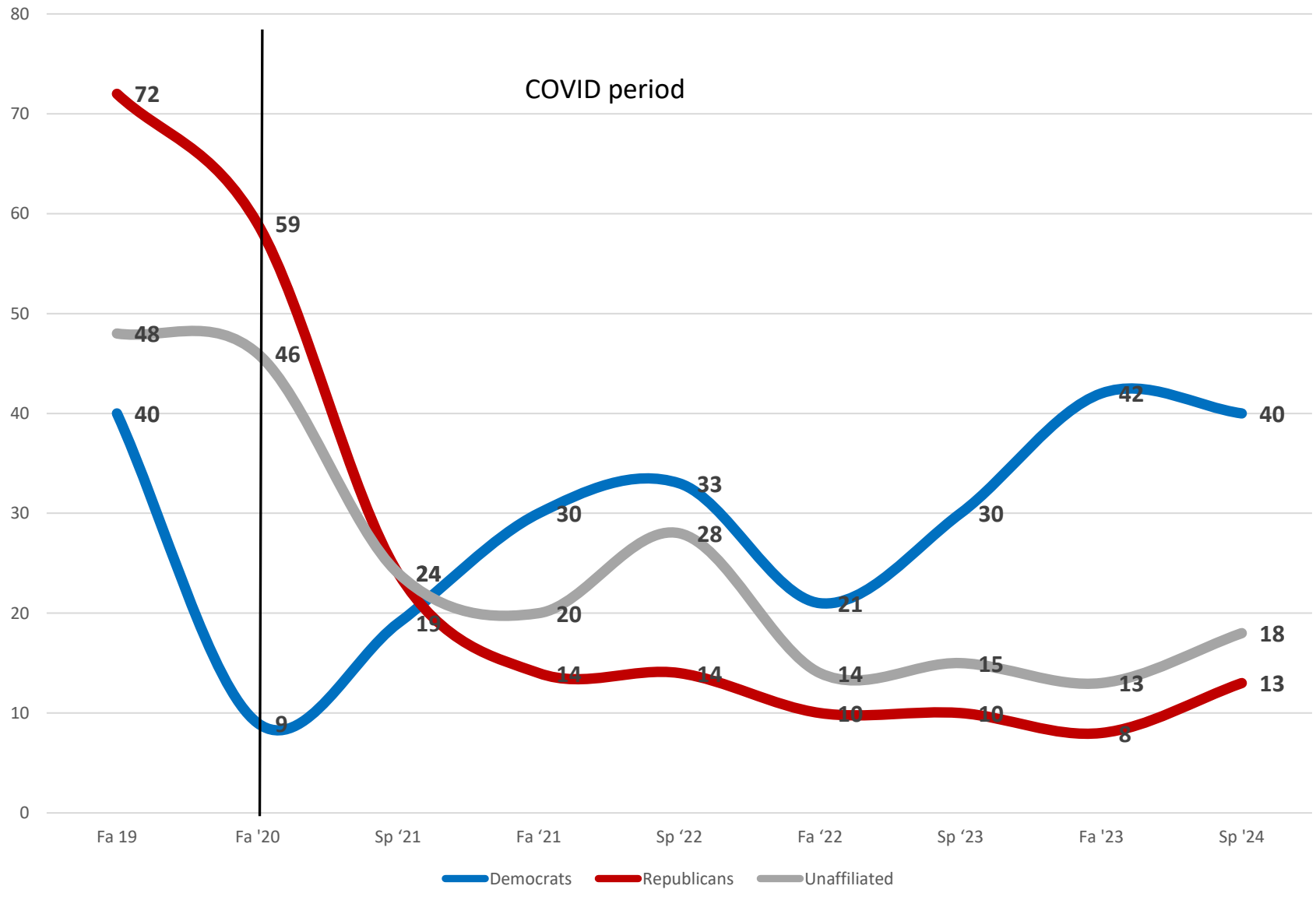

## Expectations for the National Economy

The question for this section was: “Thinking ahead for the next few years, do you expect the national economy to improve, stay the same or get worse?”

As displayed on Table 14, expectations for the national economy have been gradually improving, even if remaining low. In spring 2024, there was a 6-point rise in the “improve” score with other decreases in “stay the same” and “worse” scores. More people seemed unsure – up 7-points to 17%. Variance in this answer category has been quite notable over the years.

As was shown in the discussion about *perceptions* of the national economy, no political category was especially optimistic; regarding national economic *expectations* Table 15 shows the same to be true – the highest “improve” score was among Democrats at only 36% - slightly changed from last fall (32%). Republicans scores rose somewhat from 14% to 22% as did scores among unaffiliateds (rising from 12% to 18%).

## **Concern for Specific Economic Conditions Related to the National Economy**

The spring 2022 survey included a new section relevant to the national economy focusing on respondents' perceptions of factors such as inflation, unemployment, federal deficits and others when thinking about aspects of the national economy. Respondents were asked to say whether they were very, somewhat or not very concerned about the factors identified in Table 16. Graph 10 displays results for the last five surveys. Note that the spring 2023 survey added "excessive private debt" as a new category. In spring 2024, "Lack of opportunities to be upwardly mobile" was also added.

As Table 16 demonstrates, the concern for inflation remained high, even if down from 67% to 58% saying that they were "very concerned." Among the other items, federal debt/deficit was the second most cited item, with a very concerned score of 56% down 3 points from last fall.

Overall, there wasn't much change in scores for other items. Concern about unemployment remained the item with the lowest level of concern at 24%. All others hovered in the mid-30 percent range.

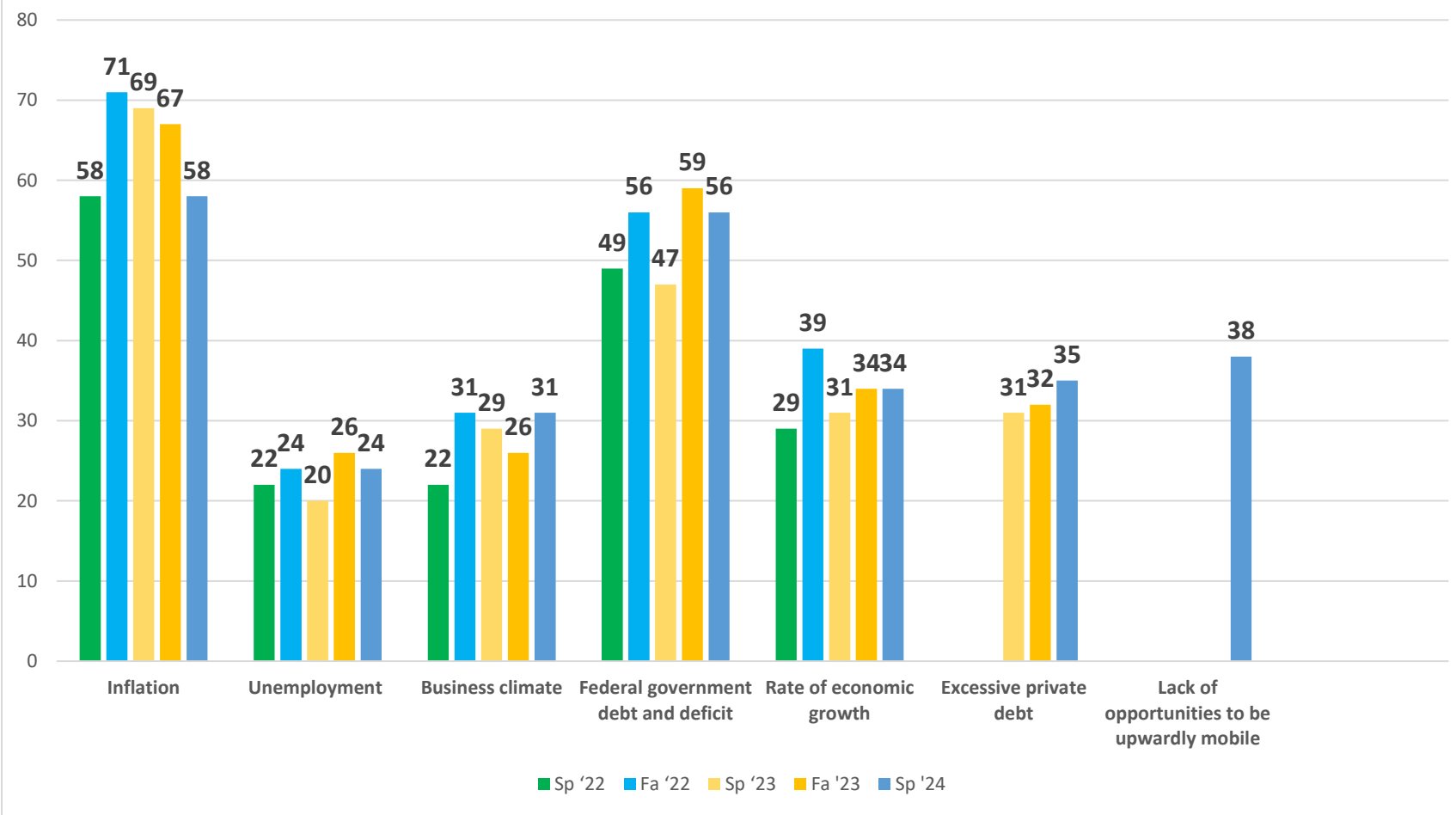

Graph 10: "Very Concerned" About Various Economic Conditions - Spring 2022 to Spring 2024

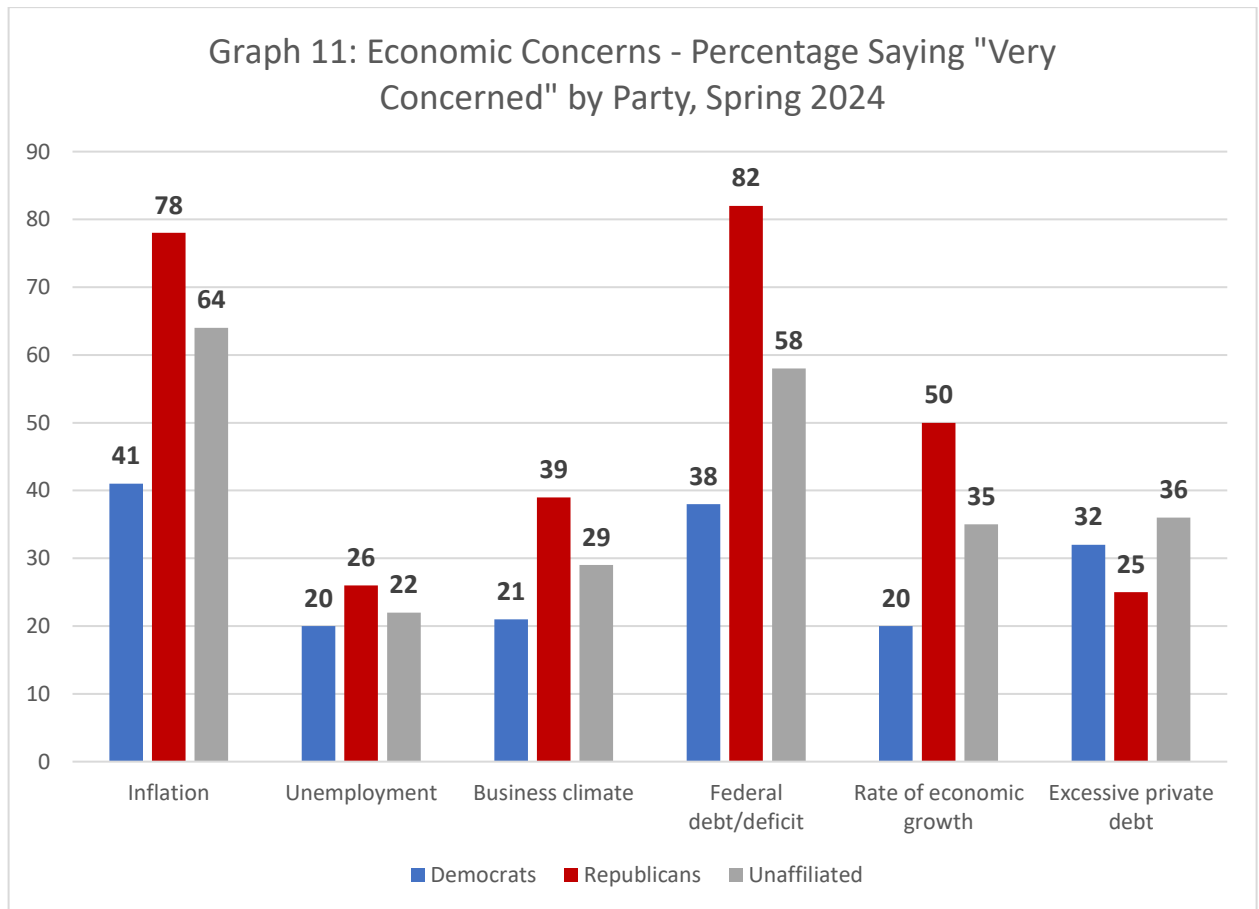


Looking at partisan divides on Table 17, among Democrats there was a sizable drop in the percentage saying that they were very concerned about inflation – from 53% to 41%. There was about an equal percentage of Democrats (42%) saying that they were very concerned about the “lack of opportunities to be upwardly mobile.” There were some other minor changes among Democrats as noted in the table, but many items had high concern scores between 20-30%. The jump in concern about federal debt and deficit seen last fall (from 26% in spring 2023 to 41% in fall 2023) was mostly sustained this spring (38%).

As shown in Table 17, for Republicans, levels of concern were consistently higher – average “very concerned” scores across all items were 19 percentage points higher for Republicans than Democrats. These differences were especially apparent for inflation (Republicans 78%; Democrats 41%) and federal government debt and deficit (82%, 38%), but were evident across the board. The one item for which Republican scores were lower was “lack of opportunities to be upwardly mobile (33%, 42%).

Among unaffiliated respondents, their average percentages across all items were about equidistant to Democrats and Republicans at 41%. Like Republicans, unaffiliateds had high concern for inflation (64%) as well as federal debt (58%) but their scores dropped somewhat from fall 2023. Their concern for upward mobility was about the same as for Democrats (41%).

Party differences are depicted on Graph 11 for spring 2024.



## Economic Conditions Applying to Respondents

This next section has been included for several years – originating in the Great Recession and being retained and modified somewhat along the way. Throughout the period, respondents were asked: “Thinking about your personal circumstances, please tell me whether any of these economic conditions apply to you or your household.”

Two tables show the results for recent AACC/CSLI surveys: Table 18 (as well as Graph 12) shows the results from recent surveys while Table 19 shows a longer time frame.<sup>4</sup>

Table 18 has been sorted by the size of the difference between the spring 2024 and fall 2023 surveys. All items – both positive and negative – received higher scores this spring. The sharpest rise was for the item “hard to afford the cost of food and groceries” which jumped 14 points to 51% - close to the range typical of the period spring 2022 to spring 2023 – with fall 2023 something of an outlier.

<sup>4</sup> Other modifications have occurred over the years, such as the inclusion of questions asking about a “salary increase or other increase in income recently” and whether the respondent had “found a new or better job recently” – these items were introduced in fall 2011. In fall 2016, the healthcare question was changed from “healthcare insurance is unavailable, too expensive or inadequate” to “unable to afford healthcare or medicine during the last year.” The rationale for this change was to make the question accord with a question asked by Gallup Inc., which claimed to measure healthcare insecurity.<sup>4</sup> Since fall 2018, the survey reverted to prior form to note whether there have been changes in the value of this measure over time. In addition, in spring 2020 the question about the cost of education was amended to say “beyond high school.” For spring 2023, the item “Hard to afford the cost of childcare” was added.

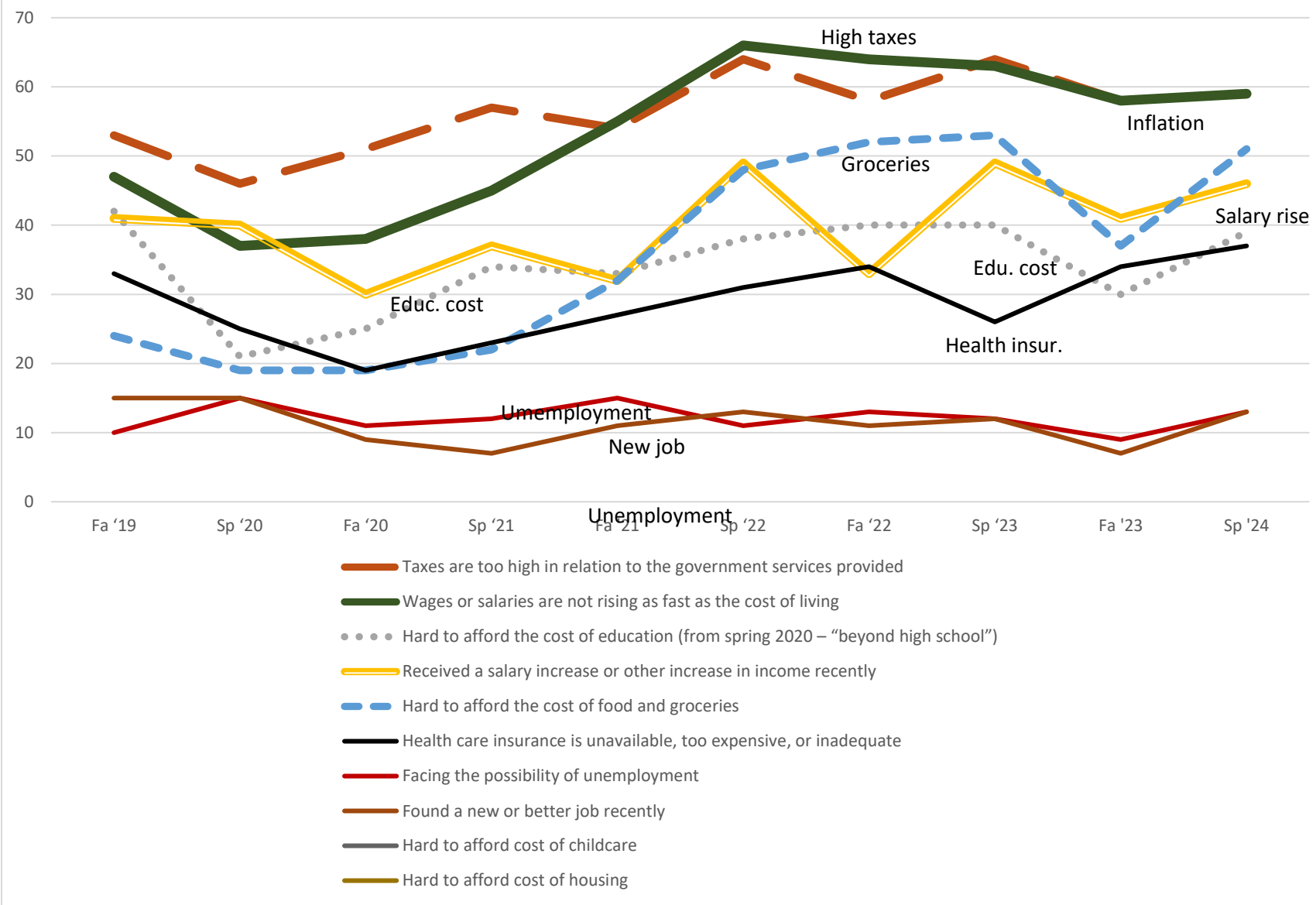

Party based differences were apparent among some of these measures (see Table 20). Since fall 2020 the clearest partisan differences appeared on taxes, with Republicans much more likely to say that they were too high – and the gaps typically exceeding 30 percentage points in each survey – and reaching 46 points in spring 2022 but dropping to just 24 points in spring 2023. This spring the gap was 34 points, slightly up from fall 2023 when there was a 30-point gap. Republicans were more likely to say that it was “hard to afford the cost of food or groceries (17-point). Democrats were more likely to highlight the cost of education (12-point gap). Other items showed smaller gaps although in some cases, small absolute values (and thus apparently small differences between partisans) hid large differences such as the cost of childcare which was cited twice as often by Democrats (11%) than Republicans (6%) – and even more often by unaffiliateds (17%). These differences may point to age or lifecycle differences among party respondents.

## **Economic Conditions Applying to Individuals/Households – Influence of Income**

Table 21 shows the impact of income on the indicators of economic conditions applying to personal circumstances both for the current survey as well as the gap between higher and lower income groups over time.

Dividing the sample of respondents into those earning up to \$75,000 into one group and those earning at over \$75,000 into a second group, the pattern over the years has been consistent: most desirable outcomes favor the higher income group. For spring 2024, four items showed the largest differences: “Hard to afford the cost of food and groceries” (37-point gap, up from 20 last fall); “Hard to afford the cost of housing” (35-point gap, down from 44 last fall); “Wages or salaries are not rising as fast as the cost of living” (29-point gap, up from 11 last fall); and “Health care insurance is unavailable, too expensive, or inadequate” (26-point gap, up from 8 last fall).

Overall, these findings generally show that the wealthier group experiences more desirable outcomes – it is able to experience more increases in income, is less worried about costs of basics like food, is less prone to say that wages aren’t keeping up with the cost of living and is less concerned with health care costs or availability. There was little difference between the two groups regarding the idea that “taxes are too high in relation to the government services provided” (6-point gap).

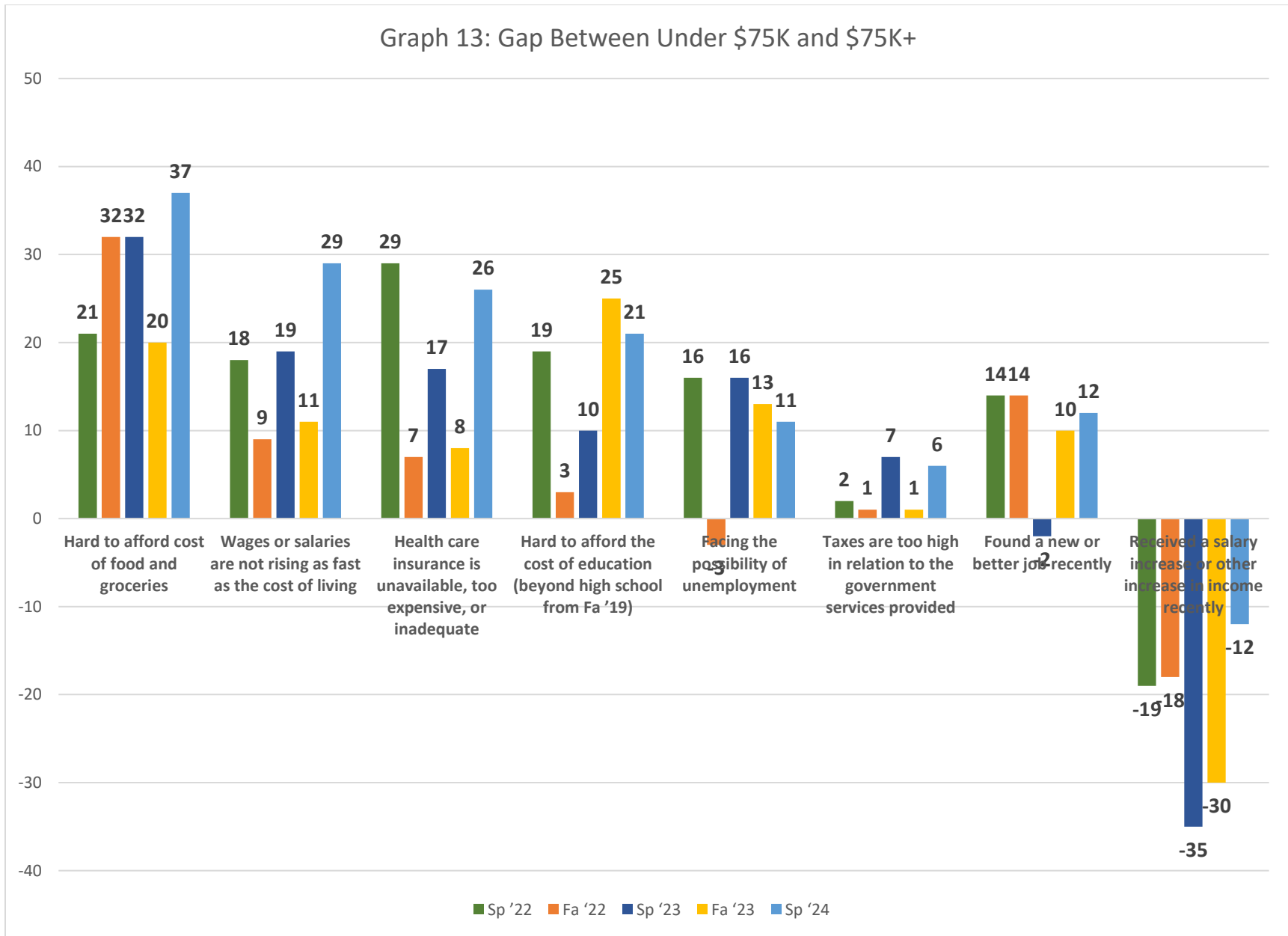
Graph 13 shows just the percentage point gaps between the lower and higher income groups for spring 2022, fall 2022, spring 2023, fall 2023 and spring 2024. The results show that inflationary pressures have been significant throughout the period – especially shown by the cost of food and groceries.

## Economic Prospects for Young People/Use of Artificial Intelligence

A new question was asked within the section dealing with the economy: “In your opinion, how hard is it for young people today to find a good job or career?”

Table 22 shows that the modal category for the overall sample was “somewhat hard” (52%). Age appears to affect the tendency to perceive challenges for young people since the “very hard” category was just 29% for those over 40, by 42% and 55% for those between 18-29 and 30-39 respectively. Moreover, those with lower incomes were nearly twice as likely as those with incomes of at least \$75,000 to say “very hard” (51%, 28%). These findings suggest that those more likely to be experiencing the actual challenges of finding job opportunities or selecting careers are perceiving significant challenges that those who are older or with higher incomes don’t perceive.

## Artificial Intelligence: Impact on Career Choices, Experiences

The last section dealing with economic factors broached the issue of artificial intelligence. The first question asked, “Do you feel that artificial intelligence will have a major, minor or no impact on your job or career choices over the next 20 years?”<sup>5</sup> Table 23 shows that a large majority of respondents (59%) felt that AI would have a major impact on their choices. Differences by age or income were not very large.

The survey also asked about people’s awareness of and actual experience with AI. Initially, the question asked was “Have you heard about the AI tool called “ChatGPT” or similar AI products?” Table 24 summarizes the results for the overall sample as well as by age and income. Only about a quarter (26%) claimed to have both knowledge and use of AI tools. This percentage was higher for younger people (18-29, 34%; 30-39, 42%) than for those over 40 (23%). Those with higher incomes were also more likely to have used it (31% vs. 20%). A majority across income and age groups had heard of AI but did not use it. A much larger percentage of those over 40 had not heard of it (14%) compared to younger people (2%, 0%).

The survey went on to ask just those who had used it to identify ways in which AI tools had been used. Table 25 shows the options and relevant percentages. Relatively small percentages had used AI tools in any way as the most cited “several times” percentage for “other uses” was only 23%. The process of conducting research was more likely to be never used (38%) than frequently used (16%). It appears that respondents are still tentatively approaching AI to explore ways in which these tools might be helpful. An open-ended section allowed individuals to offer ways in which they had used AI and included such uses as data verification, business document writing, generating coloring pages for my children, grammar and brainstorm creative projects, inspiration for college essays, legal issues, planning travel, recipes, to understand concepts in computer science, etc. These are found in Appendix C.

## Coronavirus Section

The initial summary section of the press release covered some findings pertinent to the COVID-19 situation. The earlier discussion about the “most important problem facing residents” has already remarked that this is the first time since the start of the pandemic that the percentage claiming the coronavirus was zero. For this section, the number of questions has been reduced significantly from previous surveys and has concentrated on only two elements: years in which the respondent claims to have contracted the illness and a new question: “Thinking about the past year, do you recall a time when you might have come down with symptoms associated with COVID-19 but didn’t bother to test?”

### Experience with COVID-19

The survey asked respondents to indicate the years in which they had contracted the virus, if at all (see Table 26). The most serious year for contracting the virus was apparently 2022 with 28% saying that they had contracted it that year. It is also the year with the highest average of people saying that they had COVID-19 (30%). Note also that regarding 2023, the percentages increased through the several surveys – moving from only 4% claiming to have come down with it during the spring 2023 survey, compared to 22% by the time of the spring 2024 survey.

That incidence of COVID-19 might be underestimated by the findings for the next question: “Thinking about the past year, do you recall a time when you might have come down with symptoms associated with COVID-19 but didn’t bother to test?” Over one fifth of the sample (21%) affirmed that this was the case (75% no, 4% unsure).



## County as Level of Analysis: Crime

The survey next turned to matters more directly affecting the county itself, with its first major focus being crime. The survey asked respondents to indicate whether they had been a victim of crime “over the last year.” It followed up by asking whether the respondent thought that specific categories of crime were “not much,” “somewhat” or “a significant” problem. The first iteration of this question asked about “your neighborhood” with a second focus on “the county as a whole.” In both cases, it asked about the importance of various ways for coming to the crime assessment: personal experience; word of mouth from neighbors, friends, family; information online from social media or apps on your phone; and “other forms of crime reporting such as newspapers, newsletters, radio, TV.”

Table 27 looks at the reported incidence of crime divided into eight categories. It shows that the most common type of crime is categorized under “cybercrimes” such as identify theft, hacking, telephone scams as this was affirmed as a crime experience by 28% of the respondents. The second largest category was “theft” at 16%. All other categories were in the single digits, with “personal assault” (6%) being the most commonly cited.

Looking next at the results by age, gender and income on Table 28, the identification of significant impacts of these traits upon the incidence of crimes seems mostly hard to pinpoint. Looking at the averages at the bottom of the table, the range is very small: 7-10%.

Differences are not typically pronounced, especially given the low incidence rates overall. Gunshots or shootings were only claimed by 4% but were most likely to be experienced by those who were men (6%) and between the ages of 30-39 (7%). Personal assault (6% overall) was an exception as it showed a clear tendency to be experienced predominantly by those under 18-29, 30-39 (18%, 11%), men (7%) and those with incomes under \$75,000 (6%). Personal assault was also disproportionately experienced by “Non-binary, third gender, trans male/female” (27%).

Table 29 looks at incidences of crime by race. The categories for Hispanic/Latino and Asian/Asian American or Pacific Islander are included, but have relatively small representation within the survey – so their percentages should be cautiously approached due to large margins of error.

Focusing mostly on the White/African American differences, the latter are consistent and pronounced for all categories other than cybercrimes. For the remainder of the crime categories, African Americans are typically at least twice as likely to say that they have experienced a given crime. For example, the percentage of White experiencing personal assault is just 4% while it is 12% for African Americans. The latter were four times more likely to be victims of robbery; far more likely to confront drug dealing (1% Whites, 12% African American) or illegal drug consumption (3%, 11%); three times more likely to have experienced burglary (3%, 12%) and twice as frequently theft (14%, 25%). Compared to the other demographic variables examined, the impact of race seems far more significant.

Continuing our focus on crime, the next section compares how significant of a problem respondents said crime was in their neighborhoods compared to the county overall. The results on Table 30 (right column subtracting county from neighborhood “significant” scores) show that cybercrimes are seen as much more of a neighborhood problem, while illegal drug consumption and dealing are more county level problems. Otherwise, respondents tended to evaluate other crimes evenly between neighborhoods and the county levels.

The final two areas of attention dealing with crime focused on how people formed their opinions about the severity of crime both at the neighborhood and county levels, and whether those who were victims of crime reported the crime and were satisfied with the criminal investigation and resolution.

Table 31 compares how respondents claimed they sourced information about crime at the neighborhood and county levels. Personal experience appeared to dominate their choice of sources for both the neighborhood and county levels, although the percentage for neighborhoods saying “very important” (59%) was 14 points higher than for the county (45%). For the latter, there was somewhat more reliance on media sources (39%, 44%) such as newspapers, radio or TV. While the propensity to rely on personal experience for both levels seems compelling, it does seem more likely that personal experiences would more easily inform individuals at the neighborhood level since crime is more easily understood as occurring there than in the county in general.

The final question focusing on crime asked about crime reporting and satisfaction with the resolution of the crime if reported. Respondents were asked, “If you were a victim of crime over the last twelve months, which of the following best describes your circumstances?” The options are shown in Table 32. The question offered the option “not a victim of crime” (80%) but these were extracted from the calculations of crime reporting/resolution to highlight the experiences of those who were actually crime victims. Given the discovery of high incidences of crime among African Americans, the results included a breakdown by race.

Table 38 shows that nearly half (45%) of those experiencing some sort of crime did not report it, although this figure was lower among African Americans (35%) than for Whites (45%). Most reported crimes did not trigger a criminal investigation. There was some tendency for those who said that a criminal investigation was triggered by the crime to claim that the criminal investigation did not resolve the crime to their satisfaction (14%) compared to those who were satisfied (9%). Whites were less likely to be dissatisfied with the criminal investigation (10%) than were African Americans (17%).

An open-ended opportunity was presented to respondents to answer the question “What could be done to best improve the safety and security of people living in Anne Arundel County. The verbatim results are found in Appendix D. Table 32a uses results sorted by ChatGPT to categorize the comments.

## Other County Issues: Plastic Bag Ban

A bill passed by the county council banned plastic bags and allowed stores to charge for paper bags.<sup>7</sup> The survey asked people to express their views about this law. Table 33 shows the choices and results. Two answer categories allowed respondents to express some level of support for this bill: combined the total was 58% in support. As shown in Table 33 there was a sharp polarization by party as 41% of Democrats supported it “completely” with another 23% supporting “somewhat” compared to only 15% and 25% for Republicans – thus 64% vs. 40% supporting by party. It was clearly not very popular with unaffiliated voters as only 37% of them supported the bill, although nearly one quarter (23%) chose “other response.” Those making this choice were offered the option of explaining their views (see Appendix E). Comments included “ban plastic but don’t charge for paper bags,” “I hate plastic bags, but waiting to see if this hurts businesses,” “utterly ridiculous and is only another burden on taxpayers.”

## Other County Issues: General Development Plan

This section of the survey asked about awareness and concern about changes in zoning or land use that might accompany the county’s review of its development plan. Table 34 shows the results of asking about awareness and concern. Slightly above one quarter had a “high” level of awareness about the plan. Much higher percentages expressed concern about how the revision process could affect “you and your community” (46%) or “the county’s quality of life” (53%).

Looking at the percentages answering “high” by party registration (Table 34a), Republicans seemed to have more awareness (33%) than Democrats (24%) and much higher levels of concern about the impact of the revision effort upon “you and your community” (63%, 36%) or “the county’s quality of life” (65%, 43%).

The results by council district for the combined “medium” plus “high” awareness scores showed a range of 51 (district 2) % to 72% - with district 3 having the highest total. For concern about, scores ranged from 62% (district 1) to 88% (district 3) for “you and your community.”<sup>8</sup>

**Other County Issues: General Development Plan Online Tools**

The county [website](#) dealing with land use and development provides a range of tools that can assist individuals seeking information that is relevant to zoning, land use and development. The survey asked about four of them: community land use meetings; land use navigator; development activity online tool; and zoning classification online guide. Respondents were asked whether they were aware of the tool, had used it, and to rate it. Table 35 shows awareness and use; Table 36 indicates how the tool was rated.

Based on the results shown in Table 35, the highest level of awareness applied to community land use meetings (43%). These meetings were apparently much more commonly known than any of the online tools and guides, whose range of “yes” answers ranged from 20% to 26% – or nearly one-half that of community land use meetings.

Regarding the helpfulness of these tools, only those who said that they had used a given tool (or attended a community meeting) were included in the assessment of helpfulness included on Table 36. The table shows that among actual users, each of the tools were generally helpful, although the relatively higher scores for the various online tools compared to the community meetings suggests that these are more highly valued. This might be due to the more exact and specific types of information that the online tools provide compared to the more general information provided at community meetings.

## Other County Issues: Perceived Discrimination Against Certain Groups

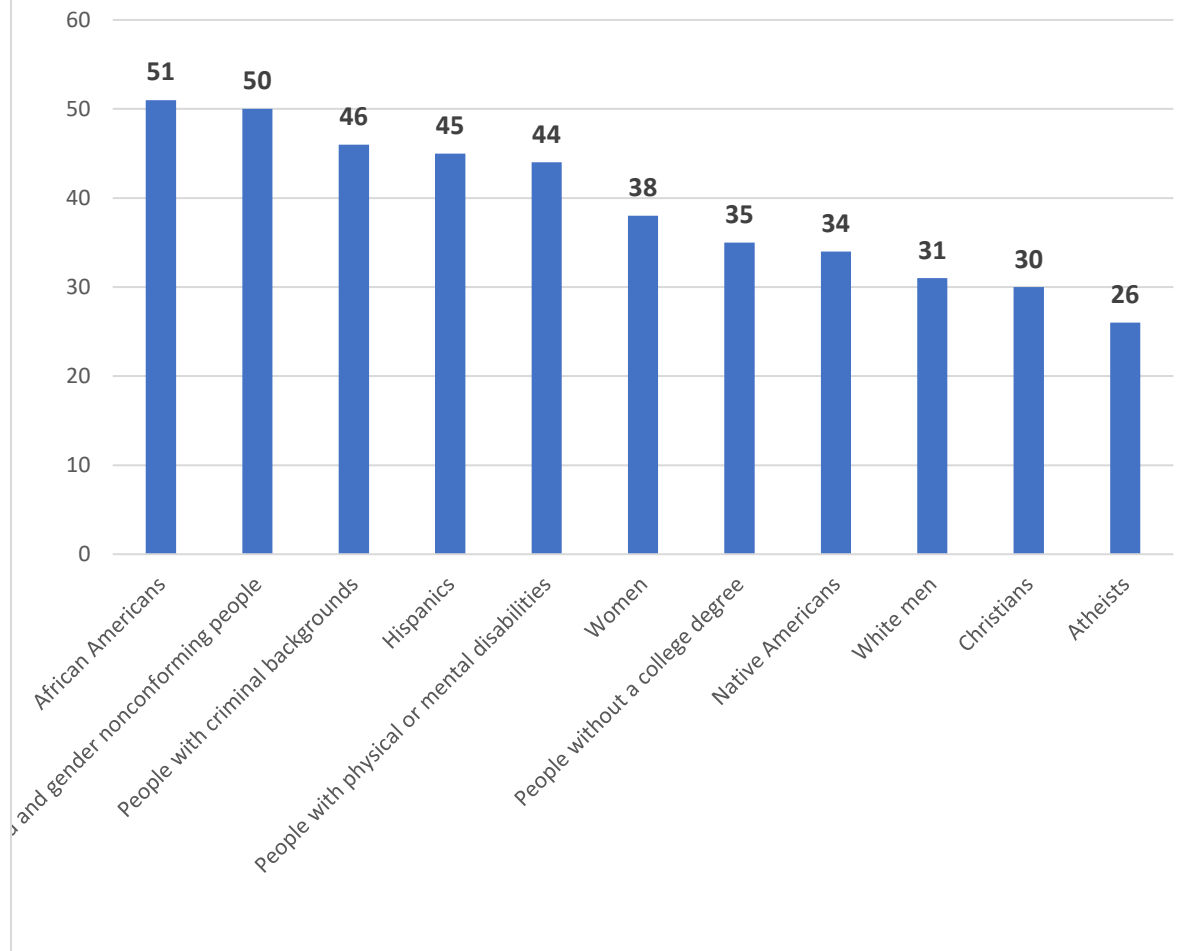
The survey included questions similar to those previously asked regarding the perception of discrimination against certain groups. This time, respondents were offered scales ranging from 0 to 100, with increments labelled “little or none,” “some,” “quite a bit,” and “a great deal.” Table 37 provides the results by showing the mean for each item along with the percentage of respondents choosing the top two increments.

As shown in Table 37 and Graph 14, African Americans and “transgendered and gender nonconforming people” are virtually tied as groups perceived to suffer the most discrimination in the county. People with criminal backgrounds along with Hispanics and people with physical or mental disabilities were also highly placed, especially based on the mean scores. Given differences in the measurement tool used since the last time this question was asked, the results aren’t exactly comparable, but the ranking very closely emulates previous results.

## State Policies – Budget/Tax Ideas

The survey was in the field during the conclusion of the 2024 legislative session of the Maryland General Assembly. Competing ideas were floated about how to balance the budget for the 2024-25 fiscal year. The question combined some of these ideas by framing the issue as follows:

“During the legislative session this year, different approaches have been proposed to deal with shortfalls in the state government’s budget for the coming 2024-25 fiscal year.

One approach would try to provide funding for transportation and education by expanding corporate taxes, legalizing Internet gaming and implementing new fees on ride-sharing, tolls and electric cars.

Another approach would increase state revenues by lowering the state sales tax from the current 6 percent to 5 percent, but extending it out to some services.

Governor Wes Moore and Senate President Bill Ferguson have rejected the idea of passing new taxes this year thus forcing cuts in anticipated spending. Which of the following do you favor?”

Respondents were offered four choices:

- Raising some taxes and fees to ensure program funding.
- Lowering the sales tax rate, but extending to some services
- Avoiding any increase in taxes and reducing funding to transportation and education
- None of the above.

Each of the answer choices included the option of adding comments. These can be found in Appendix G.

Table 38 and Graph 15 provide the percentages overall and by party registration. The results are demonstrative of the challenges of finding a fiscal formula that is broadly accepted and well understood. Overall, there are few differences between the three main alternatives, that collectively gather 64% of support. None of the above is favored by 17% and among a fifth say don’t know/unsure (19%).

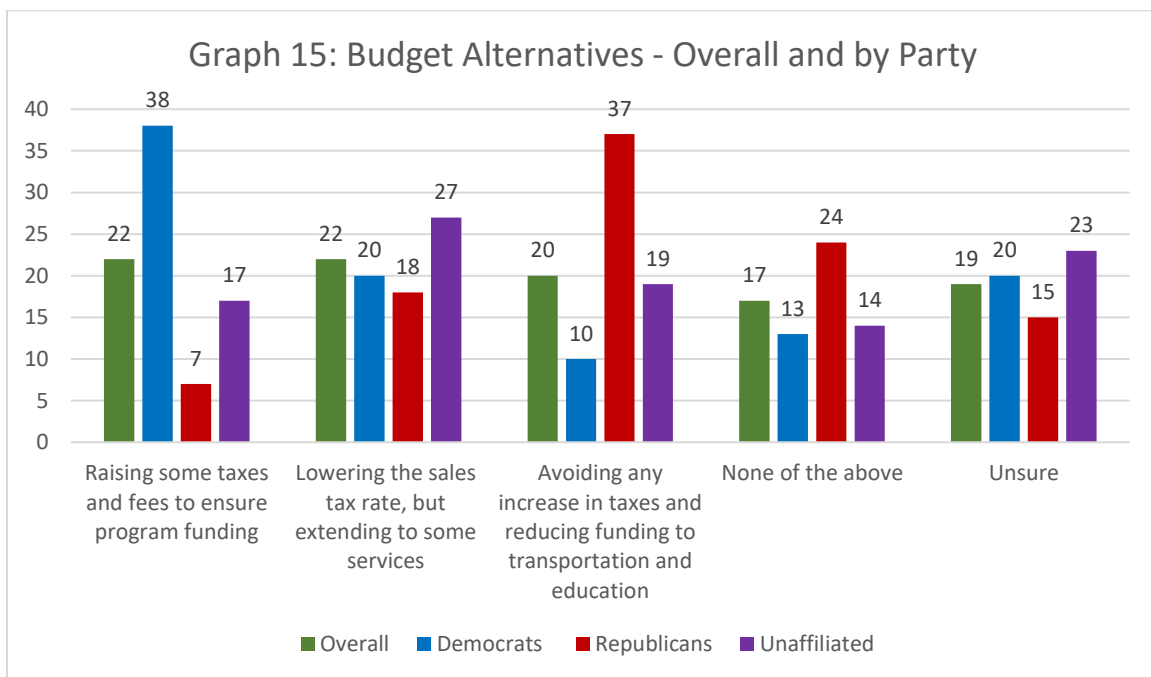
The partisan picture is somewhat clarifying: a plurality of Democrats (38%) favor raising some taxes and fees, but only 7% of Republicans agree, with unaffiliateds leaning closer to the Republican position (17%). Apparently, a plurality of unaffiliateds (27%) favor lowering the sales tax, but also extending to services not currently being taxed. A plurality of Republicans say that the best option is to avoid any tax increase and instead reduce funding to programs such as education and transportation. In the end, the budget included some increases in fees (on vehicles) and taxes on tobacco.

According to The Capital, “The plan includes a 75-cent fee on rideshares such as Uber and Lyft, a \$125 surcharge on electric vehicle registrations and various levels of fees for heavier vehicles that have an outsized impact on deteriorating roads.” “It will make a dent in, but not

solve, the budget deficits in the coming years.”<sup>9</sup> Effectively, the Maryland General Assembly and Governor Moore chose the approach favored by a plurality of Democrats: “Raising some taxes and fees to ensure program funding.” See Appendix G for verbatim comments.

## State of Maryland: Collapse of Francis Scott Key Bridge

The collapse of the Francis Scott Key Bridge occurred some days prior to the administration of this survey – specific policy responses were still unclear at the time that the survey was drafted. The survey did manage to include three questions relevant to the bridge collapse and its impact upon residents of Anne Arundel County.

The three questions asked were:

- Will you be negatively affected economically by this event?
- Will you be inconvenienced by the loss of the bridge?
- Do you have confidence that the bridge will be rebuilt relatively quickly?

Table 39 shows these questions and the percentages answering them using simple answer choices: yes, no, unsure.

The results show that residents believe that they will be inconvenienced by the loss of access to the bridge (41%) more than they will be economically impacted (25%). The sample was closely divided regarding their confidence that the bridge will be rebuilt “relatively quickly.”

The results in Table 40 show an extremely muted partisan impact. Very few differences are found in terms of economic impact or inconvenience, which might be expected. Less obvious is the small difference between Democrats (45%) and Republicans (39%) regarding having confidence that the bridge will be rebuilt relatively quickly, which seemed surprising given the



role of Democratic Governor Wes Moore and Democratic President Joe Biden in leading the effort to have the bridge rebuilt. The most cynical among the party categories are the unaffiliateds (26%) who had the lowest score among the three categories (although their unsure score was also the highest accounting partly for the lower “yes” score).

Respondents were given the opportunity to comment upon state matters such as the collapse of the bridge – see Appendix H.

## National Focus: Historical Impact of Various Events Impacting the Civil Rights of African Americans

The survey advisory board included AACC history faculty members with an interest in understanding the public’s views of the struggle of African Americans to gain civil rights and recognition in American society. A question was fashioned that asked: “How significant were each of the following events in positively impacting civil rights for African Americans?” The specific questions, answer choices and percentages are shown in Table 41.

The results highlight the greater consensus on certain events from the 1950s and 1960s as key milestones in the achievement of civil rights. About three-quarters of the sample (74%) felt that the Brown v. Board of Education Supreme Court decision was a key event, about the same as those acknowledging the impact of the Voting Rights Act passed by Congress in 1965.

More recent events are much less clearly seen as consequential. Of the remaining choices, the election of Barack Obama as president was perceived as somewhat more impactful (42% “very significant”) than the emergence of the Black Lives Matter movement (30%) or the emergence of diversity, equity and inclusion programs (37%).

Table 42 looks at the answers by party and race by highlighting only the percentages saying “very significant” for each question. The column in which Republican scores are subtracted from Democratic ones shows where the political consensus on key events dissolved. There is only a 19-point difference between Democrats and Republicans regarding the Supreme Court decision and the Voting Rights Act – and very solid majorities favor each of these in both parties. However, very small numbers of Republicans perceive more recent events as having a positive impact on civil rights, with the Black Lives Movement claiming the lowest score of only 9% - compared to 48% among Democrats. Majorities of Democrats feel that both the election of Barack Obama (59%) and the emergence of diversity programs (55%) are significant milestones; but few Republicans agree (16%, 12%). As usual, unaffiliateds are somewhere in the middle

especially upon the more recent events. The results by race tell a similar story: long-past events are recalled very favorably by both Whites and African Americans. More recent events are less clearly favored, with especially severe divisions on the question of the emergence of diversity programs (whites 33%, African Americans 66%). Interestingly, on four of the five questions, Democrats have higher very significant scores than African Americans – with diversity programs the only exception. There is an open-ended answer option included as Appendix I.

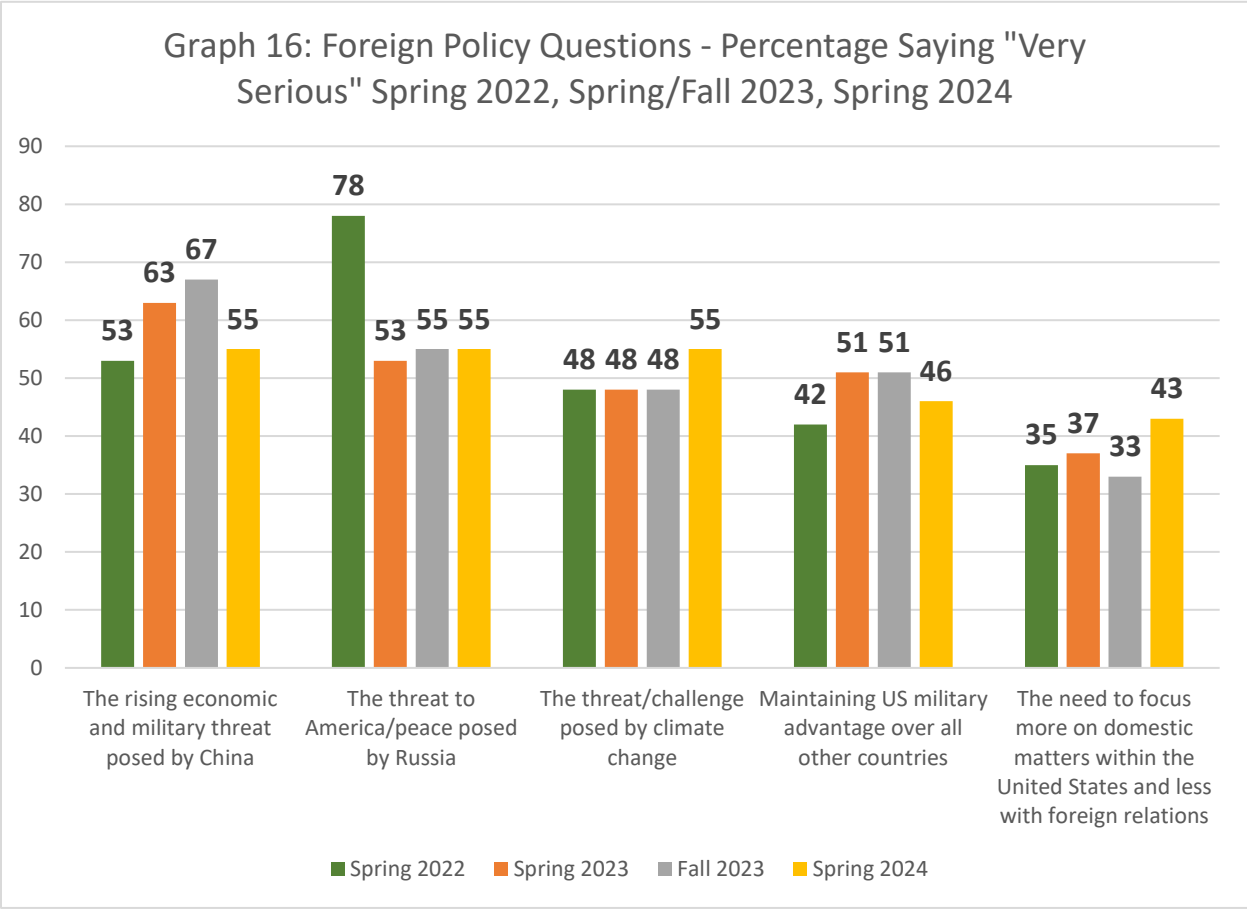
## International Issues

Three previous surveys have asked how serious respondents believed some specific “international affairs” situations are – very, somewhat, or not very serious. Table 43 shows the five questions that relate to foreign affairs and climate change. Two other questions not part of that table deal with U.S. support/aid to Ukraine. Finally, there are two questions dealing with the situation in the Middle East involving Israel and Hamas.

Table 43 and Graph 16 show the results for the first five questions for spring 2022, spring/fall 2023 and spring 2024.

Prior to spring 2024, the threat posed by China has been steadily rising as a very serious problem, moving from 53% to 67% over the course of the three surveys. However, by spring 2024, China had receded somewhat as a perceived threat, dropping 12 points to 55%.

The perception of Russia as a threat was very high just after the invasion of Ukraine – captured by the 78% score in the spring 2022 survey. However, just six months later perceptions had changed such that scores have continued to fall in the mid-50 percent range, despite the ongoing war and the dependency of Ukraine on US military and humanitarian aid.

There was no change in the percentage saying “very serious” for climate change holding exactly constant over the first three surveys. The percentage increased by 7 points in spring 2024 to reach a high of 55%.

The percentage found for the question about “focus more on domestic matters within the United States and less with foreign relations” had stayed at around one-third of the sample for the first three surveys but rose this spring to 43%. There was a 5-point dip in the percentage favoring the idea that U.S. maintain military advantage over all other countries – dropping from 51% to 46%.

Table 44 shows differences in perceptions by political party; Table 45 shows it by ideology. Table 46 shows it by age.

Graph 17: Foreign Policy by Age Group

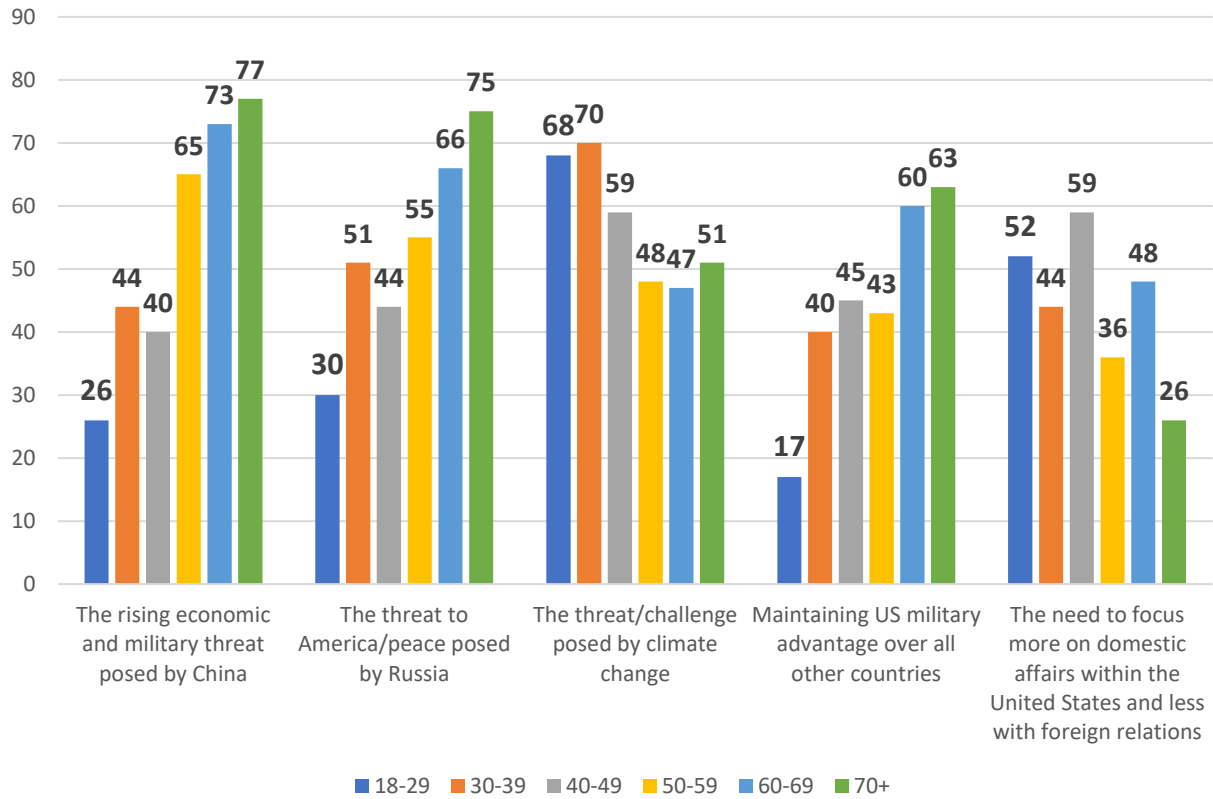




Table 44 shows some patterns regarding foreign affairs and party affiliation. First, the threat perception regarding China had risen quite a bit among Democrats, from 37% in spring 2022 to 61% in fall 2023 before falling to 55% this spring. Just looking at the last three surveys, the range of “very serious” responses by Democrats has stayed within a relatively narrow 10-point range (51-61%). For Republicans, concern levels have been higher generally (71-84%), but the spread (13 points) has been rather close to that of Democrats. Among unaffiliateds, the level of concern was similar to that of Democrats (48-62%) – generally highlighting the special attention that Republicans place in perceiving China as a threat.<sup>10</sup>

Second, compared to the initial level of concern regarding Russia expressed soon after the February 2022 invasion of Ukraine, there has been a fall in the threat perception across the board, but most steeply among Republicans as it dropped from 90% to 51% over the last two years. The most recent score for unaffiliateds was just 45% - down 35 points since spring 2022. Among Democrats, the fall has been much smaller – down just 13 points. Challenges in Congress for approving aid to Ukraine can be understood in light of these drops in concern levels among Republicans and unaffiliateds.<sup>11</sup>

Third, there was strong consistency in views about climate change with Democrats continuing to express high concern (81%, 75%, 76%, 83%) and Republicans generally having opposite views (12%, 25%, 13%, 19%). Compared to all the other foreign policy issues, the gap on climate change was vast (64 percentage points in spring 2024) compared to the gaps for other issues (ranging from 14 to 25 points). This gap has been found in national polling – for example, a study from 2023 from Pew Research asking the American public to evaluate the proposition, “Global climate change is a major threat to the country” found a 53-point gap between Democrats/leaners and Republican/leaners.<sup>12</sup>

Fourth, the concern about having the U.S. maintain a military advantage over all other countries was somewhat divisive (a 25-point gap between Democrats and Republicans) with unaffiliateds very similar to Democrats (in spring 2024, Democrats 39%, unaffiliateds 38%).

Fifth, the idea that there is a need to focus more on domestic rather than foreign affairs has shown a stronger tendency for Republicans to embrace this viewpoint than Democrats – perhaps linked to Trump’s nationalist and isolationist appeals.<sup>13</sup> The party gap in spring 2024 was 14 points. Opinion among unaffiliateds has varied quite a bit, but recently has been closer to the Republican scores (in spring 2024, identical at 50%).

Table 45 illustrates the impact of ideology on foreign policy stances in spring 2024. Taking each issue individually, the first deals with China. Conservatives – both “very” and “somewhat” – expressed similar levels of concern (68%, 67%). Conversely, among “very” liberals, not even one third (32%) consider this threat to be very serious – a 36-point spread between the two extremes. Those who were “somewhat liberal” (54%) were closer to moderates (59%) and conservatives than the more progressive liberals to their left.

The second point focuses on Russia and yields no consistent pattern. Among very conservatives, 45% (down from 53% last fall) said that the threat was very serious; among very liberals, the percentage was not much higher – 56%. Moderates were closer (59%) to very liberals. Clearly, this is a very hard issue to process ideologically.

Third, the greatest scope of ideological disagreement concerns climate change. Among very conservatives, it hardly exists as an issue (10%) and even somewhat conservatives dismiss it (24%). Conversely, among very liberals it is the most highly rated foreign policy issue listed (89%) – thus a 79-point gap between very conservatives and very liberals.

Fourth, the idea of maintaining U.S. military advantage over all other countries features a left-right polarization, but in this case, it is a bit less extreme than climate change as very conservatives prioritize it (68%) while very liberals don’t (36%) – a 42-point difference. Moderates (43%) were closer to “somewhat liberals” (36% compared to “somewhat conservatives” (69%). This issue is also hard to process well along left-right lines since last fall the swing of the moderates they were closer to the conservatives (57%, 59%) compared to the 26 points that then separated moderates from somewhat liberals.

Regarding the focus on domestic vs. foreign affairs, last fall, there was a 22-point difference between very conservatives (43%) and very liberals (21%). This spring, very conservatives again found a 22-point difference between themselves (58%) and very liberals (36%) although both were more favorable to this idea than in fall 2023. Moderates (46%) were again closest to the somewhat conservatives on this issue (46%).

Generational differences regarding international affairs have been noted by other prominent pollsters. In a recent presentation by Public Opinion Strategies, younger people (18-34) were much more likely to say that the government wasn’t doing enough about climate change (64%) compared to Boomers over 65 (39%). They were also more likely to favor cuts to the defense budget (48%, 24%).<sup>14</sup>

Graph 17 and Table 46 show similar patterns. On the China issue, 26% of those 18-29 said “very serious” compared to 77% of those at least 70. Regarding the threat to peace posed by Russia the percentages were 30%, 75%. On climate change the figures were 68% and 51%. Regarding the idea of heavy defense spending that would be needed to maintain “U.S. military advantage over all other countries, the percentages were 17% and 63%. The notion that we should focus more on domestic affairs and less on foreign relations also saw a large gap: 52%, 26%. While part of this gap is due to a larger percentage of young people saying “unsure” and thus lowering percentages for other categories, the overall pattern seems clear and consistent with other findings.

## Aid to Ukraine and Israel

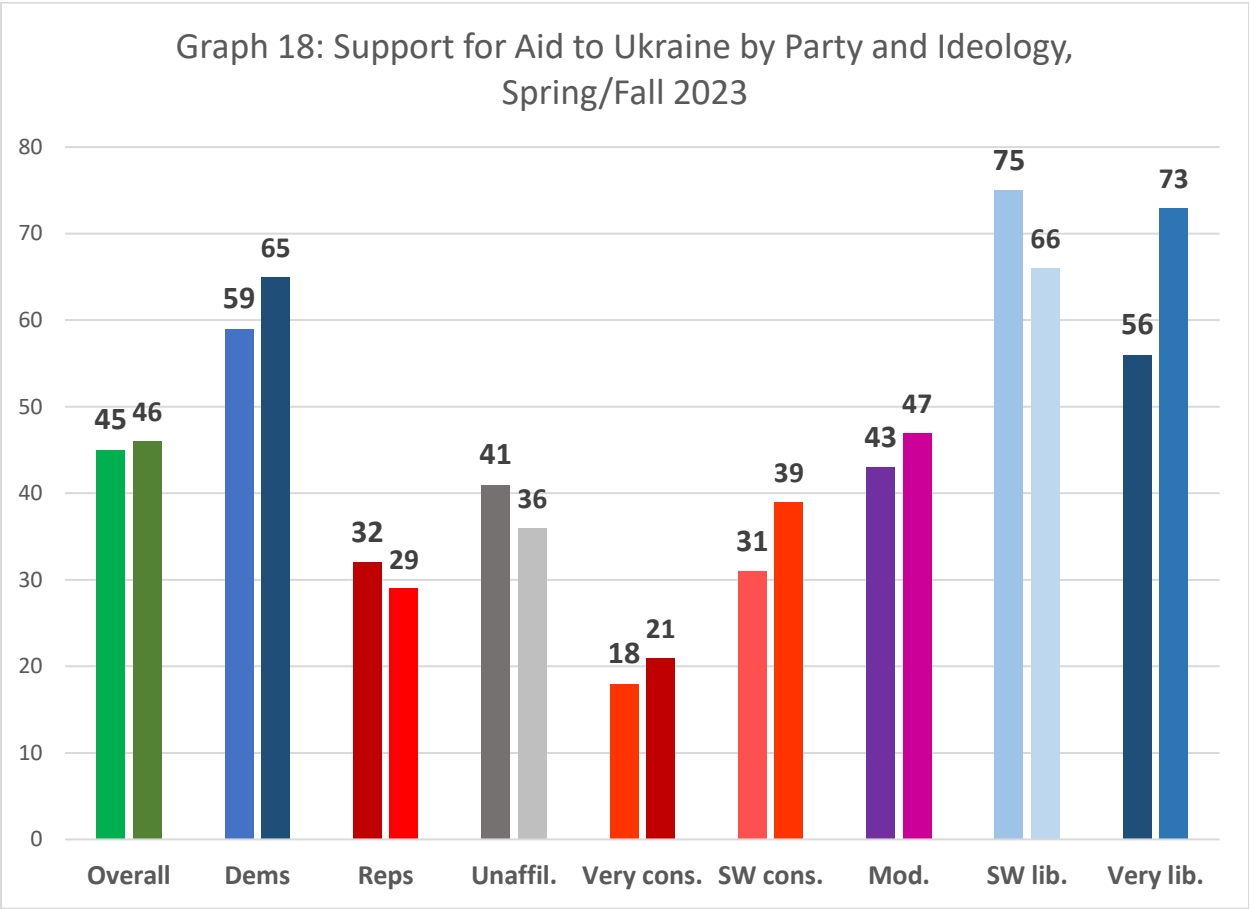
Considering the small majority (55%) considering Russia as a threat to peace identified in the previous question, the issue of respondents’ receptivity to aid to the embattled country of Ukraine becomes especially salient.

By way of background, last fall the survey included the question, “**Regarding the response of the Biden administration to Russia’s invasion of Ukraine, would you say that it is providing about the right amount of financial and military support, too much or too little?**”

Table 47 shows the results for spring 2023 as well as fall 2023 both for the overall samples as well as by party and ideology. The overall level of support remained unchanged – around 45% saying “right amount” or “too little.” That was higher than those saying “too much” – between 35% and 39%. There is an obvious left-right aspect to this issue, with those on the left about twice as likely to support funding the Ukrainians. The very conservatives (18%) were very reluctant to provide aid; the very liberals were about equally enthusiastic (73%) for a 55-point gap. Graph 18 illustrates the levels of support by party and ideology across the two surveys.

For spring 2024, the format for inquiring about U.S. support to Ukraine changed by integrating the idea of aid for both countries into a similar scale. Specifically, the question asked: “The Biden administration has advocated providing significant military aid to Ukraine and Israel. Which of the following best expresses your views about such aid?” The choices were: “Agree completely with providing aid”; “Agree somewhat with providing aid;” and, “Don’t agree with providing aid.”

Table 48 shows a much higher level of support for providing aid to Ukraine (agree completely, 47, somewhat 29% - 76% overall) than for Israel (24%, 34% - 58% overall). There was an 18-point gap overall, with a 23-point gap for the “agree completely” category.

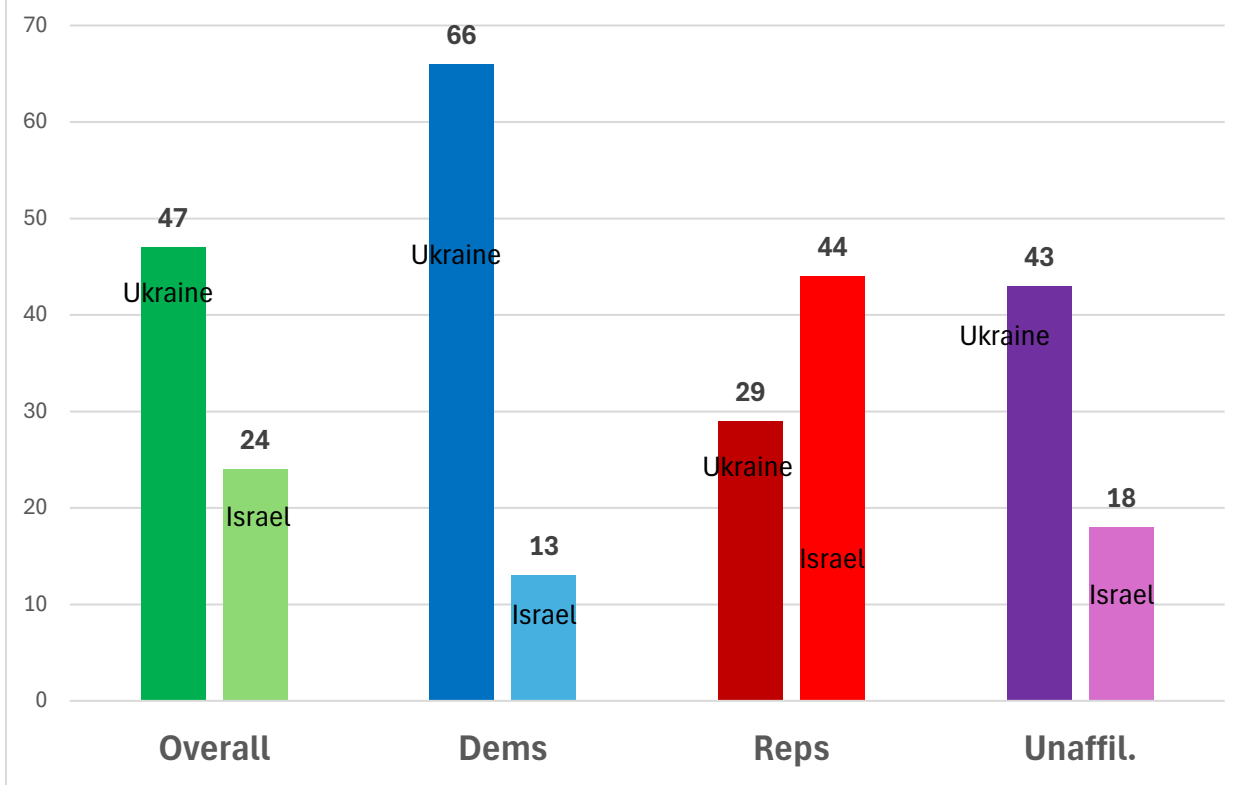

Graph 19 vividly illustrates partisan differences. While Democrats are very favorable to aiding Ukraine (66%) only a small minority of Republicans agree (29%). By contrast, a tiny percentage of Democrats favor “completely” aid to Israel (13%), a much larger percentage (44%) favor aid to Israel among Republicans (44%). Unaffiliateds side closer to Republicans regarding Ukraine (14-point gap) than Democrats (23-point gap), but the situation is reversed for Israel (5-point gap with Democrats, 26-point gap with Republicans).

## Israel and Gaza/Hamas

Last fall, the conflict involving Israel and Hamas had just started at the time of the fall 2023 AACC/CSLI survey. At that time, the focus in the poll was trying to determine the public’s perception of blame, with the specific question being: “How much do you blame the escalation of violence in the Israeli-Palestinian conflict upon the following: Israel, Hamas, Palestinians as a whole, or Iran?” The answer choices were “none or very little,” “some,” and “quite a bit.” Table 50 shows the results. Hamas received the highest percentage of “quite a bit” scores (75%), followed by Iran (53%). While Palestinians as a whole received more of the perceived blame than Israel, the difference for the combined “some+quite a bit” category was only 9 percentage points.

By April 2024, Israel had proceeded to conduct its counter-offensive against Hamas, resulting in widespread loss of life and property in Gaza. The question that was asked in spring 2024 was not focused on the assessment of blame, but rather approval of the Israeli approach itself.

To try and get at that issue, the question asked: “On October 7, Israel was attacked by Hamas causing the deaths of over 1200 of its citizens. Since then, Israel has pursued a strategy meant to make Hamas unable to attack Israel in the future. Which of the following best expresses your views of Israel's strategy and military operation in the Gaza Strip?” Some early testing of this question conveyed the idea that respondents might agree with more than one of the possible three closed-ended options – as a result, the question gave the option for respondents to agree *with more than a single choice* and to offer a response not provided among the choices.

The results show that support for Israel has probably declined over the last six months. Previously, 38% has said that Israel had “none or very little” blame for the escalation of violence; this spring that sentiment would have been best conveyed by agreeing that “Israel has done what it needed to do to defeat Hamas” – the overall percentage agree with that position was only 28%. Among those who last fall said that Israel had “some” blame (39%) are probably found among the 40% who said “Israel has a right to defend itself but has caused too many civilian casualties in Gaza.” Last fall, only 23% said that Israel had “quite a bit” of blame; this spring the percentage saying that “Israel should have more actively pursued a two-state solution” was 33%. The percentages are not exactly comparable since this spring, respondents could choose more than a single answer option, meaning that any given option could have a higher score than was the case last spring when only a single answer was possible.

Looking at the results by party, the same pattern found with aid to Israel was echoed in Table 51. Democrats were much less likely to say (13%) that “Israel has done what it needed to do to defeat Hamas” than did Republicans (68%) – a 55-point gap. Unaffiliateds were much less likely to choose any option.

Appendix K includes open-ended comments about Israel/Gaza, while Appendix L includes comments about this and other issues relevant to international affairs.



## How People Find out About News About Government and Politics

This section anticipates the focus in the next section on issues, elections and candidates by asking respondents how they obtain news/information about government and politics. This question focused on various specific social media sources as well as other general modes. Table 52 shows the answer options and percentages for the overall sample.

Based on the percentage choosing “Quite or very often,” Table 52 shows that mainstream media sources continue as typical ways for people to acquire news, with “online or hardcopy sources of newspapers” gathering 42% and “online, cable or broadcast sources” a similar percentage (44%). The third highest source was “other television news and politics programming” (33%) followed by radio (24%).

Social media was much less likely to be a source of news, with Facebook (18%), Instagram (16%) and YouTube (16%) leading. Podcasts (13%) and non-fiction books along with X/Twitter and TikTok were closer to the bottom of the list.

This picture was strongly affected by age. Table 53 shows the “quite or very often” scores by age group.

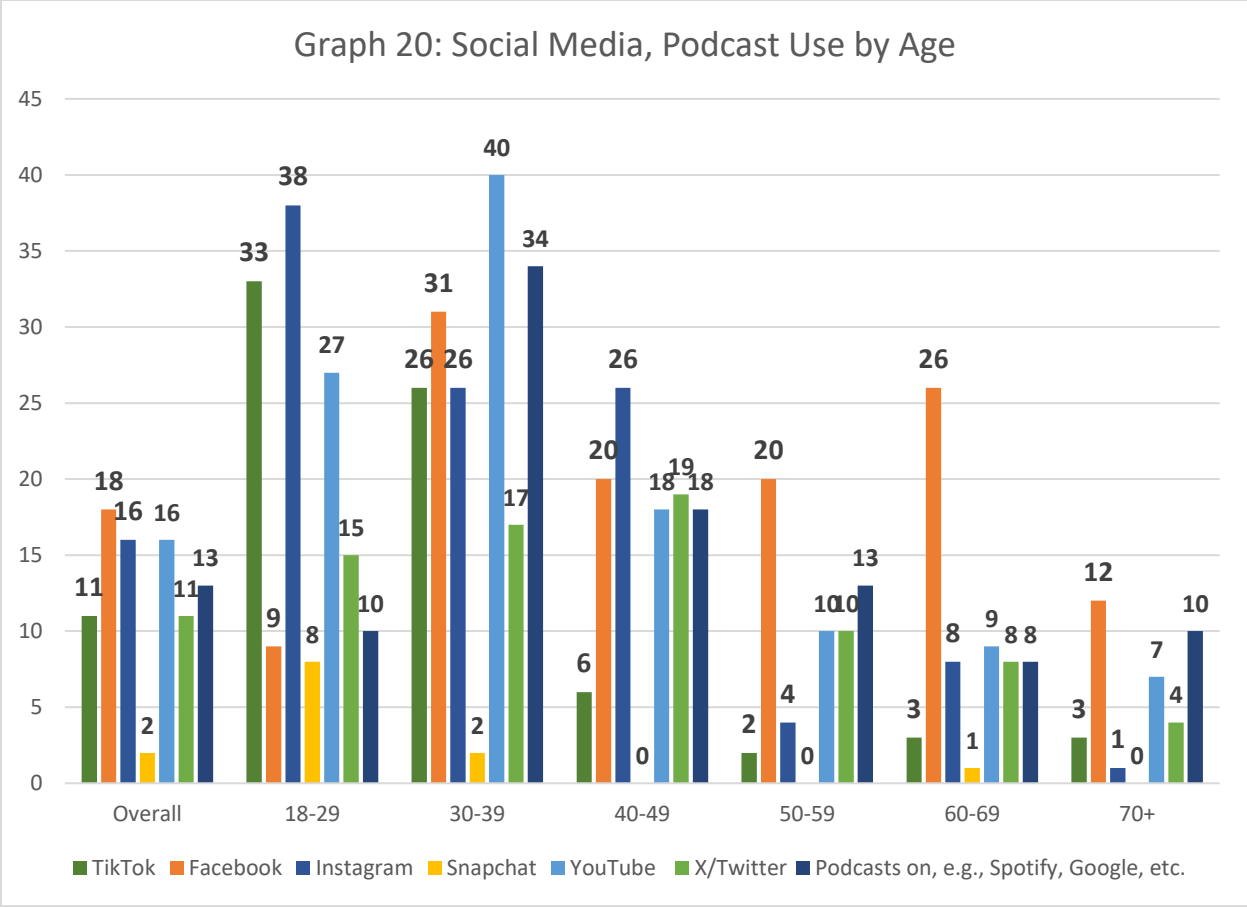

Table 53 shows the percentages saying “quite or very often” for each of the categories offered. Graph 20 shows the results just for the social media/podcast options; Graph 21 focuses on the other categories.

Several conclusions seem justified by the data.

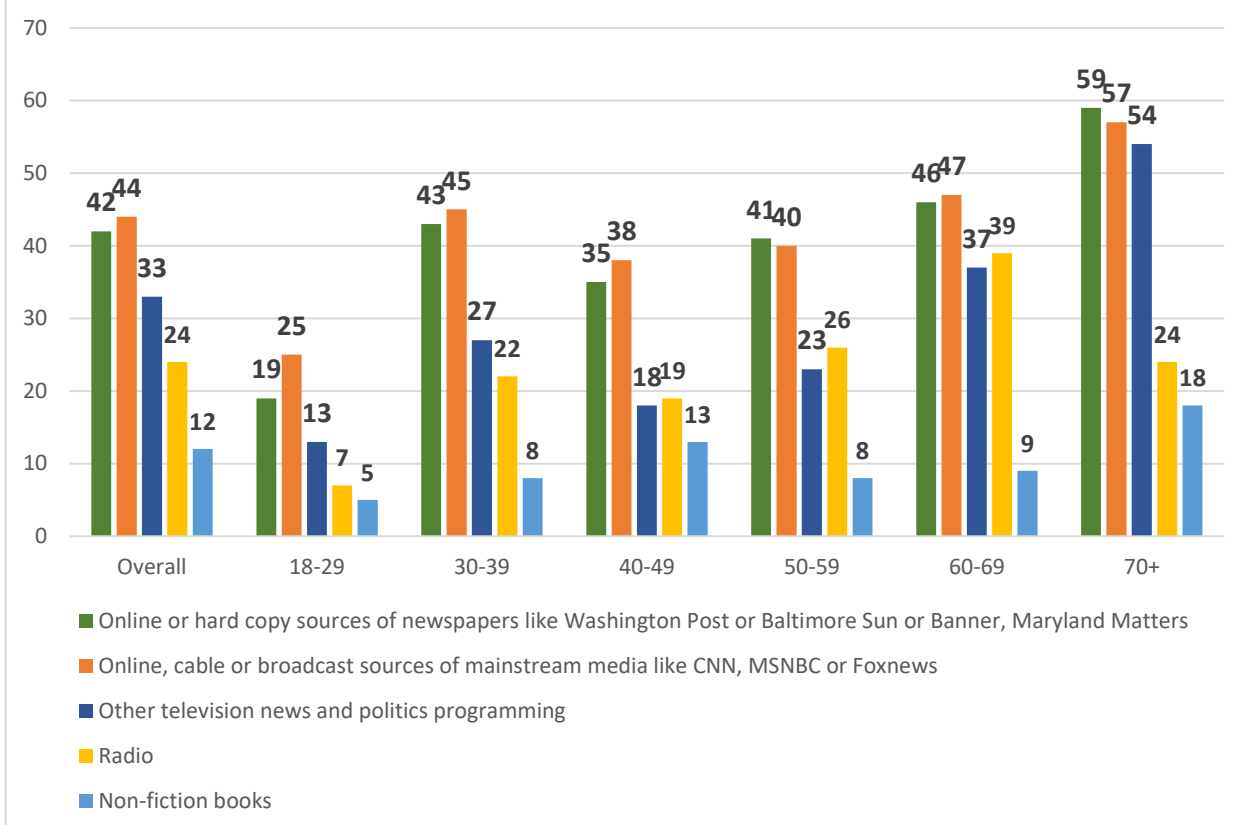
- Younger people are much more likely to use social media to acquire news.
- Facebook seems the most likely to be used across all the age groups, with YouTube and X/Twitter being rather similar (although tailing off more for those 50+).
- The social media most used by young people but least used by older people are TikTok, Snapchat and to some extent Instagram (especially for those 50+).
- Legacy media sources are more likely to be used by older age groups, but not without some substantial attention from younger people.
- Radio is not often used by the youngest age group (18-29) but is generally used by those older – if not as often as other legacy mainstream news sources.
- Podcasts are especially appealing to those 30-39, but are also quite used by those 40-49, while tailing among the youngest and oldest respondents.
- Non-fiction books are rarely used among almost all age groups, with the possible exception of those over 70.



Graph 20 highlights just social media/podcasts among the age groups. The bars are clearly tallest among those 18-39, dipping quite a bit around 50 and dropped even more for those above 70.

Graph 21 shows legacy media by age groups. The age group most attracted to these sources are those 60 and over. What is impressive is the extent that newspapers (hardcopy or online) or major television news programming (cable, online, broadcast) is consistently around the 40 percent level for all the age groups, except for those 70+ where it rises to the 50 percent level.

## Politics and Elections: 2020 Elections – “Stolen?”

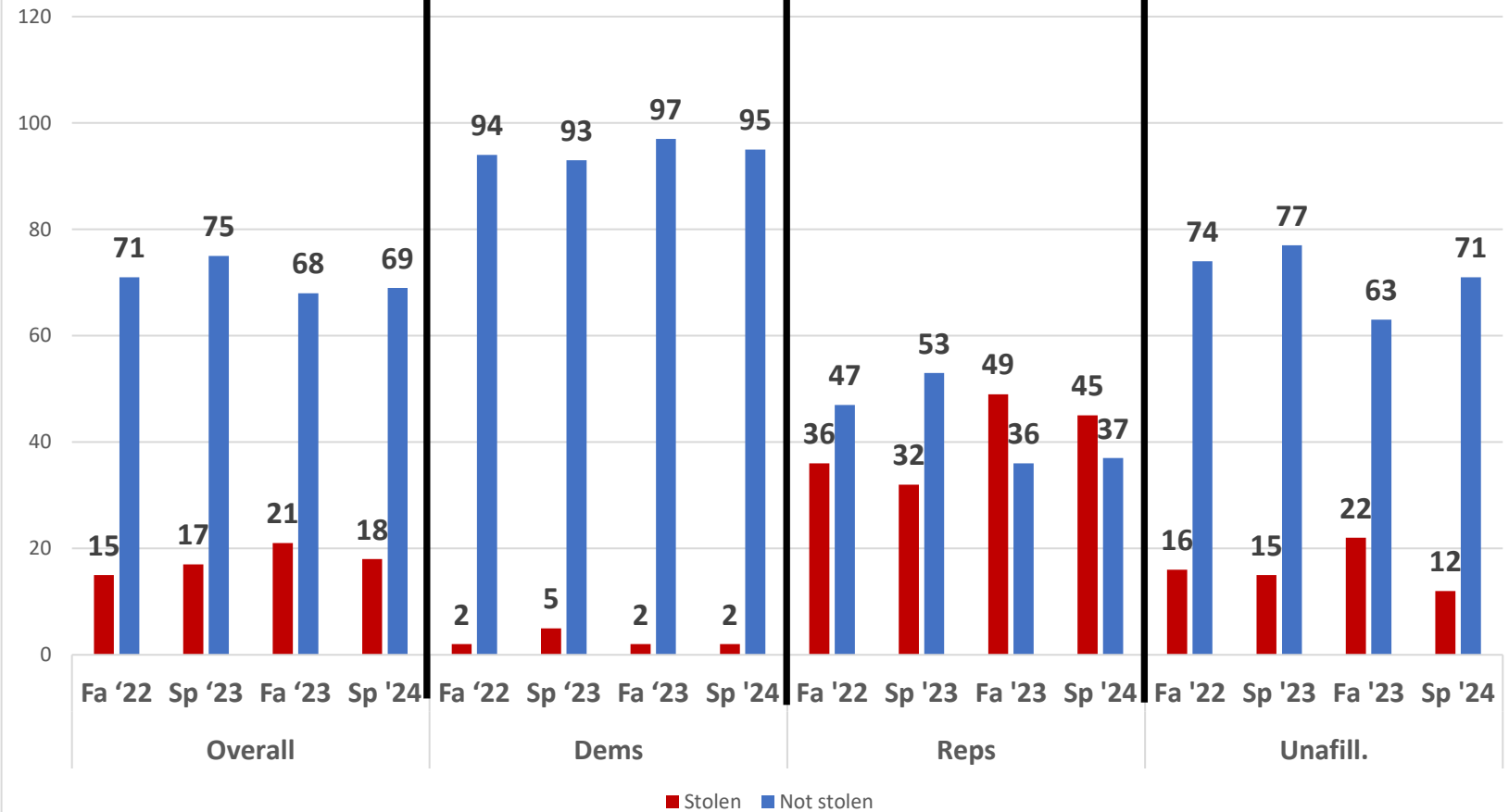
The politics part of the press release starts with the 2020 presidential election and the idea that the election was “stolen” from former President Trump. Specifically, the question asked was: **“Do you agree with the former President Trump that he actually won the last election and that it was “stolen” from him?”** This question has been asked since spring 2021. Table 54 shows the results over time, listing only the “stolen” and “not stolen” categories. Table 55 shows the actual choices faced by respondents for the last three surveys. The “Yes, fully agree” and “Yes, somewhat agree” categories were combined in Table 54 as well as in Graph 22 that visualizes the results shown in Table 54.

Table 55 shows that there hasn’t been much change in respondents’ views about the 2020 election in these terms:

- (1) Around 20% of the overall sample accepts the stolen election claim at least somewhat.
- (2) Around half of the Republican respondents accept the claim, with a rise in fall 2023 that was sustained in spring 2024.
- (3) Around 20% or fewer of unaffiliated voters accept the claim.
- (4) Under 5% of Democrats accept the claim.

While the range of responses has varied by party category, there is no clear pattern showing that the stolen election claim is less accepted now than it was in 2021.

It remains evident party identification continues to structure people's perceptions of the "stolen election" claim. Table 56 shows that ideological categories tell a clear story: those who say that they are very conservative are strongly inclined to support the stolen election claim (69%); those who are only "somewhat conservative" are inclined to reject the claim (30% agree). The percentage of "moderates" that believe the claim has varied somewhat over the various surveys – last fall the percentage was 13%; this spring it has dropped to 7%. Among even "somewhat liberals" there is a very small propensity to believe it (2%), dropping to zero among very liberal respondents. As mentioned earlier, there is no clear pattern of diminution in acceptance of the stolen election claim – the most enduring feature is the strength with which party and especially ideology structure people's perception of the truth value of the claim.

## Trump’s Prosecution - Motives

The survey also asked respondents to decide whether “efforts to prosecute former President Donald Trump” were mainly (1) meant to hold him accountable for various crimes, or (2) meant to disrupt his campaign and prevent him from running effectively for president. A majority said, “hold him accountable” (57%) compared to “disrupt his campaign” (36%) while another six percent had no opinion. Partisanship played a decisive role in shaping respondents’ conclusions: 89% of Democrats favored the “hold accountable” position (compared to only 19% of Republicans and 53% of unaffiliateds), while 79% of Republicans supported the “disrupt his campaign” stances (Democrats 8%, unaffiliateds 36%).

## 2024 Elections – Biden, Trump or ?

This section also asked about the 2024 presidential elections. The survey asked, “If the presidential elections were today, for whom would you vote?” The only specific candidates offered were Joe Biden and Donald Trump, but the question offered the choice of “3<sup>rd</sup> party candidate” and “probably wouldn’t vote.”

Table 57 shows that Joe Biden has apparently widened his lead over Donald Trump from 9 points last fall to 16 points this spring which is about the same percentage (15%) reported by the Maryland Board of Elections of the Biden margin of victory in the county over Trump in 2020.<sup>15</sup> When asked by the survey to indicate for whom they voted in 2020, the gap was a bit larger than reported by Maryland official: 48% Biden, 27% Trump – a 21-point gap. This means that among these respondents, there was a decline in relative enthusiasm for Biden. However, it is also possible that the difference is made up by new voters – those who didn’t vote in 2020.<sup>16</sup>

This spring, more Democrats (84%) were likely to vote for Biden than Republicans (72%) were to vote for Trump. Last fall, the defection rate of Democrats to Trump and Republicans to Biden was almost identical (6%, 7%); this spring the defection among Republicans was much higher (13% voting Biden) compared to Democrats voting for Trump (5%). Last fall, there was a notable willingness for Democrats (12%) and Republicans (17%) to vote for a 3<sup>rd</sup> party

candidate” rather than either of the two likely nominees. By this spring, there was more consolidation around the party nominees, especially for Biden (9% 3<sup>rd</sup> party vote) compared to Trump (11%). More Republicans (5%) said that they would probably not vote compared to Democrats (3%). What remains to be seen is whether there will be more consolidation of unaffiliated support around a major party candidate since 31% say that they would vote for a 3<sup>rd</sup> party candidate with another 12% probably not voting at all.

Table 60 shows how including the strength of party affiliation affects the outcome. Clearly the problem for both sides is that as the strength of party affiliation decreases, defections away from the likely nominees increase. As shown in both the fall 2023 and spring 2024 surveys, nearly all “strong” (97%, 92%) Democrats are ready to vote for Biden. The pattern is similar for strong Republicans voting for Trump (93%, 96%). However, among “somewhat strong” partisans, the pattern of support for the top candidates stays quite robust but drops more sharply for Trump (77%) than for Biden (87%). For those with the weakest partisan affiliation (“not very strong”), the spring survey showed that among Democrats only 48% would commit to voting for Biden – and 28% would favor Trump. Among Republicans, only 19% would vote for Trump and 49% for Biden. Table 58 shows that the strength of party affiliation isn’t *very* different for Democrats and Republicans. Given the internal conflicts within the Republican Party between pro and anti-Trump sides, it is not very surprising that there are more “not very strong” Republicans (20%) than Democrats (15%) and far fewer “strong” Republicans (39%) compared to Democrats (51%).

Among unaffiliateds, a follow-up was asked: “During elections, do you find yourself leaning more toward Republican, Democratic, third-party candidates or are you mostly voting for specific candidates without concern for party affiliation?” Most (55%) claimed to vote for the candidate, with slightly more of the others saying Democrat (23%) than Republican (19%).

Table 59 shows how these subdivisions among unaffiliateds affected the anticipated vote. Those who said that they leaned either to the Democratic or Republican sides were quite likely to vote for the party’s candidates in equal percentages – 77% of Democratic leaners for Biden and 87% of Republican leaners for Trump. In both cases, this was a consolidation of support for both candidates, although this seemed more profound for Trump due to the decline of support for a 3<sup>rd</sup> party candidate among his leaners (from 33% last fall to only 10% this spring).

Those who said that they were voting not for the party but for the candidate seemed to move away from the main party candidates and to 3<sup>rd</sup> party options (whose score went from 26% to 42%). A much larger share of those who voted for the candidate said that they probably wouldn’t vote at all.

## Voting Intentions: Senate

Given the two important vacancies affecting many Anne Arundel County voters – the U.S. Senate seat currently held by Ben Cardin, and the House of Representatives seat held by John Sarbanes, the survey inquired about voting intentions.

### U.S. Senate

There are two prominent candidates among Democrats running for the U.S. Senate: Prince George’s County Executive Angela Alsobrooks and current Representative David Trone. Among Republicans, the dominant candidate is former Maryland Governor Larry Hogan.

The survey first asked Democrats to express a choice between Alsobrooks and Trone. Table 61 shows the results for all Democrats as well as only those who said that they were very likely to vote. David Trone is ahead of Angela Alsobrooks by 6 or 7 points depending on whether all Democrats or just “likely voters” are chosen.

Table 63 shows that Hogan has approximately the same lead over either of the two Democratic candidates (17-18 points), whether all voters or just likely voters are considered. This was consistent with a poll published in the Baltimore Sun which found Hogan beating Trone by 13 points and Alsobrooks by 18 points statewide.<sup>17</sup> The AACC/CSLI poll did not find

as sharp a distinction between Trone and Alsobrooks in a match-up with Hogan, although it did find Trone leading Alsobrooks in a head-to-head matchup of just the two Democratic candidates. The Sun poll found Trone leading by 19 points, far more than the single digit lead discovered just among Anne Arundel County voters.

Table 63 shows the partisan breakdown of the vote pitting Larry Hogan against David Trone. It shows that the defection rate for Democrats was very high: 25%. Republicans were essentially unified behind Larry Hogan (5% defection to Trone), while unaffiliated voters were lopsidedly in favor of Hogan (51%, 18%) with nearly a third undecided (31%). The picture was hardly changed for Alsobrooks (Table 64).

The AACC/CSLI poll followed up by asking “What is your preference for the outcome of the U.S. Senate elections in November – the Senate controlled by Democrats or by Republicans.” Table 65 shows the results by party and overall. Voters preferred Democratic control by 16 percentage points, with some greater defection of Republicans than Democrats and unaffiliateds evenly divided.

The next question offered this prompt:

“When Larry Hogan was governor, Democrats held supermajorities in both houses of the Maryland General Assembly that ensured that Democratic priorities would pass.

This November, Democrats are defending more Senate seats in Republican-leaning states such as Montana, West Virginia, and Ohio than there are Republicans defending seats in Democrat-leaning states. Democrats currently hold a 51-49 majority in the U.S. Senate.

Should Hogan win in Maryland, this would help ensure that leadership in the US Senate would go to Republicans, with the possibility of Donald Trump also being elected and passing his conservative policy priorities. In that light, which of the following expresses your views best?”

Respondents were then offered the following choices: “I would vote for Larry Hogan,” “I would vote for the Democratic candidate for Senate in Maryland,” “I don’t know what I would do.”

As shown in Table 66, the prompt tightened the race considerably, especially among Democrats who in the hypothetical Trone vs. Hogan matchup were 59% Trone and 25% Hogan switched to 76% “Democratic candidate” and only 16% Hogan. The “undecideds” dropped from 16% to 8%. Among unaffiliateds, the pro-Hogan vote dropped from 51% to 45%, the Democratic candidate vote increased from 18% to 30% and the undecideds dropped from 31% to 25%. The Republican vote was, unsurprisingly, essentially unchanged.

The main takeaway from this exercise is to show that Larry Hogan’s significant lead over either Democratic opponent is based upon his familiarity with voters and image as an “anti-Trump” and “independent” moderate who would not necessarily bolster the MAGA wing of the Republican Party in Congress. However, when presented with the background included in the prompt, the partisan and ideological impact of tipping the Senate into Republican hands resurrected the underlying antipathy that many voters have for the prospect of a unified government under MAGA-Republican rule. This reshaped their thinking to the point of making the race for the Senate competitive.



## Voting Intentions: Congressional 3<sup>rd</sup> District

The decision by John Sarbanes to leave Congress set up a flurry of activity among Democrats seeking to replace him.<sup>18</sup> At a candidate forum held in Annapolis on April 17, no fewer than 18 Democratic candidates appeared, forcing moderators Dan Nataf and Keanuu Smith-Brown to keep strict time limits on candidates' answers. The presence of so many candidates naturally complicates the discovery of frontrunners, since the district is large encompassing large sections of Anne Arundel County, all of Howard County and a part of Carroll County. In 2022, Sarbanes won the district with 60% of the vote – making it likely that the winner of the Democratic primary will ultimately be elected to Congress. The spring survey used the results of a previous survey to highlight just some of the names of candidates, with the option for respondents to write in the name of someone else.<sup>19</sup>

Table 67 shows the results offered by voters when asked, “**This question is just for Democrats living** in the 3rd Congressional District who currently have retiring Congressman John Sarbanes as your representative. Many candidates are running to replace Congressman John Sarbanes. Looking at just some of the Democratic candidates, which of the following are you most likely to support when the primaries are held in May?” Respondents were offered a link to the Maryland Board of Elections list of candidates who had filed by the time of the survey. Likely voters were used to calculate the percentages. Table 67 also lists the findings of two other surveys conducted within the 3<sup>rd</sup> congressional district.

Since the AACC/CSLI survey does not extend beyond Anne Arundel County, it is not possible to know to what degree results within this county continue through Howard and Carroll counties. The poll from last March carried in the Baltimore Banner found these results for the overall district: “State Sen. Sarah Elfreth had the most support, at 9%. She was followed by former Capitol Police officer Harry Dunn (7%); state Del. Mike Rogers (6%); businessman

Dominguez and lawyer Michael Coburn (both at 3%); State Sen. Clarence Lam and Del. Mark Chang (both at 2%); and Del. Terri Hill and lawyer John Morse (both at 1%). And 13% said they would vote for “someone else” if the primary election were held now.”

The AACC/CSLI spring poll differed a bit from this listing of candidates. Both polls put State Senator Sarah Elfreth in the lead although the absolute values were quite different: 29% vs. 9%. Both polls put Harry Dunn with 7 percent. Both showed Dominquez, Hill, Lam and Morse with 3 percent or less. Differences were found concerning Mark Chang’s vote percentage: 8% vs. 2% as well as the percentage saying “Someone else” – 1% vs. 13%.<sup>20</sup> The percentage saying undecided/unsure was very similar: 49%, 51%.

Another poll conducted by Harry Dunn’s campaign and conducted April 7-10 showed a much tighter race between himself and Sarah Elfreth. Summarizing the results in an article in MarylandMatters.org: “Dunn’s poll, conducted April 7-10, found the political neophyte, who gained notoriety for battling with insurrectionists on Jan. 6, 2021, and writing a best-seller about it, was the preference of 22% of the voters in the initial matchup, while Elfreth, who has served in the Senate for five years, took 18%. State Sen. Clarence K. Lam (D-Howard and Anne Arundel) was next with 8%.”

The listing of the top two candidates parallels the fundraising amounts since Dunn and Elfreth have collected the greatest in contributions.<sup>21</sup> The key finding of Dunn’s survey is the image that the race has consolidated into a two-person event, with a lot of undecided voters still in the picture as “likely but currently uncommitted voters.”

Dunn benefits from a giant financial advantage and notable endorsements such as Congressperson Nancy Pelosi and former Majority Whip Jim Clyburn.<sup>22</sup> Such endorsements probably are consequential among the large percentage of those who remain likely voters but are undecided. Elfreth relies on endorsements from less recognized local elected officials such as County Executive Steuart Pittman, Howard County Councilmember Christiana Rigby, unions like the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Local 500 of the SEIU and interest groups like the Sierra Club.<sup>23</sup>

Dunn’s website lists only two Maryland figures on its endorsement page (former Democratic Party Chair Susan Turnbull and Montgomery County Councilmember Will Jawando) and few interest groups - only “Moms Demand Action” and “Vote Vets” were mentioned. That Dunn could not find any current officials living within the 3<sup>rd</sup> Congressional district may not be surprising given his lack of residency within the district and absence of any

political experience in Maryland. Dunn is clearly the “celebrity candidate” in the race, well known only for his stand during the January 6, 2021, insurrection rather than any experience with legislation and policy. Evidently any effort to dethrone him as a possible frontrunner would focus on his lack of legislative experience and unfamiliarity with voters in the district.

Among **Republicans**, the field was even more poorly defined, with 68% saying “unsure.” Two candidates seemed to gain the most attention – Thomas Harris (5%) and Berney Flowers (4%) with Anthony Baker Jr. at 2% and Jordan Mayo at 1%. All the others had less than one percent. The great majority (71%) said “unsure.”

## Issues, Party and Candidates

### Open-ended Comments Organized by ChatGPT

The survey used two formats to assess the key issues in the mind of respondents. The first was an open-ended question: **“What is the most serious issue facing residents of the United States at the present time.”** The second format asked voters to “use sliders to indicate the level of importance for issues that are most “top of mind” when you consider voting in May and November.”

The open-ended comments were organized by ChatGPT and are presented in Table 68. They are not used for any subsequent analysis by party or candidate. The second group of closed-ended questions will be presented and used for a more detailed analysis by party and candidate starting with Table 69.

Table 68 shows that three issues were the most cited: border security/immigration (30%), economic challenges (26%) and political dysfunction and partisanship (22%). This ranking parallels quite closely the results shown on Table 69 where political polarization/threat to democracy, inflation and immigration are top issues. The open-ended comments clearly underrepresented the seriousness of abortion – perhaps showing the limits of relying only on volunteered comments and/or the use of AI to organize such complex material.<sup>24</sup>

## Issues: Closed-ended Results

Tables 69 and 70 show the results for the closed-ended questions by listing the percentage that gave the item a score of “5” on a scale of 1 to 5.

Overall, the top issues were “harm to the country should the other party’s candidate win” (57%), inflation (45%), immigration (44%), the January 6 events/threats to democracy (44%), and abortion (43%).

There were significant differences between the parties regarding the top issues. For Democrats, the top concerns are the harm to the country should the other party’s candidate win (68%), the January 6 events/threats to democracy (62%), followed by abortion (58%) and climate change (51%).

For Republicans, the top issues were immigration (68%), inflation (55%) and the harm to the country should the other party’s candidate win (53%).

Among unaffiliateds, the key issues were the harm to the country should the other party’s candidate win (44%), abortion (40%), inflation (39%) and immigration (37%). This group of voters had lower issue intensity overall when compared to voters registered with a party.

Parties face the complex task of both trying to mobilize their own registered voters by focusing on issues of decisive importance to them, while also appealing to the unaffiliated voters who tend to vote by issues and candidates in a less predictable ideological and partisan manner.

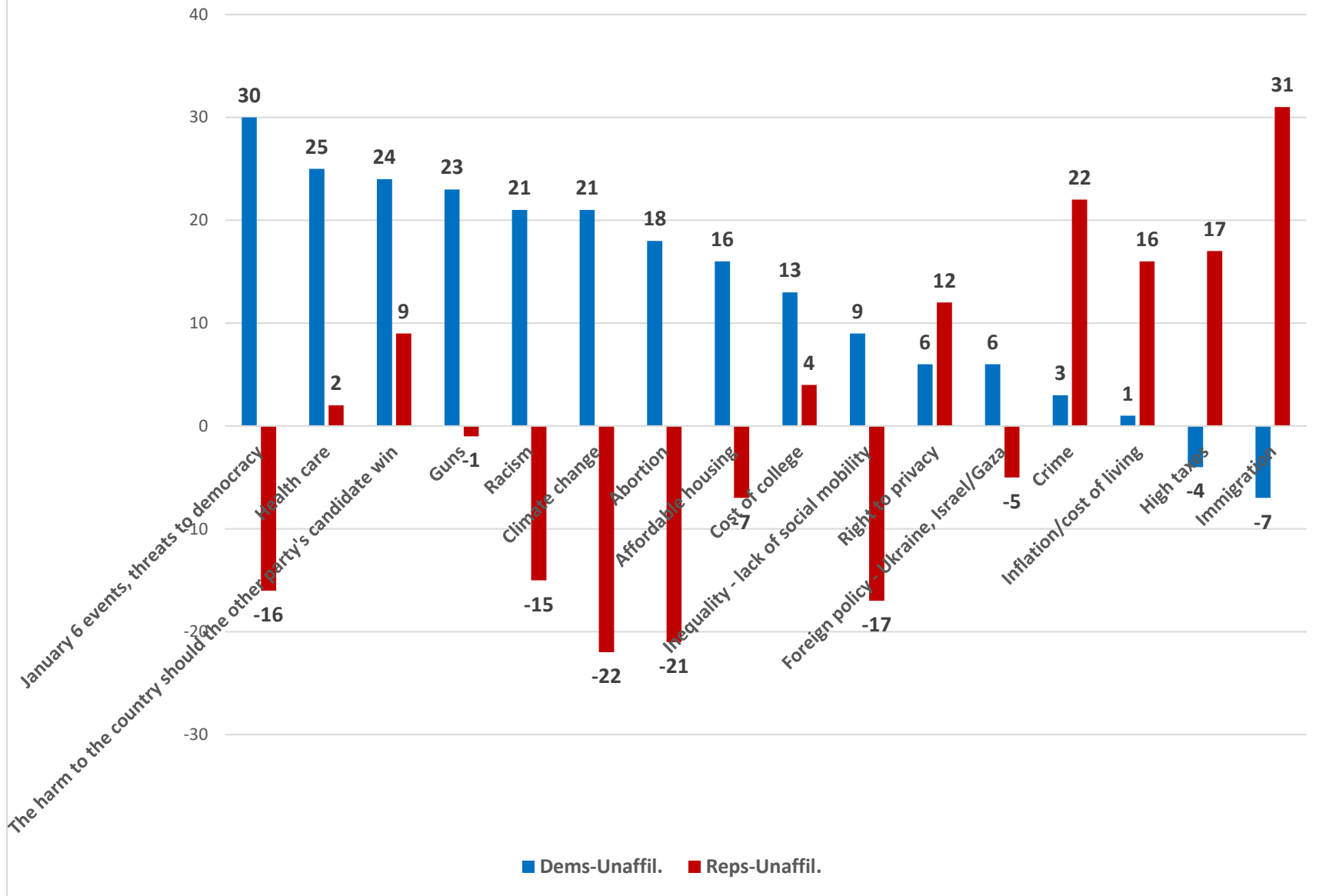
Graph 23 shows the results of subtracting the level of high concern expressed by unaffiliated voters from the level of concern shown by Democratic and Republican registered voters. The goal was to show those areas where the parties’ members were about equally concerned with certain issues, and where their levels of concern greatly exceeded that of unaffiliated voters.

What Graph 23 reveals is that Democrats probably overemphasize certain issues such as threats to democracy, health care, harm to the country should the other party's candidate win, guns and racism. By contrast, they seem closer to unaffiliated voters on issues such as inflation, foreign policy, high taxes, immigration, the right to privacy and crime.

Republicans overemphasize immigration, crime, and inflation while also underemphasizing abortion, climate change, threats to democracy as well as racism and inequality. They seemed closer to unaffiliateds on guns, health care, cost of college and foreign policy.

These findings show that both parties tend to focus on their party members' core issues to the point that these depart from the concerns of less partisan and ideologically coherent voters. Swing voters might wish that Democrats had better approaches to inflation or gun regulation, while hoping that Republicans held different positions on abortion and climate change. In the end, unaffiliated voters will need to decide which combination of positions offered by each party presents the most satisfying cluster – aside from the specific pros and cons of individual candidates. Thus, unaffiliated voters will need to know more about Larry Hogan's stance on abortion or immigration (where unaffiliateds are more liberal than core Republicans) while also better understanding Trone or Alsobrooks stance on guns and inflation.

Graph 23: Democrats and Republicans Minus Unaffiliated on Issues





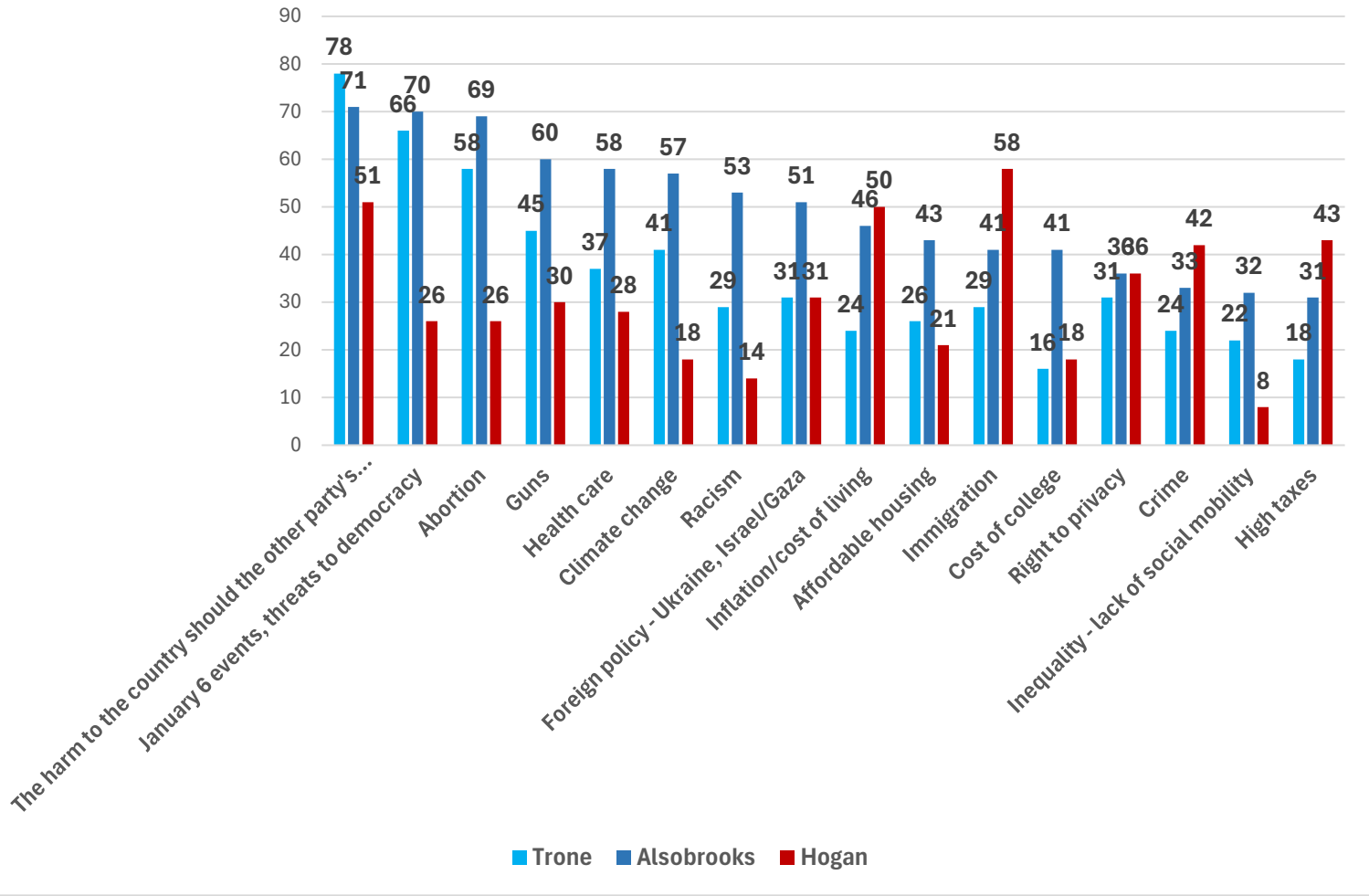
Looking next at the importance of issues in the race for Senate, Graph 24 shows how the voters for Alsobrooks, Trone and Hogan compare.

Table 70 expands on the data in Table 69 but including the relevant percentages of a candidate's supporters who gave each issue a score of "5." Information on the graphs below is derived from the data on Table 70.

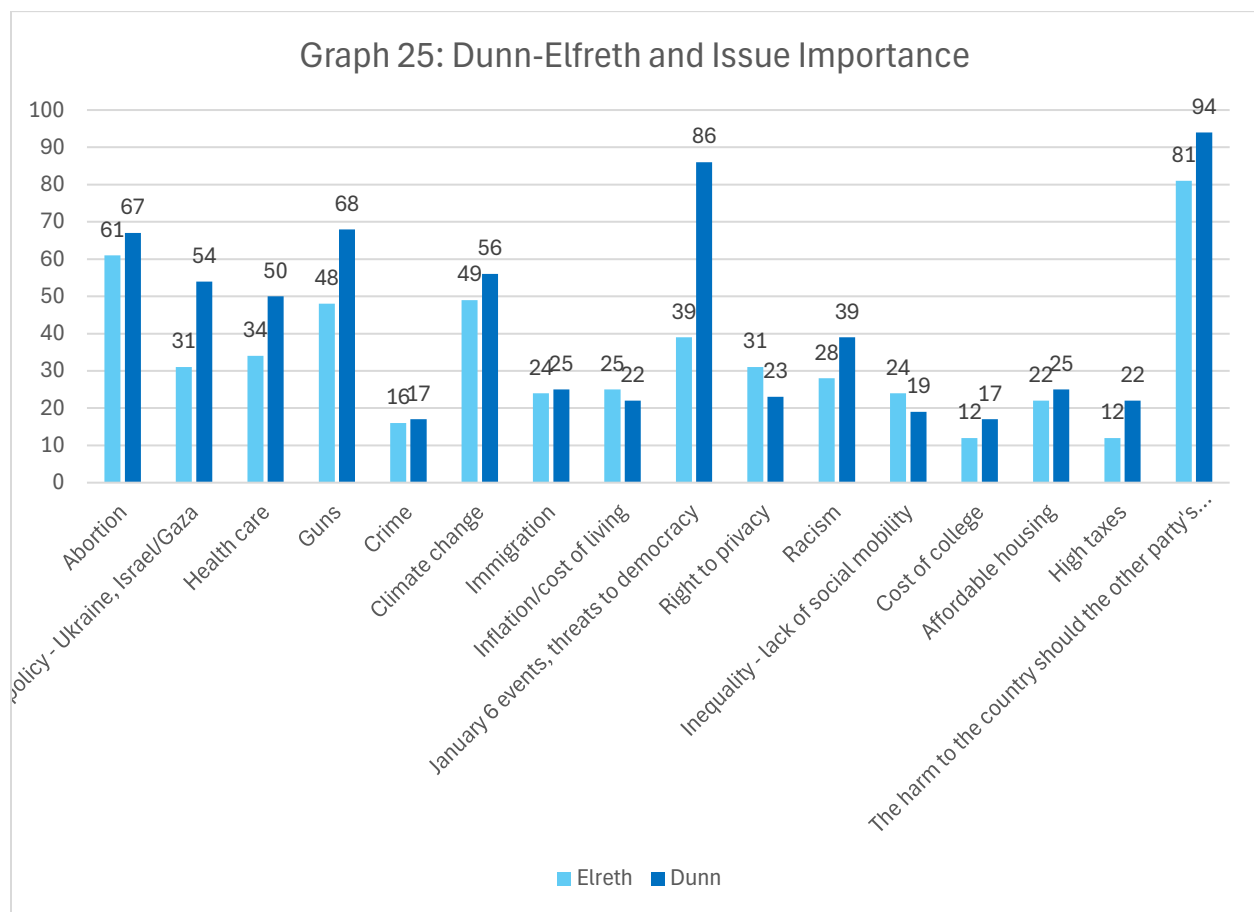
Graph 24 reveals that while Trone and Alsobrooks have voters who generally prioritize the same issues, Trone voters were much less issue focused than were Alsobrooks' voters. Thus, the majority of their supporters highlight the importance of abortion, but the score was 11 points lower for Trone than for Alsobrooks. Issues that showed the greatest gaps were racism (24 pp), cost of college (25 pp), inflation (22 pp), health care (21 pp), and foreign policy (20 pp). Overall, the average concern for policy was much higher for Alsobrooks voters (50%) than for Trone's (36%).

Impressively, this lack of concern for issues was also typical of Hogan voters whose average "issue score" was only 31%. These findings suggest that while Trone would be able to appeal on policy to Democrats with high (but lower than Alsobrooks) scores on abortion, threats to democracy and climate change, he would be less polarizing to potential moderates and unaffiliateds who might swing between Hogan and a Democratic candidate.

Finally, looking at just the Elfreth-Dunn matchup in the 3<sup>rd</sup> congressional district, there was some similarity to the Trone-Alsobrooks comparison made above: Elfreth’s supporters were less issue motivated (average issue score was 34%) than were Dunn’s (43%). The latter’s signature issue was his role on January 6, 2021, and this seems clearly acknowledged by his voters 86% of whom gave this a score of “5” on the issue scale, compared to only 39% of Elfreth’s voters having done so. Clearly, for all those whose singular focus was the threat to democracy that the insurrection posed, Dunn is their symbolic leader. As a secondary generalization, it also appears that Dunn’s voters are more liberal and ideologically motivated, with higher scores than Elfreth’s on a variety of issues including abortion, foreign policy, health care, guns, climate change, racism and even “high taxes.” Elfreth’s career has been focused on state issues and the push/pull of legislative politics with the Maryland General Assembly. That experience leads itself less easily to the national stage where polarization and partisan mobilization appear more decisive than the nuances of policy.

## Job Approval for the President, Governor, and County Executive

Each AACC/CSLI community survey asks respondents to indicate approval or disapproval of the job performed by an incumbent in office. Graph 26 shows the percentages saying, “approve” for the county executive, the governor and the president.<sup>25</sup> There are open-ended comments associated with each office – see Appendices P through S.

### Presidential Job Approval

The first job approval focus will be on the president. Historically, prior to the 2020 elections for president, our poll found that former President Trump’s job approval was 43%, just slightly higher than the previous spring when it was 42%.

One year later, in fall 2021, Joe Biden’s job approval registered 54% – combining “strong” with “somewhat approve. By spring 2022, Biden’s job approval had dropped to 46% echoing a generally declining job approval score in national polls which reached 41% according to [realclearpolitics.com](https://www.realclearpolitics.com) (RCP) in the same period as the spring 2022 poll (see Table 71). The spring 2023 survey showed Biden as having reached a new low in job approval (41%); the spring 2024 survey found a **rise** in Biden’s job approval numbers from 44% to 48%. This was considerably higher than the average of polls shown on [realclearpolitics.com](https://www.realclearpolitics.com) – 40%.<sup>26</sup> Given that the margin of Biden’s election win in 2020 was much higher than Trump’s that year, it isn’t surprising that Biden remains a bit more popular in the county than nationally, but the growing disenchantment with Republican politics in Anne Arundel County – where the decline in Republican Party registration has been significant over the last few years – should also be taken into account as a factor explaining the discrepancy between national and local percentages.<sup>27</sup>

Graph 26 shows the pattern for both poll sources –AACC/CSLI as well as Gallup/RCP. Table 71 shows the overall job approval score over the period spring 2015 to spring 2024. Table 72 shows presidential job approval from spring 2022 to spring 2024 by party as well as overall.

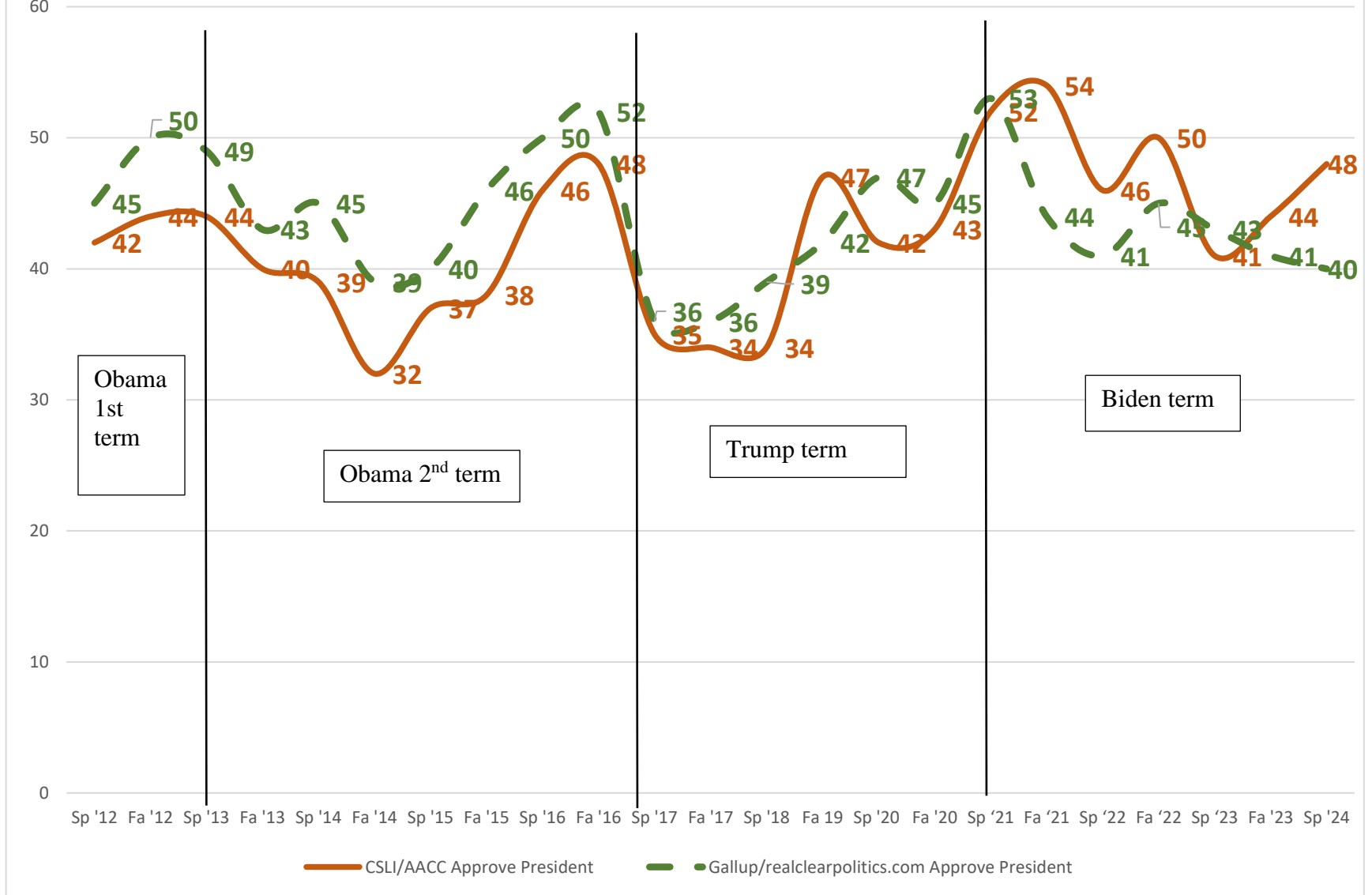

## Gubernatorial Job Approval

Former Governor Larry Hogan set a high bar for job approval as he ended his governorship with job approval scores above 70 percent. Wes Moore would seem to have a difficult time creating the broad coalition of Democrats, Republicans and unaffiliateds to sustain similar job approval scores. It seemed inevitable that Moore would be very unlikely to hold on to most of the Republican Party, implying that his job approval will ultimately depend mostly on Democrats as well as liberal or moderate unaffiliateds. The results are shown on Tables 73 and 74, as well as Graph 27.

We now have three results for Moore's job approval – spring/fall 2023 and spring 2024. The following observations seem warranted:

- (1) While there was initially a 26-point gap between Hogan's last job approval score (75%) and Moore's first score in spring 2023 (49%) that gap narrowed to just 16 points by spring 2024.
- (2) Moore's job approval improvement has been based on maintaining a high score among Democrats and continuing improvement in scores among unaffiliateds.
- (3) Republicans' support has varied from 37% to 25% to 33% this spring – showing that at least for now, there is a plateau in support in the mid-30s.
- (4) It seems unlikely that there will be much room for further enhancement of Moore's job approval unless the Republican plateau is overcome or there is a significant jump in approval scores among unaffiliateds.<sup>28</sup>

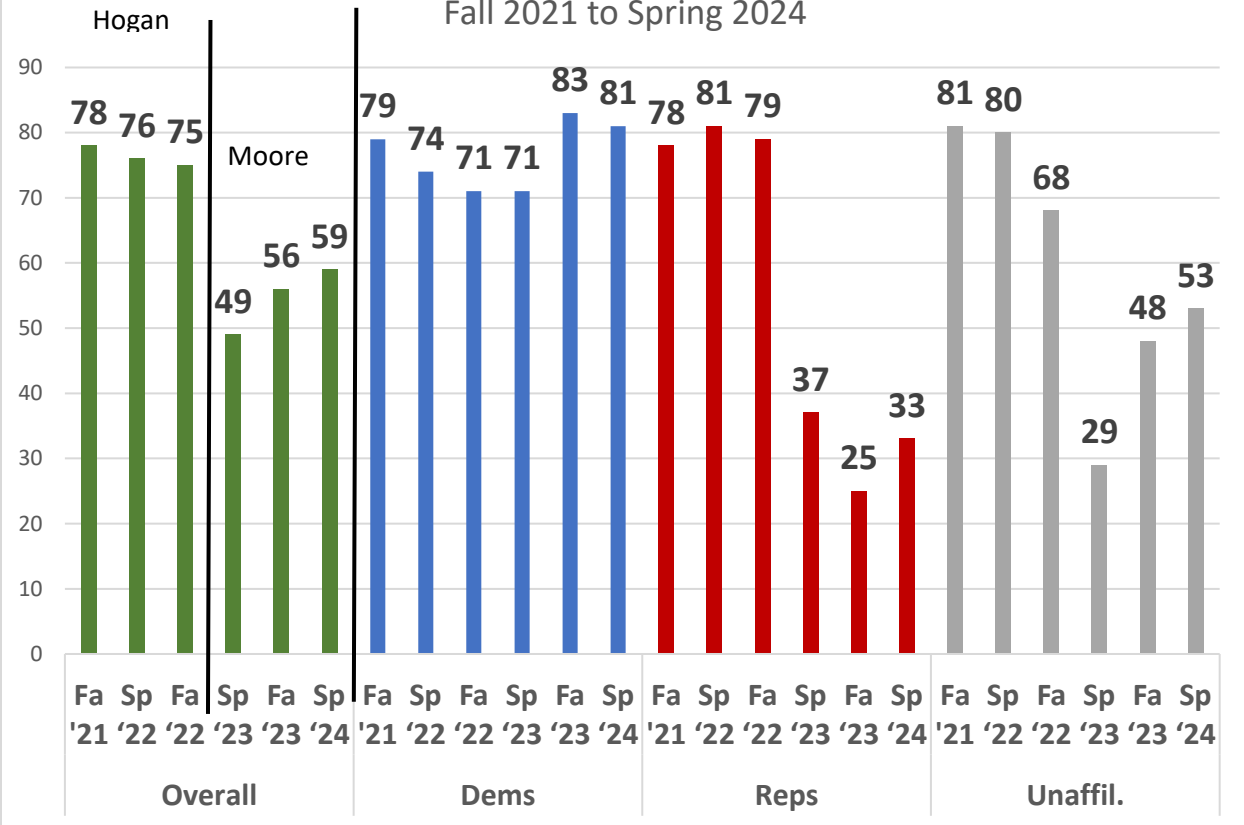

## County Executive Job Approval

Anne Arundel county executives have had a difficult time knowing exactly where they stand with the public due to the relatively large percentages of respondents who don't know enough to offer an evaluation. On average, between a fifth and a fourth of respondents say "don't know" when asked about the county executive's job approval. With County Executive Steuart Pittman in his second term, it might seem that there would be growing recognition of his performance while in office, but this hasn't been seen in the survey results. This tends to create the impression of relatively low job approval, looking only at the absolute values of the percentages in the "strongly+somewhat" approve line in Table 75 – for this spring, 45%. One way to circumvent this issue is to note the net approval score – this means adding strongly and somewhat approve together and then subtracting the somewhat and strongly disapprove scores.

According to the scores in Table 75, Pittman has essentially maintained a similar net approval score for the last two surveys – last fall it was 15%, this spring it was 14% and was based mostly on an improved score among unaffiliateds (from 2% to 13%) – see Table 75a. Table 75 shows that there wasn't much change among ideological categories. Graph 28 shows job approval scores for the president, governor and county executive from spring 2014 to spring 2024.

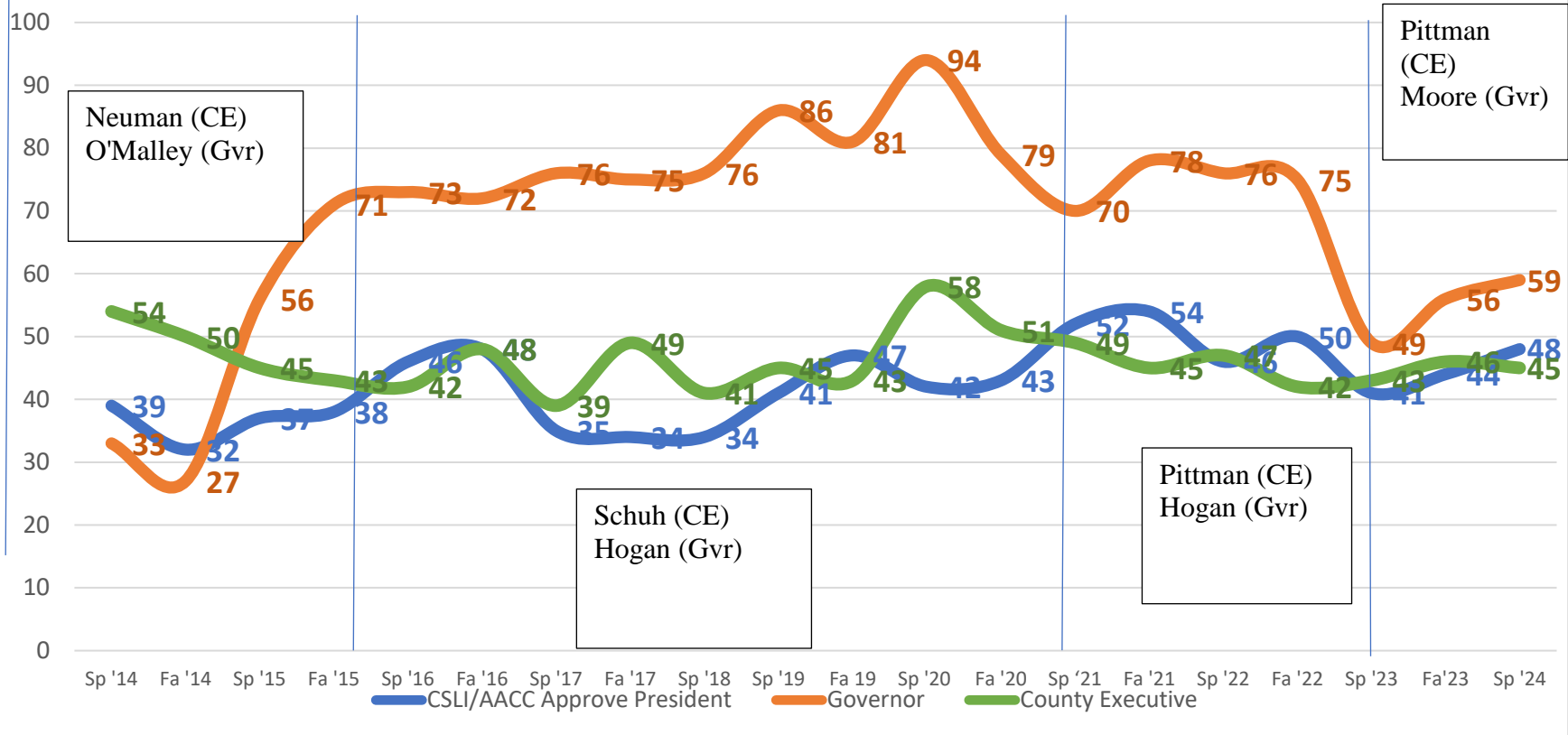

## **Legislatures and Supreme Court – Job Approval**

The spring 2021 survey included a first look at legislatures and job approval. The institutions included were the Anne Arundel County Council, the Maryland General Assembly, and the U.S. Congress. The fall 2021 survey added the Anne Arundel Board of Education as well as the U.S. Supreme Court. The updated results are shown on Tables 77 and 78 as well as Graph 29. Overall, there were no notable changes from last fall.

As in the past, none of the state and local institutions have had particularly impressive “strongly approve” percentages (from 6 to 9 percent); all the local institutions had very high “unsure” scores (from 23 to 27 percent). The “don’t know” scores were very high for these items (23% to 27%).

In Table 79 (and Graph 30) are the scores for each institution by party registration from spring 2022 to spring 2024. As in the past, those institutions in which a party has a majority were usually more highly rated than in institutions in which the party was in a minority. It is not a surprise that Democrats think more highly of the Anne Arundel County Council or the Maryland General Assembly than do Republicans given Democratic majorities in each. Conversely, it might be expected that Republicans would have a high job approval score for the Supreme Court (65%) compared to Democrats (12%).

Congress was distinct in that neither party (nor unaffiliateds) was inclined to give it high marks – it registered the lowest scores of the series both overall as well as among partisans.

Lastly, the Supreme Court seems headed to being regarded as another partisan institution rather than something “above politics” since there is a 44-point gap between Democrats (12%) and Republicans (65%) in job approval scores. Overall, the middling or very low scores with underlying party polarization offer long-term challenges to the legitimacy of each of these national institutions.

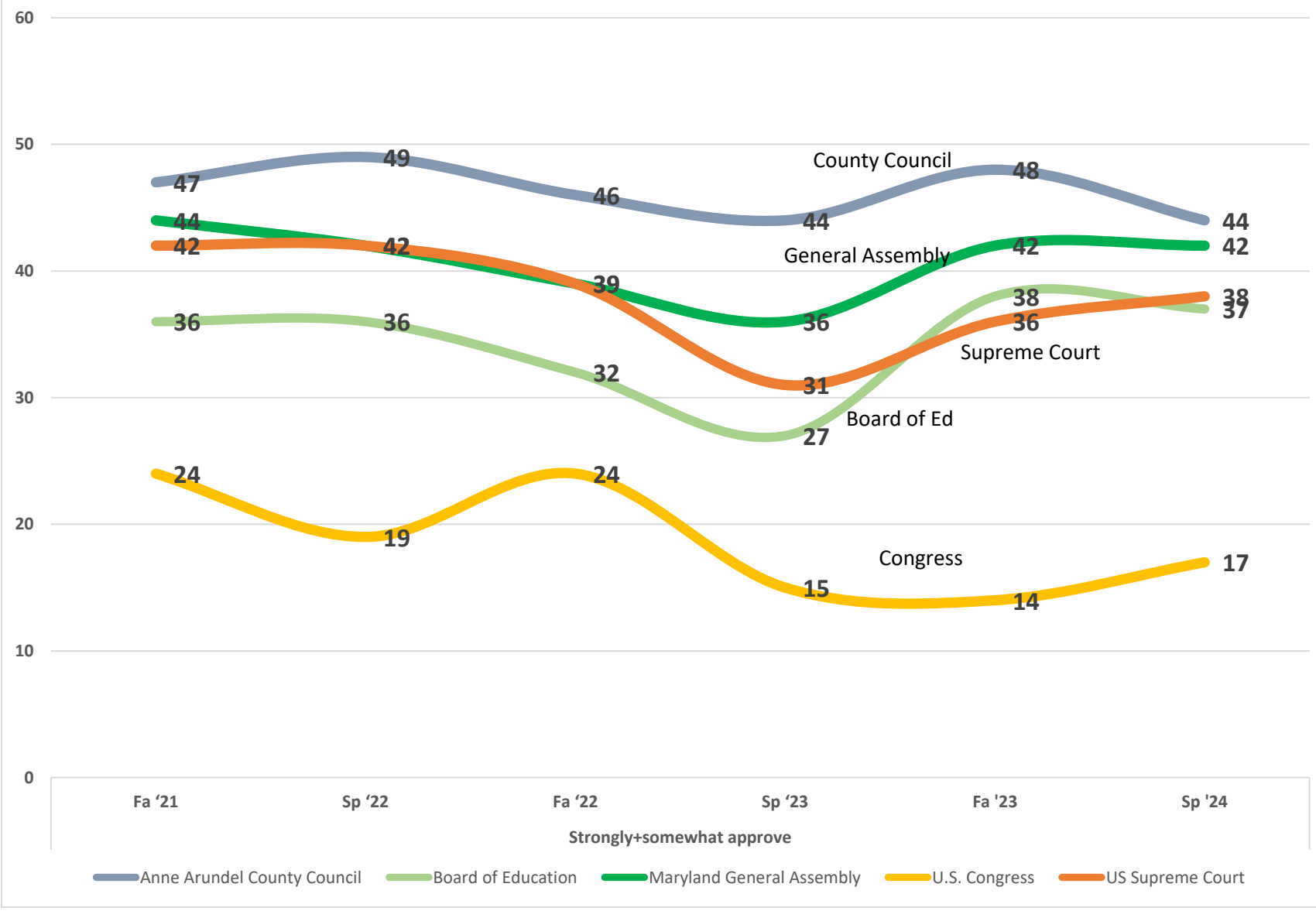

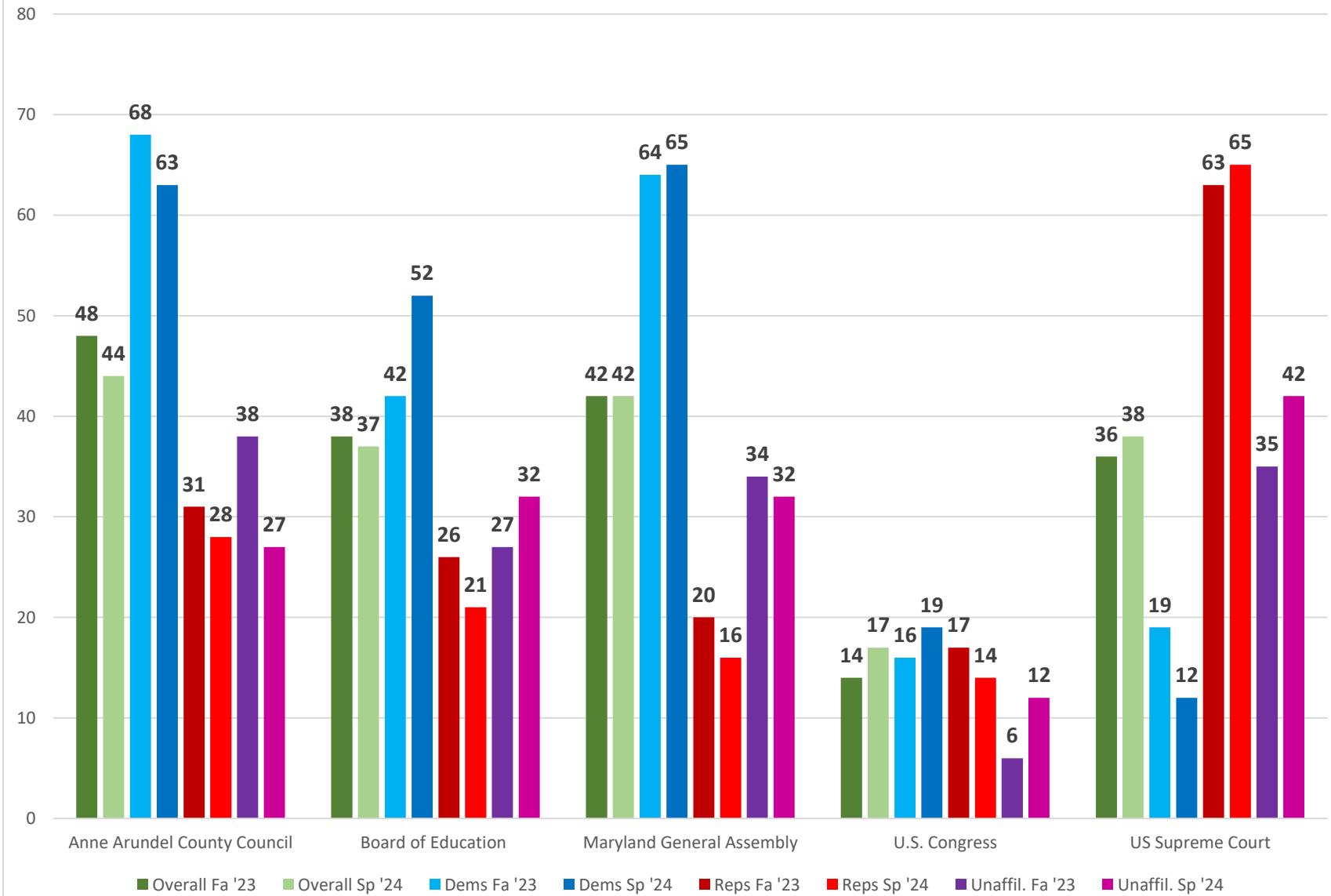

Graph 30: Legislatures and Supreme Court by Party (Fall 2023, Spring 2024)



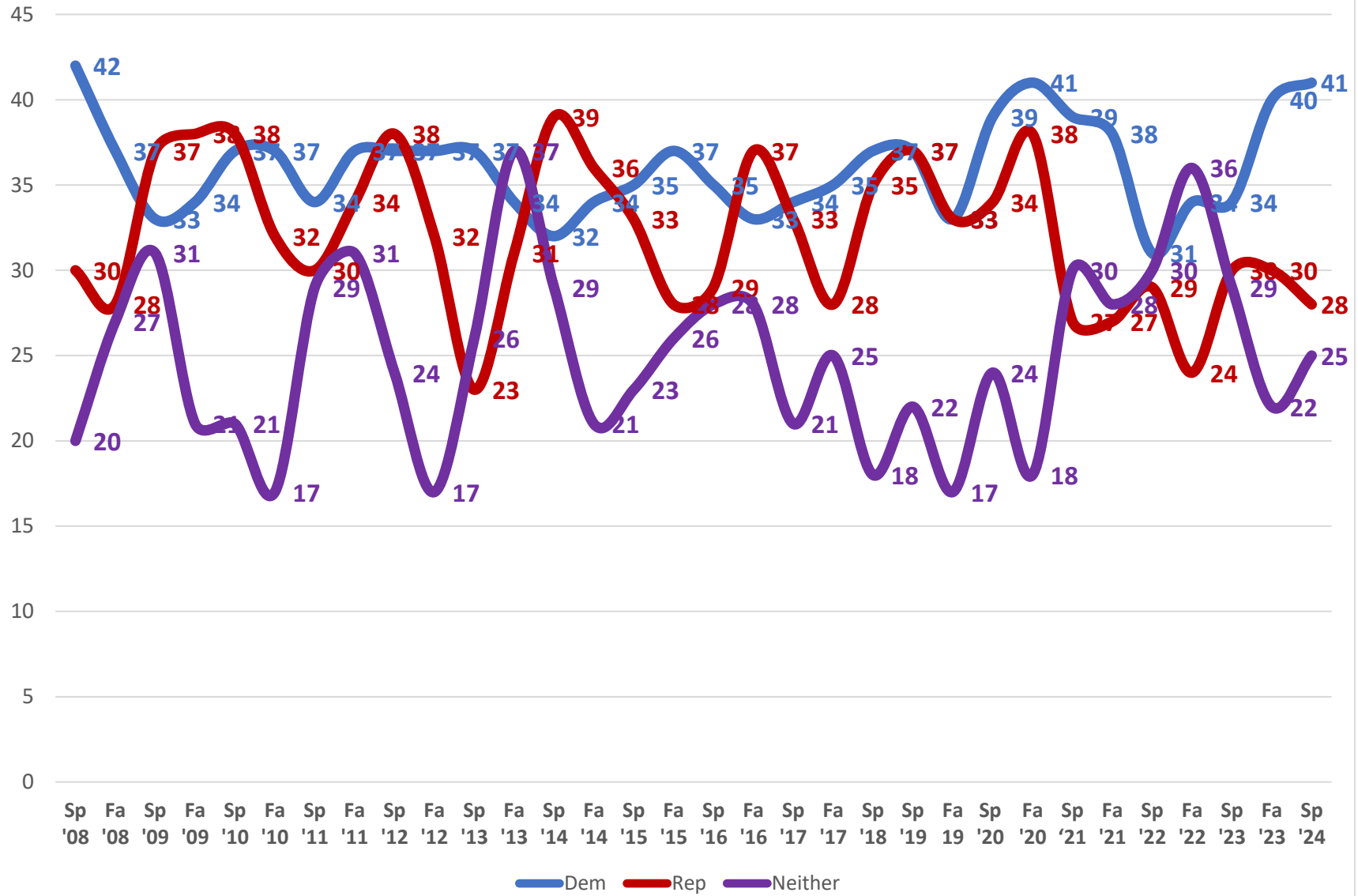
## **Trust in Political Parties**

Since 2008, AACC/CSLI surveys have asked “which party do you trust to do a better job in coping with the main problems the nation faces over the next few years.” Graph 31 shows that there have been some sharp oscillations on the Republican side, scores as low as 23% and as high as 39%. The current value – 28% - is near that party’s typical score range over the last three years. It fell some 10 points after the January 6, 2021, insurrection at the Capitol and has never really recovered since.

Democrats have shown less variation in trust levels, ranging from 32 to 42%. The current score is 41% a 1-point improvement from last fall and continues the wide gap between itself and the Republicans over the last year.

Those saying “neither” have varied the most, from a low of 17% to a high of 37%. The rebound in the Democrats’ score diminished the value of the “neither” score, dropping from 29% to only 22% last fall, but rebounding 3 points since then for a total of 25% this spring. The rise in the Democrats’ score was mainly based on the decrease in the Republican score.

## Special Section: Cellphone Use, Social Media, Video Games

The spring survey included a special section that focused on cell phone usage. A follow-up asked about the impact of the use of smartphones, social media and video games upon mental health and time management.

The first question asked, “On a typical day during waking hours, about how often do you check your smartphone for text messages, emails, notifications, news, or other information on social media?” Table 80 shows that 57% check their phones at least once an hour. Table 81 and Graph 31 shows that men are more likely to check their phones at least once every 30 minutes compared to women. The latter are concentrated in the 1-3 hour range. Among age groups, younger people were the most likely to check their phones frequency – 61% at least once an hour. Among those 50-59 that percentage dropped to 28% - for those over 70 it was just 15%.

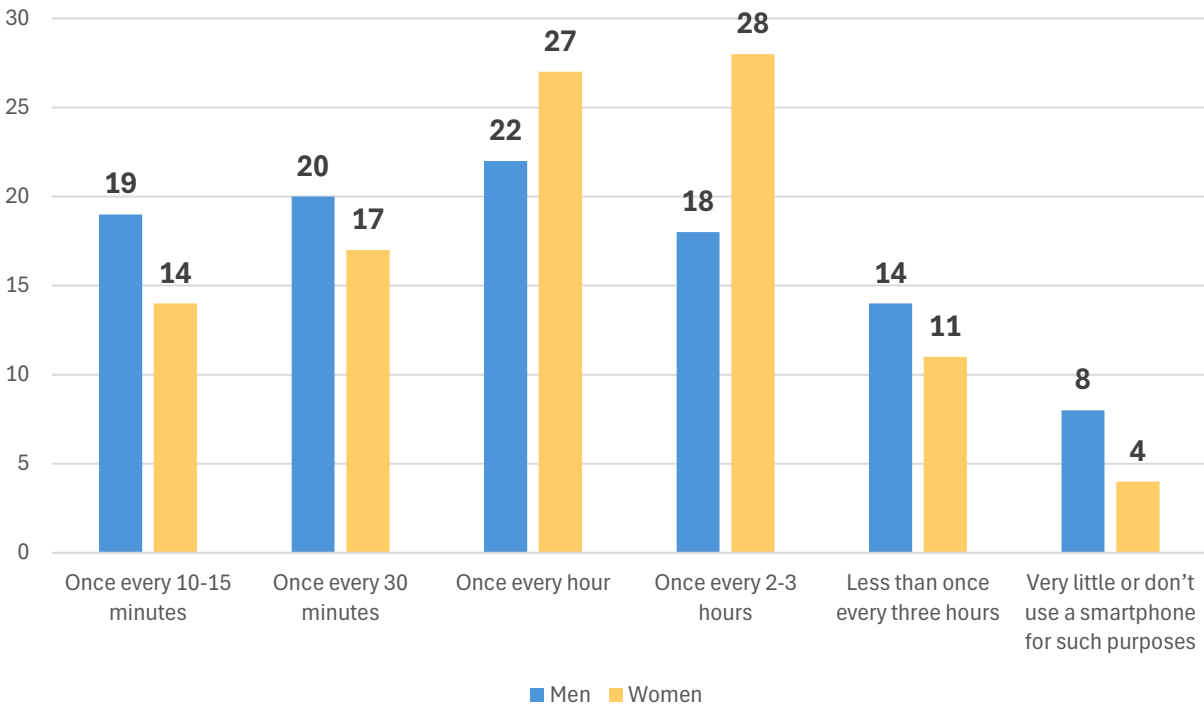

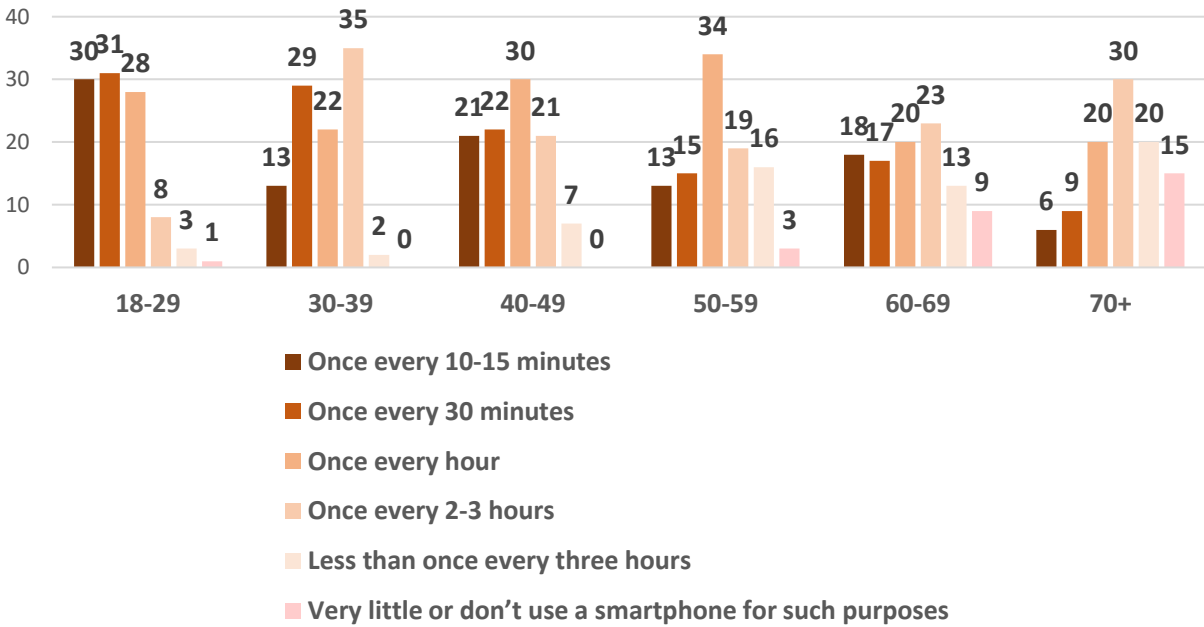

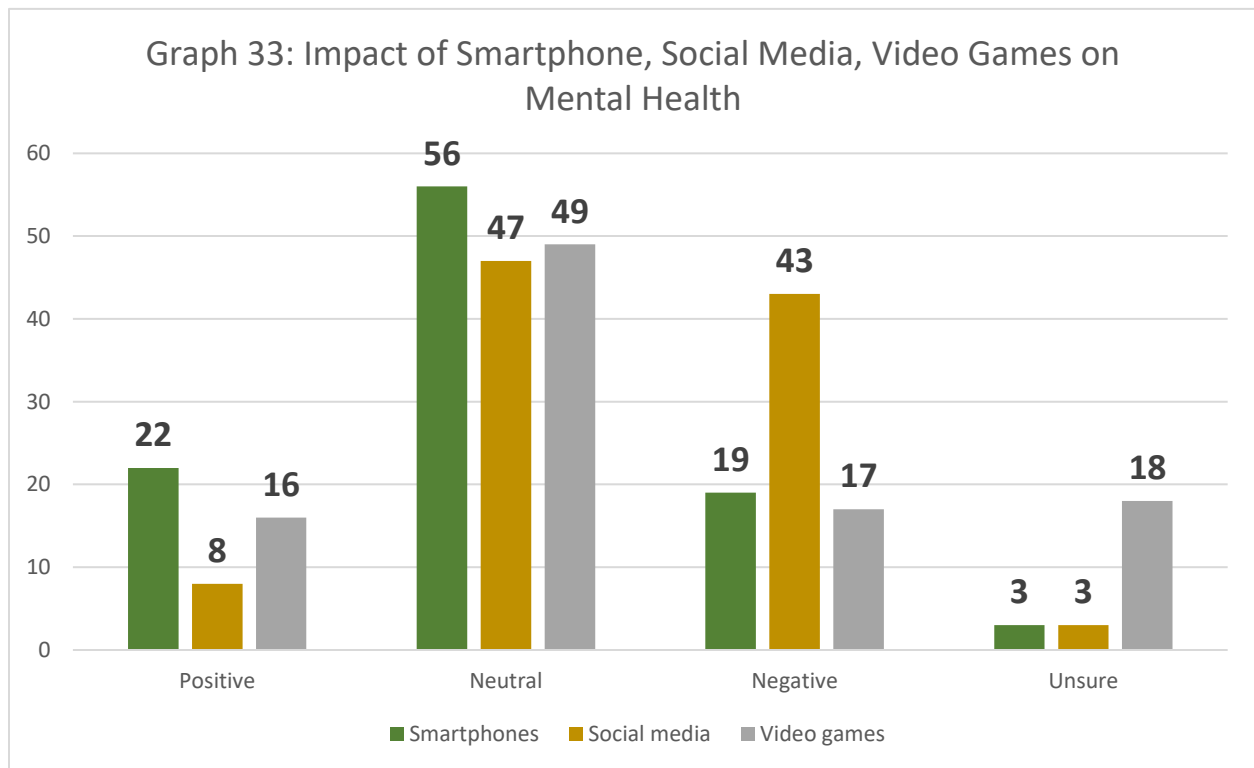
- (1) Impacted you in a positive or negative way regarding your mental health (anxiety, depression, loss of self-esteem)

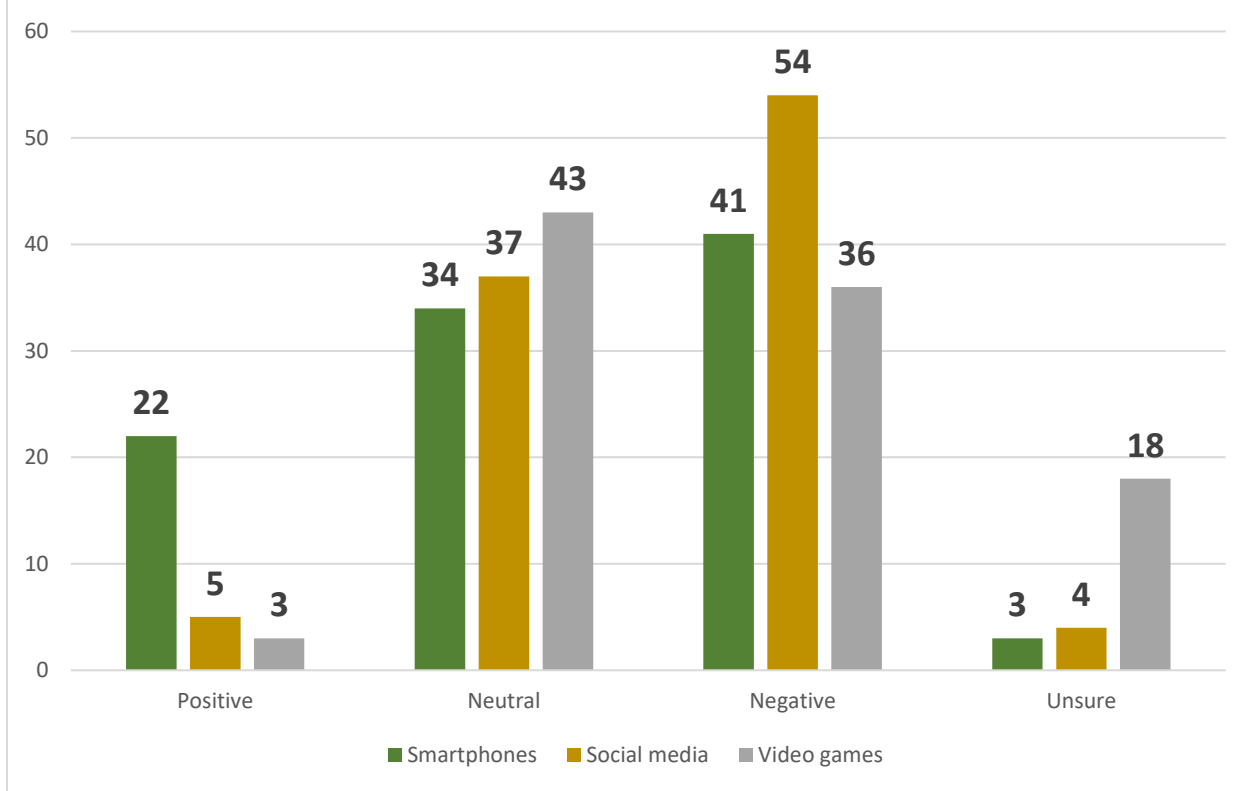

Graph 33 depicts results, highlighting especially the high negative impact on mental health scores received for social media at least compared to smartphones or video games.



The story wasn't much different for time management. Graph 34 shows that a majority (54%) felt that social media had a negative impact on time management – compared to only 5% claiming that the impact was positive. Overall, the negative scores for time management were considerably higher than for the impact on mental health.

## Special Section: Group Identities

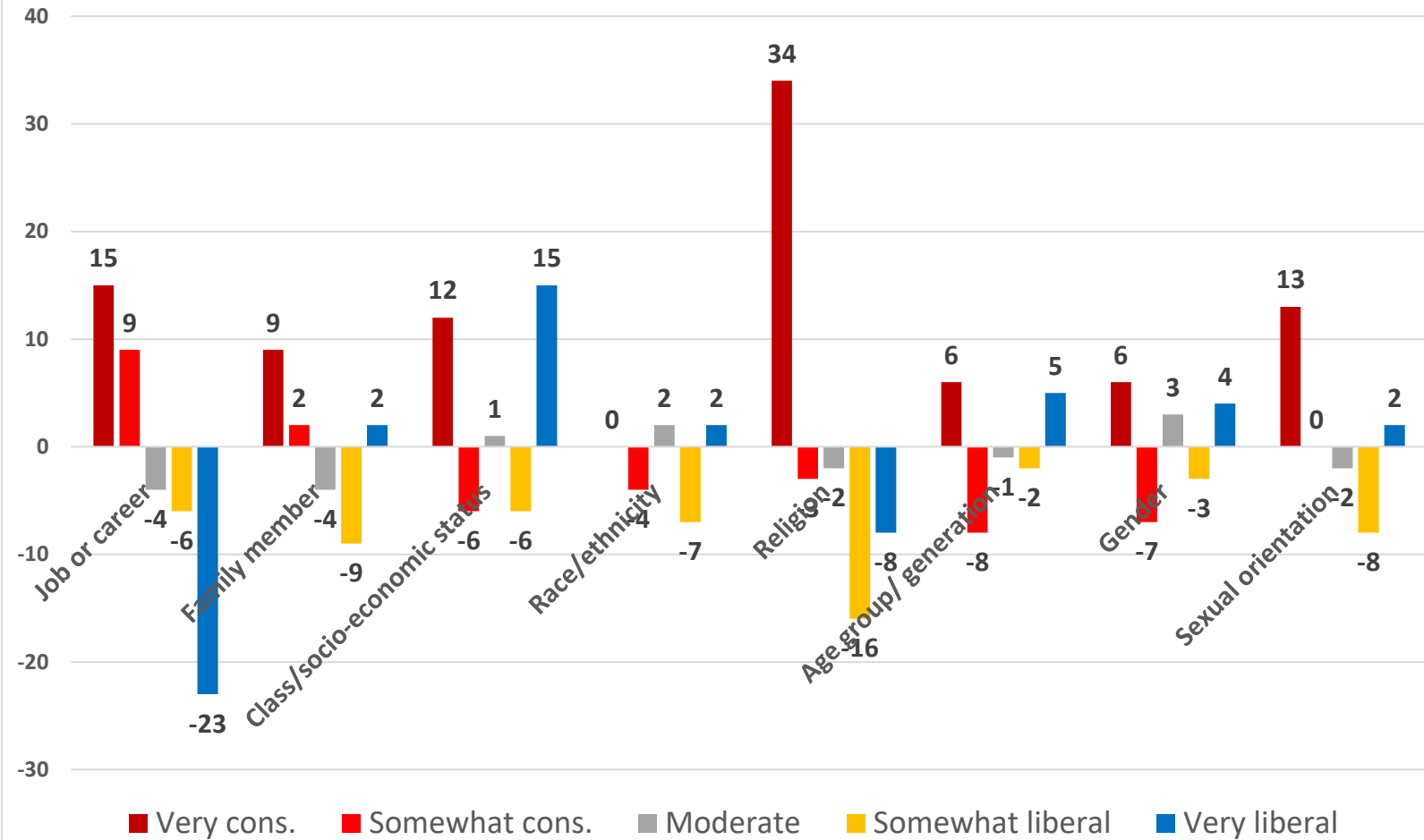
The last new section to be discussed here focuses on the strength of group identities. The survey asked respondents to indicate how strongly “do each of these traits shape your identity?” Table 83 shows the percentage that used the slider to offer a score of at least 75%. Also shown on that table are the scores received for each ideological group.

Graph 35 highlights the distance percentages are from the mean in each of the five ideological categories. The ideological category least likely to waver from the mean are “moderates” followed by the somewhat liberal/conservative categories. Those who were “very conservative” seemed to stand out for their religious identity – which was 34 points over the mean value. This was the most extreme group association found for any of the ideological categories. The second most extreme group association was between “very liberals” and “job or career” – in this case, very liberals were 23 points *below* the mean. Very conservatives also stood out regarding class/socio economic status (+12), job/career (+15), and sexual orientation (+13). Very liberals seemed to stand out for class/socio-economic status (+15), while somewhat liberals were below average regarding religious identity (-16).

## **Methodology**

The survey polled a random sample of 741 county residents who were at least 18 years old. Interviewing was conducted online primarily using a database of members of the AACC/CSLI web panel who have been recruited when conducting previous telephone interviews. Students participated in the selection of topics and analysis of results as well as respondents to the survey. There was also outreach to other residents through the assistance of the EyeOnAnnapolis.com and a purchased email list of county residents. The survey was in the field from April 5 to 14. There was about a 3.5% statistical margin of error; the error rate was higher for subgroups such as “Democrats” or “men.” The dataset was weighted by gender, political party, age, race, council district and education to better represent the general population.

I taught DEI at the US State Department and elsewhere for 23 years

DEI appears most often to amount to little more than progressive gloss on a public relations campaign. People exist today under the false belief that everything was hunky-dory before these practices were implemented and that they were implemented by corrupt political actors to pick favorites and curry political favor in the general population. This is absolutely not true and is an idea that must be fought at all costs.

Obama's election would have been a very significant positive moment if it were not for the reactionary backlash it caused among white supremacists and the MAGA fascists.

Need new leadership and voices to lead this movement

Obama was unduly circumspect in regard to race.

DEI programs are not particularly effective at what they set out to do (making people less racist), but the idea that we should get rid of them because DEI discriminates against whites is ridiculous. It is good to interrogate our practices to make sure we are putting white people and people of color on an equal playing field. The system doesn't do that on its own!

While each of these were positive developments, they carried a backlash of increasing latent racism among rural and less-educated whites. I love Barack Obama but his election broke some white folks' brains.
